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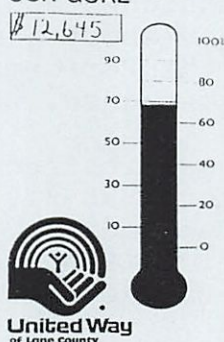



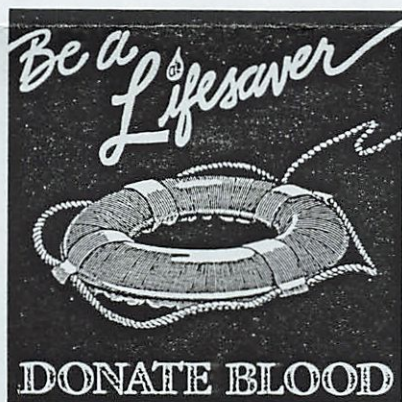

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THEY'LL GET YOU NOW, OR THEY'LL GET YOU LATER - Take advantage of low-cost dental care at LCC's Dental Hygiene Clinic. Teeth cleaning, for example, can cost you \$15 to \$20 here or four to five times that elsewhere. Other services include x-rays, periodontal therapy, fluoride treatments, and sealants. Students in the Dental Hygiene Program perform the services under supervision of instructors and the staff dentist. The two-year program attracts about 22 new students per year. It's one of five at Oregon colleges. Program graduates enjoy a 100 percent employment rate. Call ext. 2206 for an appointment.

WHAT TEACHERS WANT STUDENTS TO KNOW - A survey of faculty members has turned up six things that teachers want students to learn at LCC. They include: basic skills in reading, math, writing, and English; a positive self-perception; interpersonal skills such as the ability to be part of a team, to communicate, and to solve problems; knowledge of how to adapt to new learning demands on the job; a work ethic that results in punctuality, integrity, and a concern for quality; the skill to set educational and career goals. Various committees will be studying how additional emphasis can be placed on these goals. For more information, contact Research, Planning, & Evaluation at ext. 2576.

TRENDS IN OREGON WATCHED - Dr. Larry Brown of Research, Planning, & Evaluation keeps an eye on trends that could affect the College. Here's what he sees coming up: 1) Oregon's population and labor force will grow faster during the 1990s than it did in the last decade and faster than most of the rest of the country. 2) Oregon's non-white population will grow about 10 percent in the 1990s, but still will be about a third of the national percentage. 3) The number of retired people in Oregon is growing, particularly those 75 and older. This should result in an increased demand for health and recreation services. 4) We'll be seeing more women and minorities in the labor force. Two-thirds of the increase in Oregon's labor force through the year 2000 will be women and minorities.

SCENARIOS FOR LCC'S FUTURE - President Jerry Moskus has been sharing a memo with members of the Planning-Budgeting Task Force and others regarding the uncertain revenue picture for the future. The scenario portion of his memo is shared here as information only, not to scare anybody. After all, Scenario 2 is still possible. Not much will happen until after November 6.

As we begin the process of developing the 1991-92 budget, we must contend with a great deal of uncertainty about revenues. We also need to focus in more clearly on values and criteria to guide budget additions or reductions. This memorandum is intended as a starting point in addressing both revenues and expenditures.

### Revenues

Two proposals before the voters on November 6 have significant implications for 1991-92 revenues: the "POPS" initiative, and our tax-base request. As you may know, passage of the POPS (property-tax limitation) initiative could reduce our revenues by anything from \$4+ million to zero dollars. Passage of the tax base could increase our revenues by \$2.9 million to zero dollars. Let me explain through an analysis of four possible scenarios:

Scenario 1: POPS passes, tax base passes. If both the POPS initiative and our tax base pass, we will be entitled to a larger share of a lesser amount of local property tax plus additional monies from the state that may or may not come. If this seems confusing, it is.

Passage of the POPS initiative would reduce local property taxes for schools from the current \$20+ to \$15 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation. Of that amount, we would get a pro-rated share. The share would be slightly larger if the tax base passes; the state would also be expected to give us money to replace the lost property tax revenues. But the state could take this money from our normal state funding allocation, thus resulting in the same or fewer total state dollars than we now get.

The best case version of this scenario is an increase of approximately \$2.9 million in revenue of which \$360,000 would be money for additions and enhancements; the worst-case scenario would be a loss of \$5+ million dollars in revenues.

We won't know the final answer until the legislature concludes its budget in the spring.

Scenario 2: POPS fails, tax base passes. This is the most positive scenario for our revenue picture. We would receive an increase in revenue of about \$2.9 million dollars of which \$360,000 would be money for additions and enhancements to programs. We have promised that the \$360,000 will be used to reduce waiting lists for courses and programs and improve services to dislocated workers.

Scenario 3: POPS passes, tax base fails. Under this scenario, we would need to reduce from \$2.3 million to \$6+ million from our budget. (This is our best current information; the picture will become clearer as specific revenues become clearer).

Scenario 4: POPS fails, tax base fails. With this scenario, we would need to reduce our budget by approximately \$2.3 million.

Obviously, our revenues will be quite uncertain until after November 6. Even then, our revenue picture will be somewhat uncertain until after the state budget is developed. It seems clear, however, that we will need to be able to develop alternative budgets, enabling us to decrease our 1991-92 expenditures by as much as \$6 million or increase them by \$360,000 earmarked dollars. We also have the possibility of reallocating existing monies from one area to another.

If reductions are necessary, they may have to be major reductions. "Across-the-board" or "normal attrition" methods of reduction are not likely to meet our needs.

New courses include Introduction to Graphic Design, Real Estate Property Management, Computer Aided Drafting/Engineering Laboratory. Proposed revisions include: Introduction to Electronics 6.193, and and Aviation Maintenance General 1 3.284, General 2 3.285, General 4 3.287, and General 6 3.291. The revised program is Aviation Maintenance Technician.

**POSITION OPEN** - A counselor-instructor (faculty) position is open. Deadline for applying at Personnel Services is November 12.

**HELP ON THE WAY** - LCC's 500 self-identified disabled students will soon find computer access available. A \$36,890 grant from the State Vocational Rehabilitation Division will be used to buy computer equipment and software designed to meet needs of the disabled. She says Lane County high schools graduate about 200 disabled students each year.



INTERVIEWS BEGIN - The first of six semi-finalists for the position of vice president for instruction will be interviewed this Wednesday, October 24. James E. Ellison, LCC's interim v.p. for Instruction, faces a day of interviews, one of which is public. Staff and others are invited to ask questions of him at a 3:15-4:15 p.m. session in Forum 309. Dick Reid, Search Committee chair, says responses would be particularly appropriate if they relate to each candidate's professional characteristics as described in the notice of vacancy for the position. It reads: "The successful candidate will demonstrate a firm commitment to the philosophy and goals of the comprehensive community college, particularly as they relate to instruction; a firm commitment to open communication and to shared, consensus-building governance; the ability to foster trust, commitment, and innovation in others; successful experience in financial management, data management and planning; and leadership in innovative teaching and instructional programs."

Ellison has been at LCC since 1968. He taught reading in the Study Skills Department till 1973, then became its chair for six years. He was associate dean in Instruction from 1979-83, when he became dean and served in that role until this year. His responsibilities have included liberal arts, instructional support, telecommunications, and evening-weekend college. He earned a B.S. in education and an M.S. in science education from Oregon State University.

Ellison's resume and that of the other five semi-finalists may be found on reserve in the Library for those who wish to see them.

LCC TAX RATE BELOW PREDICTED NUMBER - Valuation of county property went up more than was expected this year; therefore, tax levies were spread across a broader base. The result is that LCC's estimated tax rate for this fiscal year is \$1.87 per \$1,000 of assessed value. That's 12-cents below the estimated rate given in LCC's election fact sheet. The higher number was based on best estimates available when the election material was prepared. Approval of the LCC ballot proposal on November 6 will result in an estimated tax rate of \$2.16 rather than the earlier estimate which was 12-cents higher. The bottom line is that taxes are estimated to be lower than predicted earlier.

THE LATEST FIGURES - LCC's percent of revenue from tuition and fees for 1989-90 is even higher than the 22 percent estimated earlier. With the closing of the books for last fiscal year, the number jumped to 24.6 percent, reports Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts of Research, Planning & Evaluation. By comparison, state community college figures show an average of 18 percent of revenue from tuition and fees for 1988-89. Figures for 1989-90 aren't available yet.

In terms of dollars, tuition and fees for community colleges nationally averaged \$842 in 1989-90, according to the research office of the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges in Washington, D.C. LCC's tuition and fees for 1989-90 averaged between \$837 and \$897. The LCC numbers were reached by adding the \$792 tuition for that year to the estimated average of fees of \$45 to \$105 as identified by Financial Services and printed in the college catalog.

The LCC election fact sheet says the percent of revenue from tuition and fees "is among the highest in the state and nation among community colleges." The dollar figures indicate that LCC also appears to be "among the highest in the state and nation" in terms of cash cost of tuition and fees. Note also that LCC raised its tuition for 1990-91 so that the average tuition and fees now range from \$873 to \$933.

It pays to complete your degree at Lane Community College! In a recent study of students completing their work at LCC in 1985-86, the Oregon wage records of these students from July 1, '86 through June 30, 1989 reveal the following:

- \* Those receiving degrees earned an average weekly wage over the three year period that was slightly more than one-third greater than for those not receiving degrees. Moreover, the differential remained roughly the same over the three years.
- \* The average for the weeks worked over the three year period was, for the degree recipients, more than 20% greater than for those not getting degrees.
- \* In 1988-89, the average 1986 graduate had yearly Oregon earnings that were more than 50 percent greater than the earnings for non-graduates.

**THREE-YEAR UW GAIN: 83%!** A look at LCC's giving to United Way over the last three years shows impressive progress. In 1988-89, 135 people gave \$7,747-- a 19 percent drop from the year before. In 1989-90, 185 people gave \$11,496. That was 48 percent above the prior year and 18 percent over the goal. This year, 200 donors gave \$14,172. That's a 23 percent jump over last year and is 12 percent above the goal. The difference in the amount pledged over the three years represents an 83 percent increase. ## BOARD APPLAUDS SOVIET TEACHER, OPPOSES MEASURE 5

The Board of Education welcomed Alexander "Sasha" Kravchencho, visiting professor from the Soviet Union, at its meeting October 17. Kravchencho said he hoped his visit would lead to an ongoing exchange of faculty and students between Lane and the Institute for Foreign Language in Irkutsk. Also at the meeting, the Board resolved to oppose Measure 5, the property tax limitation proposal, because it would diminish programs and courses of importance to the community, even though property taxes are high.

In other business, the Board:

- approved an emergency contract award for repair of smoke and fire damage
- approved purchase of cups and napkins for food services, and requested that administration prepare a plan to phase out styrofoam in one year
- postponed discussion of legislative proposals for the OCCA
- requested more information about a low-cost housing proposal
- requested revisions in the drug-free workplace policy statement.

The next meeting is November 14.

**CONSIDER THE TIMING** - Scott Carpenter, LCC Advocates chair, says The Register-Guard report on October 23 concerning 58 percent of respondents to the Watson & Associates poll declaring themselves opposed to a property tax increase for LCC was correct. CHILD CARE: RESOURCE & REFERRAL - One of the options for helping students with child care needs is the Resource and Referral model, Consultant David Andrews told College Council Tuesday.
