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BOARD TO CONTINUE CHILD CARE DISCUSSION - The Board of Education will consider loaning \$95,000 to students for child care purposes at its Wednesday, August 14 meeting, beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the Board Room, ADM 216. The loan would subsidize student use of the current facility and cover the start-up costs of a new child care cooperative service, including purchase of a \$69,416 modular building to house the cooperative. The loan would be repaid from the new \$5-per-student fee to be collected beginning this fall.

Other action the Board will be asked to consider: relocation of the welding lab as a long-term solution to air quality in the Apprenticeship Building, plus some improvements to that building in the meantime; purchase of toilet tissue and laundry detergents; lease of two helicopters; formal authorization of emergency replacement of the air conditioning chiller; financing of telephone system enhancements; summer scholarship for ASLCC president; work session for late September or early October; date of regular September Board meeting; appointment of Shelley Gaudia as temporary full-time science instructor and Marie Matsen as administrative assistant to the president; and increase of hourly wages for part-time continuing education instructors and instructors in the non-reimbursable disciplines.

Information to be reviewed at the meeting includes key benchmarks and attainment report. The meeting begins at 7:30 p.m. in the Board Room, ADM 216.

The Board also will meet in closed Executive Session on September 11 at 6:30 p.m. in the Renaissance Room to discuss litigation and classified staff negotiations.

NATIONAL COMPUTER RAG HIGHLIGHTS WORK OF CONTINUING ED STAFF PERSON - Thad Cowdin, information and computer specialist for Continuing Education at the Downtown Center, is saluted for his Macintosh computer work in the July 8 issue of PC Week, a nationally distributed newspaper. Quote: "He created an information sheet for students that includes specific details of each class. Every semester the information sheet must be updated. Before Cowdin turned to a forms-development tool, this meant spending hours retyping the form on a typewriter. Now...the information is automatically updated instead of having to be rekeyed manually. The procedure takes four hours on [computer], rather than two weeks on a typewriter, he said." Way to go, Thad!

ENGLISH INSTRUCTOR SERVING ON STATE COMMITTEE - Mike Rose is serving on an 11-member Education Advisory Committee recently created by Labor and Industries Commissioner Mary Wendy Roberts. The committee met this summer to review bureau activities and discuss opportunities for collaboration between the bureau and educators. The committee meets again this fall.

Roberts said, "Throughout most of its history, the Bureau of Labor and Industries has been involved with issues of concern to educators: child labor regulations, civil rights enforcement, enhanced education and training opportunities through apprenticeship, and the continuing education of employers regarding their legal responsibilities when working with their employees. The purpose of the committee is to advise me on education issues and to have those most closely involved with the issues share their viewpoints. I told the teachers they have gained a new student."

The other members are from Portland School District, South Lane School District, Central Point School District, Gresham Grade School District, North Clackamas School District, Salem School District, Portsmouth Middle School, Corvallis High School, and Oakgrove Elementary School.

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BOARD APPROVES AUGUST AGENDA ITEMS - The board of education approved all agenda items at its meeting last week.

Child care: Voted six to one to loan \$95,000 to students and ASLCC for start up and support of a student child-care cooperative, with Larry Mann dissenting; including purchase of a modular building to house the service.

Welding: Expressed support for a series of short-term welding lab improvements while a new site is selected as a long-term solution.

ASLCC president's scholarship: Voted six to one to approve a summer scholarship for the ASLCC president, with Larry Mann dissenting.

Purchases: Approved emergency replacement of the air conditioning chiller, purchase of toilet tissue and laundry detergents, lease of two helicopters, and financing for telephone system enhancements, all by unanimous vote.

Personnel: Appointed Shelley Gaudia as science instructor and Marie Matsen as administrative assistant to the president, and approved a salary increase for part-time continuing education instructors and instructors in non-reimbursable disciplines, all by unanimous vote.

Meetings: Voted to change the regular September meeting from the 11th to the 4th at 8 p.m., following a closed executive session at 6 p.m.; and to meet September 21 for a work session.

In other business, the board reviewed some key benchmarks of college progress, and acknowledged receipt of the college's final attainment report for 1990-91. President Moskus reported that 75 percent of college revenue is expected to be from the state by 1995 and that most of our revenue from the county is Job Training and Partnership Act money, that a new state funding formula is expected in three years, and that we spend a little less than the national average of percentage of general fund expenditures on plant operations and maintenance. He announced that Bob Farrand has been authorized by FAA to certify pilots, that holding classes at Gateway mall looks unlikely because mall owners are asking a high price, that there will be an all-staff lunch and meeting on September 16, and that the Oregon School Boards Association is holding a workshop on collective bargaining on September 20 and 21.

Peter Sorenson said former LCC and AACJC president Dale Parnell may be appointed state commissioner of community colleges by the State Board of Education.

Jerry Sirois asked for board feedback about stalled classified contract negotiations, but Chair Pat Riggs said the law would not allow them to comment. Cindy Weeldreyer did say that the board appreciates classified.

Riggs led the meeting to a nine o'clock close in her first meeting as chair for 1991-92. All members attended including Riggs, Larry Mann, Jim Pitney, Peter Sorenson, Chuck Ivey, Cindy Weeldreyer, and Roger Hall.

ROSE COORDINATING LCC'S PART IN 'A CONVERSATION WITH OREGON;' VOLUNTEERS NEEDED TO ORGANIZE MEETINGS, LEAD DISCUSSIONS, CONDUCT INTERVIEWS -

English Instructor Mike Rose has been named by President Jerry Moskus to coordinate LCC's participation in "A Conversation with Oregon."

The statewide effort, led by Gov. Barbara Roberts, aims at involving thousands of Oregonians in making decisions about the state's future. The questions: What kind of place do we want Oregon to be? What level of public services do we want and need? And how should we pay for these services?

Answers to be gathered between now and January 1992 will form the basis of the governor's recommendation for a tax structure to pay for such services. Her proposal would be placed before the Legislature or state voters before November 1992.

Spurring the Conversation is the lost tax revenue caused by passage of Measure 5 at the November 1990 election. Because the state general fund must be used to replace property tax dollars lost to school funding, allocations for higher education, human services, corrections and other programs will need to be cut dramatically by 1995. Measure 5 also limits the revenues local government can raise for police, fire, parks and other services.

The immediate need is to find and train volunteers to conduct the conversation. A training session for the LCC group and others who will work in Lane, Douglas and Coos Counties will be held Sunday, Sept. 22, at 4 p.m. in Forum 308-309 on the LCC main campus.

Rose says he'll settle for at least 25 LCC people helping out, but really wants 100 LCC volunteers at the Sept. 22 meeting.

Volunteers are asked to contribute up to 10 hours of time (some of it can be regular work time if supervisors approve). They'll lead discussions with small groups and via Ed-Net workshops. Others will conduct one-on-one interviews with community leaders. Others will work at making arrangements for Ed-Net and other meetings.

"I need to get names of volunteers to Salem by the end of next week," Rose says. "Because I won't be on campus for awhile, please telephone Larry Romine at ext. 2303 and tell him you'll work with us. We need you."

"This is really crucial," says President Moskus. "The Legislature soon will be paying 70 percent of local school costs. Citizens have to decide whether to find substitute revenues or shut down many vital government services. LCC should be a prominent player in the Conversation."
