# SERVICE TIPS FOR STAFF WHO WORK WITH OUR CUSTOMERS--STUDENTS! From <u>IDEAS Unlimited</u>, July 1991

Fussing, carping, demanding customers can make life difficult for employees of any company. But smart sales and service people try to turn complainers into company assets.

It's so easy to dismiss complainers as unreasonable, their complaints as unjustified. But when ignoring or shrugging off complaints becomes an ingrained habit, service deteriorates and customers drift away. Profits—and jobs—follow.

These days, when customers are called on to pay hefty prices for everything, they seem more inclined to insist on full value for their dollars. They are less willing to tolerate a dirty glass, a dingy hotel room, shabby construction, a tasteless hospital meal, a late delivery, or less than courteous treatment.

And they won't go away quietly, either. Dissatisfied customers may tell a dozen or more friends about their plight, thereby losing untold business for the company, according to the White House Office of Consumer Affairs.

To keep *all* customers on our company's side, take a lesson from Harry ("The buck stops here!") Truman who also said, "When life hands you a lemon, make lemonade." Never turn your back on the impossible customer by saying, "It's not my department!" Instead, try to turn that rude individual into a company friend. Handled with respect, enthusiasm, sincerity, and creativity, even the most abrasive people will soften and realize that our company truly wants what's best for the customer.

Walter Geier, a business consultant, asked a successful entrepreneur his secret. He replied:

"I take all the customers nobody else wants. I go out of my way to get the complainers, the tough customers, the ones who are never satisfied, the ones who keep demanding more and scream bloody murder when they don't get it. Those are the best customers to have. For one thing, they have been around; they appreciate good service when they get it and they know how rare it is. So, they stay with you. They don't go running off the first time someone else dangles a special deal in front of them.

"Also, their friends know how hard they are to please. So they tend to follow them, to take their advice and recommendations."

BAD customers? No way. The demanding ones may cause momentary crises, but they can be worth their weight in gold if you respond constructively. The Chinese express crisis as a two-part character: the first stands for danger; the second, opportunity. Germaine Mock Larry Romine Linda Waddell Verne Whittaker **STUDENTS NEAR GRADUATION TO GET REGISTRATION PRIORITY** - For the first time, students at Lane with 80 or more credits are eligible to register anytime on Tuesday, September 3, from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., one day prior to regularly scheduled registration.

Such students typically need only one more term to complete their degree requirements, says Vice President for Student Services Bob Marshall. A minimum 93 credits is needed to graduate.

minimum 93 credits is needed to graduate. In the past, all returning students began registration on the same day, regardless of how many credit hours they had. This did not present a problem until credit headcount enrollment took a 5.6 percent jump in 1988-89, another 6.2 percent in 1989-90, and 7.6 percent last year, increasing competition between older and newer students. The College expects about 200 more students to enroll this fall, another 2 percent increase.

Priority registration should give degree-bound students a better chance at getting the classes they need to graduate, says Marshall. He says as many as 600 students may qualify for the priority registration.

FILING INSURANCE CLAIMS - Most of the time, the insurance forms needed to file a claim for payment of medical services can be completed in the admitting office of your doctor or hospital. Your identification card will have the group number and social security number on it. After services have been completed, the doctor's office or hospital office will send the claim directly to the insurance company. If you receive a statement that has not been billed to the insurance company, write your social security and group numbers on the statement and send it to the insurance company. AIR CONDITIONING UPDATE -- Repair of the air conditioning system on the main campus will take longer than anticipated, reports Campus Services Director Paul Colvin. Meanwhile, staff are urged to open doors and windows and to bring fans from home to increase air circulation. The system, down for the first time in 23 years, requires a new chiller, with installation and start up estimated for August 5 or later. To combat the heat, Campus Services will cool the buildings by ventilating them at night. This will make the buildings cool to cold in the morning and warmer later in the day.

TIPS TO BEAT THE HEAT -- Because we won't have air conditioning in most offices and classrooms for two more weeks, you may be more comfortable if you dress for the heat, open doors and windows (if possible) to create cross-ventilation or bring a fan from home. If temperatures rise above normal (80-85 degrees), you also may wish to take your break outside in the shade or in a breezy spot; slow down and avoid overexertion; and let your supervisor know if you are feeling ill or have a medical condition that is worsened by the heat.
