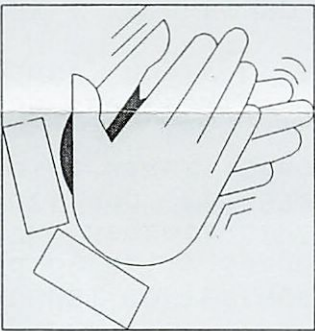

ELECTION DECISION DUE WEDNESDAY - Lane's Board of Education is expected to decide Wednesday night whether to put a request for a larger tax base on the November 6 ballot and whether the request should be \$3.7 or \$5 million above the 1991-92 base of \$16.9 million. Open to the public, the session is to begin at 7:30 in ADM 216. Among other agenda items are possible adoption of a five-year facilities plan which indicates needs of nearly \$22 million; serial levy expenditures, and reports on herbicide and pesticide use, a Soviet exchange program, and low-cost housing. Personnel items include the retirement of 25-year employee M. Cecil Hodges of Health and Physical Education.

In preparation for making an election recommendation, President Jerry Moskus talked with more than 275 residents and studied the responses of 243 employees to a survey on whether the College should seek additional property tax support. Staff by a 79 percent margin favor seeking a higher base. People in the community are split on the issue. Some are deeply anti-property taxes while others would consider the LCC proposal on its merits. If he recommends an election (he will listen to community opinion right up to Board meeting time), President Moskus said his motivation will be to seek to continue the present level of programs and services, provide \$360,000 of new revenues to serve dislocated workers and to reduce waiting lists for vocational and college-parallel programs and courses.

SENIORS OFFERED DIPLOMAS - Adults 62 and older who want to earn high school diplomas can do so in a new nine-month program at the Downtown Center. Credit can be earned via life experiences as well as through classes. Normally, 24 classes are required to complete the program at a cost of \$5 per class. BASE REQUEST ON NOVEMBER BALLOT - Voters will be asked to approve a \$3.75 million tax base increase for LCC at the November 6 election. Board of Education members approved the proposal last week by a 5-1 vote. Larry Mann voted against the motion, stating after the meeting that the College should look elsewhere for the needed increase in operating monies. If approved, the measure would increase LCC's projected tax base for 1991-92 to \$20,633,220. The increase would cost taxpayers 29-cents per \$1,000 assessed value. The owner of a residence assessed at \$80,000 would pay an estimated additional \$23.20 for LCC starting in 1991-92. President Jerry Moskus said the new base will continue the present level of education programs and services, including money for new teaching equipment and plant maintenance. It also will provide \$360,000 for programs for dislocated workers and extra classes to reduce waiting lines for vocational and college-parallel programs and courses. Without the new base or additional revenue from other sources, LCC will have to cut about \$2.3 million from its budget next spring.

FACILITIES PLAN RELATIVELY UNFUNDED - The Board of Education adopted a five-year facilities plan which identifies \$22 million worth of needs in the areas of shop and laboratory space, major construction and remodeling, maintenance, and instructional equipment. About \$1.5 to \$2 million has been tentatively identified for application toward these needs over the next five years, if the November tax base proposal is approved.

HERBICIDE USE OPPOSED - The Board indicated its opposition to use of herbicides on campus and asked for an October report on alternatives. Expenditure of serial levy funds was approved to expand the Center 478 computer lab at a cost of \$16,000 and to get underground storage tanks into compliance with federal and state regulations at a cost of \$35,000. A proposal to build student housing was placed on hold due to a lack of funds. In personnel matters, the Board accepted the retirement of M. Cecil Hodges from Health and Physical Education, accepted the resignation of Gerald Stolp from Adult Basic Education, and hired Judith Bender Bachman as an instructor at Cottage Grove, Nancy LaVelle as instructor in Mass Communication, James O'Brien as instructor in High School Completion, James Cagney as chair of the Business Department, and Charles Reid as a manager in Campus Services. Chuck Reid has been a custodian at LCC since 1981.

NEW SERVICE: SENIORNET - A nonprofit project to build a community of computer-using older adults will get underway at LCC in September or October under the joint sponsorship of the College and the Oregon Eye Institute. SeniorNet is a national organization headquartered at the University of San Francisco. The four-year-old group has about 30 sites to date across the country. It is funded by such groups as Apple, Pacific Bell, and the Markle Foundation. Oregon Eye Institute will fund first-year start-up costs of about \$25,000. LCC will furnish a room at the Downtown Center, five personal computers, a printer, two modems, software, and instructor Ken Hamilton of Adult Education to get teaching underway. The goal is to move to volunteer instructors. President Jerry Moskus said the corporate sponsorship permits LCC to extend a new service to seniors without having to bear start-up costs. Lucinda Alvis for the Eye Institute said the firm had been looking for a community service project and was delighted to find both SeniorNet and LCC as a co-sponsor.

INSTRUCTORS EARNING COMPUTERS - Five mathematics instructors are reviewing developmental math software for IBM, the League for Innovation, and Miami-Dade Community College. TRAINING & DEVELOPMENT GROWING - This will be a busy year for T&D. It expects Dislocated Worker enrollment to grow by 125 to 550 on a \$1 million Private Industry Council contract. It will prepare 1,300 people for jobs on a \$700,000 to \$800,000 state contract to help people on welfare become self-supporting.
