



DON'T MISS OUT ON MEDICARE - Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you turn age 65, whether you're retired or still working. You apply for Medicare automatically when you apply for social security benefits. If you plan to retire after age 65, you should apply for Medicare separately.

When you enroll in Part A (hospital insurance) of Medicare, you also automatically enroll in Part B (supplementary medical insurance), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want it. If you enroll in Part B at the earliest opportunity, you pay monthly premiums, which are normally deducted from your social security benefits, if you get them. If you enroll late, you may have to pay higher premiums.

LATEST BUDGET ESTIMATE - If the new tax base isn't funded by the Legislature, LCC will have to cut about \$1.2 million for the new fiscal year which begins July 1. That amount is \$725,000 less than expected, because it now appears that the equipment and maintenance serial levy which was approved before Measure 5 will be funded. Vice President for Administrative Services Richard Hillier said the \$1.2 million probably will come from increased tuition along with reduced expenditures.

ENROLLMENT CLIMBS - Spring term enrollment is up about 100 FTE, or 800 headcount, from a year ago as of March 29, says Vice President for Student Services Bob Marshall.

He believes this indicates an increase in part-time students over full-time students because people can't get all the classes they want. Lane has experienced about 500 headcount more students per term this year than last, he says.

Marshall is working on a plan to allow students close to graduation to register before other students. It takes 93 credits to graduate and Marshall is concerned for those who have 70 or 80 credits but can't get in the last few classes they need. The plan would have to be programmed into LCC's automatic touch-tone telephone registration system, ClassLine. Marshall hopes it will be in place by fall. In the meantime, the Office of Instruction has added sections and worked with individuals to help them get through the crunch.

PROPOSED POLICY ABOUT READY - A draft of a proposed sexual harassment policy, which has been four years in the writing, will be shared with College Council at its April 30 meeting.

Council members also learned at their Tuesday meeting that a series of benchmark reports to the Board of Education on the College's progress will be shared monthly beginning with the May Board meeting.

Council also is looking for a process to get at the issue of smoking on campus, with the aim of eventual creation of a policy. The process may include holding a unity conference of the type held earlier for timber and environment people.

LCCEF President Jerry Sirois raised the issue of how Campus Ministry can get additional financial support for the present and the future. Much of its present support comes from Father James Dieringer, chaplain. He uses his total income from the Archdiocese of Portland to support the wages of his assistant. When he retires in about six years, the Catholic money will disappear. It was suggested that staff support the effort by payroll deduction through the Foundation. Most gifts go to needy students.

BOARD APPROVES TUITION CHANGE - The Board of Education approved charging tuition for all credit hours at its Wednesday night meeting. The change was part of a package that also included charging senior citizens 50 percent of credit and non-credit tuition, charging \$1.37 per class hour for community education classes, charging \$88 per registered credit for international and out-of-state students, and charging \$39 per class for High School Completion.

Voting in favor of the package were Peter Sorenson, Jim Pitney, Cindy Weeldryer and Larry Mann. Opposed were Larry Perry, Pat Riggs, and Chuck Ivey.

Also at the meeting, the Board gave President Moskus the go-ahead to pursue administrative restructuring. The restructuring involves moving Community Education and Economic Development to a newly created vice presidential position, as announced in the January 28 Daily.

In other business the Board:

- ♦ heard that spring headcount is up 786;
- ♦ heard program presentations from ESL's Maxine Frauman and students, and Customized Training's Dave Oatman;
- ♦ tabled redistricting until the next meeting or work session;
- ♦ decided that the College should be represented at City Club of Eugene, but worked out no further details;
- ♦ approved advisory committee appointments;
- ♦ changed the regularly scheduled May 8 meeting to May 15, and the June 12 meeting to June 10.

Michael Ridderbusch, LCC archivist, applied to ONMP directors last month to include the Torch in its collection. He received word of acceptance March 29. Project directors are microfilming other major student newspapers, such as the Oregon Daily Emerald at the U.O., the Barometer at Oregon State University, and the Vanguard at Portland State University.

In preparation for the filming, Ridderbusch is attempting to assemble a complete set of the Torch from available sources on or off campus. While much of the paper still exists in the LCC Library and Torch office, he invites contributions to fill gaps, particularly for the 1966-67, 1967-68 and 1968-69 volumes. Ridderbusch says it will cost the College about \$300 to film the first 25 years, compared to \$1,400 it would have cost without the assistance of ONMP.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE - The following article is reprinted from the Oregon Community College Association's newsletter, Legislative Digest, of April 16. The newsletter is edited by OCCA's Dana Spielmann.

Distribution plan for replacement dollars passes out of House committee

After weeks of delays and holdovers and 10 amended versions, Senate Bill 815-A Engrossed finally passed out of the House Revenue and School Finance Committee on April 15.

The bill defines the distribution of replacement dollars for K-12, ESDs and community colleges for 1991-92.

For community colleges, SB 815 requires that the amount appropriated to the Community College Support Fund for 1991-92 be distributed by the State Board of Education based on administrative rule. The Governor has recommended \$50.5 million in replacement dollars for the Support Fund.

The bill also sets a minimum state obligation for community college replacement at 1990-91 levies plus 6 percent. This provision does not pre-empt the State Board from allocating dollars from the Support Fund above the minimum state obligation to address the unique situations of ✓ Lane and Clackamas Community Colleges. Lane passed a new tax base in November and Clackamas will be in its second year of a serial levy. Both colleges will require replacement dollars that exceed the 6 percent minimum.

Given recent estimates by the state assessor's office, there may be enough dollars within the Support Fund to fully accommodate these needs. If there are not sufficient funds, the need for additional replacement dollars will be addressed before the Ways and Means Subcommittee on Education.



BOARD MEMBER-ELECT PREPARING TO SERVE - Board of Education member-elect Roger Hall attended his first Board meeting on April 10 as a visitor. He was elected March 26 to an at-large seat, defeating Michael Dubick and Julia Keizur, both of Creswell. His four-year term begins July 1 when he succeeds Larry Perry, who decided not to run after 16 years on the Board.

Hall, 51, is a radiologist at McKenzie Medical Imaging and is a general partner in M.R. Imaging Associates. He has taken many classes at LCC for personal enrichment, including Spanish language instruction from his wife, Elizabeth, of English & Foreign Language. Sculpture is his avocation. Hall speculates that three issues helped him win. One, he lives in Eugene. During his campaign, he pointed out that if he were not elected, Eugene would have only one member on the seven-member Board. Two, he maintains an independent political posture. That appeals to a public that will not accept "politics as usual" anymore. Three, he has a business and professional background, seen as a benefit by many voters.

Hall brings a philosophy of shared accountability to the Measure 5 battlefield. He applies it to the Board, staff, students and the legislature. He feels that those first three groups demonstrated accountability with the tuition changes adopted at the April 10 board meeting. "Ideally, there'd be no tuition at all, like Larry Perry said. But since we don't have resources to reach that goal, I think the Tuition Committee's solution was a good one. It's about the smallest impact you could have." Accordingly, the program review of required credit hours should help, he says. The legislature must do its part next and fund the tax base, he says.

If the College has to make cuts, Hall would begin with a cost-benefit analysis of programs and services. He feels that program cuts are preferable to across-the-board cuts, which decrease the effectiveness of all programs. If cost-benefit analysis doesn't provide an answer, then it will come down to philosophy, he says.

That's where shared governance becomes critical, Hall adds. "Difficult decisions we may be forced to make will be most effective when the people impacted have an input. Even if they don't agree with the decision, they'll agree with the process," which will strengthen morale, he says.
