FOUNDATION FINISHES BUSY SPRING - The LCC Foundation conducted four major projects in April and May. <u>Business Campaign</u> - With a goal of \$12,500, 29 volunteers called on 178 businesses and received 48 gifts and pledges totaling \$13,215. Most of the gifts were unrestricted and will be used for Foundation and College programs in 1991-92, says Director Joe Farmer. <u>Phonathon</u> - Sixteen callers attempted 640 calls to alumni, friends and staff of Lane on May 15 and 16. They successfully completed 326 of these calls and received 54 pledges for a total of \$1,540. Most of these gifts were restricted for a specific use in a department or program on campus. <u>Memorial Day Solicitation</u> - This mailing consisted of 138 personal letters to individuals who made a contribution to a specific memorial fund in 1990. The purpose of the mailing was to encourage continued support of the particular fund the donor was interested in. <u>"Benefactors"</u> - This was the first mailing of a newsletter to LCC retired staff to explain the importance of a will and how they, their families, and LCC might benefit.

Cash gifts were \$11,645 in April and \$8,799 in May for a total of \$20,444. Gifts of materials and equipment will be reported later. Upcoming activities include the Ninth Annual LCC Open on Friday,

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BOARD REPORT

BUDGET PASSED - The Board of Education adopted the 1991-92 College Budget of \$79,219,860, up from 1990-91's \$71,012,447, at its Monday, June 10 meeting. It also appropriated \$41,528,764 for the General Fund, 6.8 percent more than 1990-91. In related matters, trustees resolved to levy \$20,633,220 in property taxes and authorized the College to participate in short-term borrowing to cover a cash-flow deficit projected for December prior to receipt of property tax revenues.

AIR QUALITY IMPROVEMENTS AUTHORIZED - The Board approved spending \$250,000 from 1990-91 and 1991-92 budgets to install an exhaust system for the welding lab in Apprenticeship Building. Administration said the system should solve air quality problems reported by staff in the fastest and most economical manner. Work should be done this summer and in place by fall. Peter Sorenson questioned <u>The Register-Guard's</u> portrayal of the story as "poisoning our employees" when the Facilities Committee had already agreed to recommend these improvements to the Board before the story appeared.

FOUR SPORTS CUT - It took five motions and nearly two hours of deliberation for trustees to reluctantly support the coaches and Administrations' recommendation to cut four athletic programs in order to competitively fund the remaining four. The vote was Larry Perry, Peter Sorenson, Pat Riggs and Jim Pitney for, and Larry Mann against. Chuck Ivey and Cindy Weeldryer were absent. Cut were men's baseball and cross-country, and women's volleyball and cross country. Remaining are basketball and track and field for men and women. No one in the audience spoke against the cuts. Coaches Harland Yriarte, Dale Bates, and Lisa Youngman reiterated their reasoning as outlined in background documents to do four programs right rather than underfund eight programs.

TRANSFERS, BIDS APPROVED - Year-end budget transfers for 1990-91 were approved and all bid awards on the consent agenda were approved. The The bid awards covered purchase of medical and dental equipment, telephone system equipment upgrade, Classline system upgrade, purchase of an airplane and sale of a helicopter and an airplane.

PRESIDENT'S CONTRACT APPROVED - President Jerry Moskus' contract was approved at an annual salary of \$77,200 and a contract period of three years retroactive to his anniversary date of March 1.

STATEMENTS - Statements included outgoing comments from 16-year board member Larry Perry, student body president Michael Omogrosso, and LCCEA president Jay Marston. Perry did not run for re-election and will be replaced by Roger Hall, who was present in the audience. Omogrosso and Marston's terms expire June 30. Their replacements are Ernie Wood and Donald Micken, respectively.

Jerry Sirois advised the Board that classified staff are very concerned about their contract negotiations. Said Sirois, "We've been firing missiles, not negotiating. We haven't accomplished much. There are 365 classified staff with 2,400 years of combined experience who believe in this College. Tell your negotiators to negotiate."

President Moskus gave a legislative update. He reported that HB 5010, which supports funding LCC's new tax base, was passed by the Joint Ways and Means Education Subcomittee, a positive step in the process. He said lottery funds for equipment for community colleges were reduced to \$5.2 million from \$6 million. Moskus, who was out of town during lottery fund publicity, said, "No one in the community college system in this state intentionally disregarded the guidelines. The state needs to be clear in its directions." He also said that HB 3565, the education reform bill, is up for vote this week.

<u>FEES APPROVED</u> - The Board approved a long list of special student fees, including the child care fee voted in by students this spring. Trish Rosewood, student, distributed a report of how ASLCC might use the child care fee.

<u>PESONNEL APPOINTED</u> - The Board approved appointment of James K. Boutin as instructor in Health and Physical Eduation/Athletics, Barbara L. Delansky as director of Student Activities, Shelley Dutton as Bookstore manager, Eugene Humes as instructor in Industrial Technology, and Georgia Lee Paez as director of Counseling.

<u>DISTRICTING UNCHANGED</u> - Present zones for board representation were contined since research has shown populations to be growing equivalently among zones. A proposal to change the method by which Board members are elected was dropped after legal counsel adivsed that such a change must be initiated by citizen petition.

<u>MEETINGS SET</u> - The Board will meet for a work session on June 29 at the Downtown Center. A July meeting will not be held except for a possible telephone meeting to call for a bid award vote on Apprenticeship Building improvements. The next regular meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, August 14, 7:30 p.m., ADM 216.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE - The following article is borrowed from <u>Legislative</u> <u>Digest</u> published by the Oregon Community College Association.

June 7, 1991

The Education Subcommittee of the Joint Ways and Means Committee voted to fund Oregon's community colleges at \$141.1 million for the next biennium.

In action taken June 3, the subcommittee passed out House Bill 5010, which represents the budget for the Office of Community College Services. The bill contains the grant-in-aid funds for community colleges. The \$141.1 million appropriated represents an additional \$7.1 million over previous action by the subcommittee. This "add-back" comes as the result of increased revenues from the May 15 revenue forecast. The Governor had designated \$135.5 in her recommended budget.

In addition, the subcommittee voted to appropriate \$50.5 million targeted for replacement monies. At the present time, it is estimated that the \$50.5 million will allow the replacement of local property tax lost by colleges in 91-93 including the new tax base for Lane Community College and the ongoing serial levy of Clackamas Community College.

The bill also contains the appropriation for the Office of Community College Services. The bill now moves to the full Ways and Means Committee and then to the House floor. Tuesday, June 18, 1991 First Week of Summer Term

INSTRUCTIONAL GROUPS SET DATES - Instructional Cabinet has announced its meetings schedule for 1991-92. It will meet July 17 and August 7 and the first and third Wednesdays each month in the regular school year at 1:30 p.m. in ADM 216. The exception is January, when it will meet on the third and fifth Wednesdays. <u>Curricula Idea Forums</u> will follow Cabinet meetings at 3:15 p.m. in ADM 216. <u>Curricula Approval</u> meetings are scheduled for October 30, November 27, February 26 and April 29 at 3 p.m. in ADM 216. <u>Community Education Division</u> managers will meet with the Cabinet on October 30, January 29 and April 29.

The dates were set at last Wednesday's Cabinet session. It was announced that the Office of Community College Services will tell the state's community colleges on July 19 where they fit into the <u>Katz bill</u> to create mastery levels in the K-12 systems. Instructional Administrative Procedures are being updated this summer; the project is expected to be completed by September 1.

ENROLLMENT COUNT SHOWS INCREASE - Twelfth week projections show 8,813 FTE for 1990-91, which should be close to the final count. Compared to last year's 8330, that's a 5.8 percent increase. Headcount stands at 32,929 year-to-date, 1 percent over 1989-90's 32,593. Summer term registration for credit students only as of Friday, June 14, was 335.1 FTE, up 18.5 percent over last year at this time.

COLLEGE COUNCIL NEWS - President Moskus said at last week's College Council meeting that he will transfer \$2,000 each to Classified and Faculty Councils from his projects fund to help meet their administrative costs. Faculty had requested \$8,000, and Classified \$3,561.

In other business, <u>Council recognized new members</u> who will be seated at its July 24 meeting (3 p.m., ADM 216). Classified representatives will include Jerry Sirois, Jane Wojcik, and Rosemary Busby. Faculty will be represented by Don Micken, Linda Loft, and Jay Marston. Managers will include Larry Warford, Stan Barker, Ron Mitchell, and one to be named. Ernie Woodland, Mary Browning, and a third person will represent students. President Moskus chairs the group. Leaving the Council are Jim Ellison, Bob Marshall, Dick Hillier, Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts, and Larry Romine. Council agreed to <u>shorten the tuition refund period</u> from three to two

Council agreed to <u>shorten the tuition refund period</u> from three to two weeks with a 100-percent refund both weeks. Academic departments will process drops by the end of the second week. Financial aid checks will be distributed on the first two days of the third week. These changes, which will be reviewed by the Board of Education, were recommended by a review committee including staff members Robert Boetcher, Linda DeWitt, Dixie Mauer-Clemons, Don McNair, Verne Whittaker, and students LaFay Floyd, Marianne Horn, Michael Hyland, Arthur Mason, Trish Rosewood, Karla Tiffee, and Ernie Woodland.

The Task Force on Increasing Ethnic Diversity has submitted a wide range of recommendations to President Moskus to <u>improve ethnic diversity</u> at Lane. They include: hiring an affirmative action director; staffing a Cultural Diversity Center to support curricula revision, do community outreach, create a resource library, and develop multicultural activities; adopt a racial harrassment policy; implement a multicultural curricula policy; involve the minority community in more LCC functions; set aside Presidential office time for drop-in visits; expand the existing Multicultural Center; and establish a permanent Advisory Committee on Diversity Issues. A report from Personnel Services dated May 30 shows that in the preceeding year, one minority person was hired. Thirteen women and 19 men were hired for the faculty; one male was an American Indian/Alaskan Native. Three women and two men were hired as managers; all were white. President Moskus said he'll be naming a committee soon to develop a job description for an affirmative action director, set up a search process, and conduct the search.

A New Employees Handbook should be ready by fall.

FARRAND CHOSEN FLIGHT TECH HEAD - Robert A. "Bob" Farrand, Jr., has been named as Flight Technology Department Head. He has been interim head since last August. The permanent appointment is effective September 1 and is subject to Board of Education approval at its August 14 meeting. Farrand was chosen from among 23 applicants and succeeds Terry Hagberg, who left to form a private flight school at Corvallis.

An LCC flight instructor since 1971, Farrand was a line attendant, chief pilot and flight instructor for seven years before coming to Lane. He is an honors graduate of Northrop Aviation Technician School at Inglewood, Calif., and has bachelor of science and doctor of jurisprudence degrees from the University of Oregon.

Flight Technology enrolls about 250 students each term.

ON SHARED DECISION-MAKING - President Jerry Moskus has written a response to the Report of the Shared Decision-Making Task Force. Titled "Shared Decision-Making Revisited," it has been distributed widely throughout the College. Interested persons may get a copy from union heads or members of the various Councils. Dr. Moskus invites feedback by October 1.

Some interesting sentences from the paper: "We need happy, empowered people, but we also need clear lines of responsibility, rules, and efficiency...If LCC overemphasizes human relations concerns, we risk inefficiency and poor service to students. If we undervalue human relations, we risk an inflexible, dispirited campus...The problem that we have not really addressed is whether all views on an issue are equally valuable...Generally speaking, the wider the gap between the expert and the decision-maker, the more shared decision-making should be exercised, so that the gap between local expertise and knowledge of the larger context can be closed...Our ultimate goal should be to make experts on specific organizational matters more knowledgeable about the larger organizational context so that they can be empowered to make decisions that further the organization's mission, goals, objectives, strategies, and directions....

"If a decision is not controversial and affects few people, it probably need not be shared. But if it is highly controversial and affects many people, an administrator is expected to invoke the shared decision-making process...Even under shared decision-making, we expect administrators with special expertise to propose solutions for the problems in their domain...Shared decision-making does not include autocratic decisions, nor does it include political pressure tactics, manipulation of the press, end-runs, or other time-honored techniques common on college campuses...We should not allow people to invalidate decisions by invalidating the process unless they can demonstrate first that the decision was a bad one. Otherwise, the decisioning process will be paralyzed."

Dr. Moskus said he is developing a proposed committee structure which will be ready for review this fall. Training for shared decision-making is being planned, a means for coordinating efforts in shared decision-making will be addressed next fall by College Council, decision-making responsibilities need to be sorted out, and additional emphasis will be placed on planning so that a shared sense of direction for LCC can guide decision-makers.

LOTS OF SUMMER PROJECTS - Campus Services crews are busy this summer with a host of repair and improvement projects which will cost some several hundred thousand dollars. The largest single project is to upgrade welding exhaust and air distribution in the Apprenticeship Building. Costs are expected to run from \$150,000 to \$250,000. Bids have been invited for eight electrostatic precipitators which wash air. Bids will be opened July 9. A second call for bids is about to go out for installation of the air cleaning equipment. The project is to be completed by fall. Other projects: Some floor covering replacement in the Science, Business

Other projects: Some floor covering replacement in the Science, Business and Center Buildings and at LCC at Florence; Machine Tech roof repairs; repairs to exterior stairs and walks; duct cleaning in Center and Apprenticeship Buildings; replacement of heating coils in Apprenticeship, Industrial Tech, Forum, Machine Tech, and Auto Tech; replacement of Industrial Tech transformer; repairs to parking lots; changes to the CAM lab in Machine Tech; removal of underground storage tanks; some parking lot light improvements; replacement of some outside hand rails; installation of a new lighting system in the theater, plus miscellaneous small projects. CHILD CARE AWARENESS RAISED - President Jerry Moskus reaffirmed the college's commitment to child care at a gathering of student parents and administrators on Tuesday, called by student Trish Rosewood. He said proposals for the \$120,000 expected to be raised by a child care fee students approved in May include \$60,000 to fund a student-run co-op and \$10,000 to be added to an additional \$23,000 college general fund subsidy for student parents to use Lane's existing facilities. Use of the remaining \$50,000 is being debated. Rosewood wants it set aside to fund a permanent building for child care, but administrators advocate more planning since research so far shows that an additional building may not be necessary. Agreement should be reached in time to make a recommendation to the Board of Education at its July telephone meeting, said Moskus. In the meantime, a temporary module building and a full-time child care director have been proposed in addition to the co-op and subsidy. Rosewood commended Moskus, Vice President for Administrative Services

Rosewood commended Moskus, Vice President for Administrative Services Dick Hillier, Specialized Student Services Director Sandy Ing, and others for their many hours of hard work on child care at Lane. She encouraged other students to get involved and stay involved. Moskus returned the compliment and echoed the call for continued student involvement.

HEALTH PROMOTION HAS IMPACT - A reader asks, "Why do we have <u>Well, Well</u>, <u>Well</u>...?" Editor Larry Romine of Institutional Advancement responds: For years it has been estimated that about 48 percent of all deaths in

the U.S. are caused by poor lifestyle habits. Examples: Cigarette smoking kills an estimated 390,000 people each year, heart disease 978,000, and drunk driving about 24,000. Further, emotional stress is linked to 60 to 90 percent of all medical visits. It follows that prevention is the single most important factor in maintaining health. Education has helped some people to make changes, hence the distribution by employers across the country of wellness publications. Well people don't use as much sick leave and tend to make fewer health insurance claims, the latter helping to hold down insurance costs. Well people are generally more productive and usually find life on and off the job more enjoyable.

About two-and-one-half years ago, Personnel Services Director Sue Colvin, on behalf of the Wellness Committee, asked Interim President Jack Carter to approve the start of an LCC wellness publication. He did, Dr. Larry Brown in Research, Planning & Evaluation named it, and 31 issues have since been published.
