HERE'S HOW THE PARKING VALIDATION PROGRAM WILL WORK FOR STUDENTS -The City of Eugene's parking validation program for downtown is now in effect. DTC students acquire passes (ID cards) at the DTC. When students have their passes they can purchase validation parking coupons from the DTC Bookstore for \$.25 for each hourly coupon with a \$1 minimum. Validation coupons are accepted by attendants in the Overpark and Parcade, in the lots at 8th and Willamette, 8th and Pearl, and by use of pay boxes in the lots at Broadway and Charnelton, 10th and Olive, and 11th and Willamette. Parking is free on Saturday in the Overpark and Parcade, and for the first hour of parking Monday through Friday. Meters will still have the \$.50 hourly rate.

VALIDATED PARKING FOR STUDENTS GOING WELL - Downtown Center students are coping well with the city's validated parking program and making no complaints, say Community Education and Economic Development Dean Larry Murray and DTC Bookstore Clerk Julie Leonard. Leonard says about 500 validation coupons were sold Friday and Monday to students and a few staff. The Overpark garage is getting more use than in the past, she says. The popular lot across the street from the DTC is still at 50 cents per hour until Monday, when validated spaces will be available, city officials told Leonard. The City of Eugene implemented its new parking policies Monday.

COUNCIL TO CONSIDER SMOKING RECOMMENDATION - College Council will be asked today at its 3 p.m. meeting in BUS 205 whether to recommend a smoking policy to the Board of Education. Council will hear remarks about the staff smoking survey, student smoking survey, Faculty and Classified Councils' recommendations, and limited remarks from guests.

Council also will be asked to: discuss and/or revise or adopt proposed ASLCC child care policies and procedures; review the November Board of Education agenda; reconsider for adoption a Classified Employee of the Month Award, discuss and/or revise or adopt construction priorities recommended by the Facilities Management Committee, adopt college goals and objectives as outlined in President Moskus' "vision" report, endorse OSPIRG's campaign against toxics, decide a process for reviewing committee structure, suggest means to resolve shared decision-making issues raised by a task force report and responses, and hear a holiday social event proposal.

THEFTS REPORTED - Director of Campus Services Paul Colvin says the college is experiencing a number of petty thefts, particularly wallets being taken from purses or backpacks left unsecured in open offices. He advises staff to secure their valuables; a closed but unlocked office door provides no protection.

SOFTWARE USERS TO TRAIN AT LANE - People who purchase computer-aided machining software from Point Control Company of Eugene will be invited to attend LCC to learn how to use it. The company awarded a training contract to the college in September and expects about 100 customers a year to train here. The first four customers began a four-day session this week.

Customized Training Director Dave Oatman says the contract is an example of how business and education can work together for mutual benefit. The college gained \$18,000 in software donations from the company for its machine technology program, and to support contract training. Point Control Training Manager Angela Major says her company benefits because, "now we can do what we do best -- develop software and sell it. Educators do a better job of training."

Point Control's SmartCAM CNC Process Modeling software is sold worldwide and is used to make everything from toothbrushes to x-ray aprons to jet aircraft parts.

Mechanical Technologies Department Chair Ted Kotsakis says his two classes in computer-aided machining are full and have waiting lists. The CAM lab has 13 workstations and is the site for both student and contract classes. Industry demand for trained machinists is high locally, statewide and nationally, says Kotsakis. He predicts about 200 job openings every six months for Oregon with beginning wages at roughly \$8-\$9 per hour.

"We appreciate LCC's commitment to maintain its staff's high level knowledge and proficiency in manufacturing techniques," Point Control Training Manager Angela Major said, "and to transfer this technology to industry by using our software as a tool."

COUNCIL SELECTS TWO SMOKING POLICY OPTIONS - College Council decided Thursday to recommend two smoking policy options to the Board of Education. One option is to ban indoor smoking except for designated areas such as an enclosed portion of the cafeteria, and to allow it outside except for designated areas such as near air intake vents. The other option is to fully ban indoor smoking and to allow it outside except for designated areas. Council agreed that indoor smoking areas should have separate ventilation.

Receiving no support were two other options, one to leave things as they currently are and the other to ban indoor and outdoor smoking entirely. President Jerry Moskus proposed the options to facilitate discussion.

Linda Loft and Don Micken reported that Faculty Council voted for both a total indoor ban and for an indoor ban that allowed designated smoking areas. Faculty wants no money spent to create a smoking area that could be spent on instruction instead.

Rosemary Busby said the Classified Council voted for an indoor ban as well, but at the same time expressed respect for the rights of all individuals.

Mary Browning said the ASLCC had conducted an informal survey of students but analysis was not complete. She said 800 to 1,000 responses have been collected, compared to the 511 student turnout for the spring ASLCC presidential election. In the meantime, student government recommends an indoor ban except for designated self-contained areas, she said.

In other business, council:

- decided to sign a letter written by OSPIRG that endorses amendments to toxics provisions of federal laws;
- supported guidelines for construction priorities as recommended by Facilities Management Committee;
- supported a monthly recognition award for classified employees as originally recommended by that group's professional development team;
- approved policies for the student child care co-op and subsidy program proposed by students;
- referred back to Faculty and Classified Councils the College Goals and Objectives document for further discussion;
- supported Moskus' request to offer some kind of all-staff holiday activity before the end of the term; and
- deferred discussion of college committee structure and the shared decision-making report and responses.

CABINET DISCUSSES BUDGET, FEES - President Jerry Moskus told Instructional Cabinet at its Nov. 6 meeting that he is conducting department visits to promote staff understanding of the college's financial situation. He said the state legislature has funded our tax base for this year but next year is in limbo. The tax base funding has necessitated a supplemental budget process in addition to the regular budget process.

Moskus stressed that supplemental budget expenditures should not obligate the college in the future because the funding may not continue. He said professional-technical curriculum should be "laddered" to serve our district's older, working-age population, and that transfer curriculum should emphasize basic skills.

Cabinet discussed targeting large-scale facilities needs with the supplemental budget, such as moving aviation mechanics to the airport. Vice presidents Jim Ellison and Dick Hillier said the domino effect of moving any program is under discussion but no plans have been made.

The cabinet discussed special fees with the president, especially income credit program (ICP) fees. Moskus said the board and others occasionally ask how the fees are used and whether students are being overburdened. Cabinet members explained that ICP funds are the only ones in the budget that allow department-level flexibility necessary to respond to unforeseen expenses, such as equipment failure. Cabinet concurred that the overall budget system is inflexible and the result of habit and history rather than of planning and innovation.

In other business, Delphine Blankenship said that Carl Perkins grants and other state grants will be audited to verify "disadvantaged and handicapped" student eligibility; and Sarah LaMaster presented the current Title III grant proposal.

Instructional Cabinet meets again Nov. 20.

BOARD TO VOTE ON SMOKING POLICY - A no-indoor smoking policy will be voted on by the LCC Board of Education at its December meeting. Members reached that decision after hearing statements from guests and staff and discussing the issue on Nov. 13. Classified and faculty councils recommend the policy, but ASLCC President Ernie Woodland asked for a designated indoor smoking area as well, after a student survey showed a split opinion. In other business:

- Re-election bids were announced by Chuck Ivey and Cindy Weeldryer.
- The Association of Community College Trustees October convention in Buloxi was attended by Pat Riggs, Weeldryer, and Pete Sorenson. Riggs gave a presentation on board ethics, and Sorenson led a popular roundtable discussion on alternative dispute resolution techniques, said Weeldryer.
- Woodland attended a state conference of the Higher Education Alcohol & Drug (HEAD) committee in Sunriver Nov. 1-3 and said, "Lane is far ahead with its drug and alcohol programs" compared to other colleges in Oregon.
- Classified contract negotiations are going well, LCCEF President Jerry Sirois said.
- OSPIRG requested endorsement of its campaign against toxics, but signature was deferred to give the board time to read background information.
- President Moskus reported on several issues. He said OCCA's proposed legislative agenda advocates retaining locally-elected boards, retaining the current commissioner structure, adding two state board members, appointing someone to monitor educational quality and report to the governor, and appointing rather than electing the superintendent of public instruction; South Lane School District in Cottage Grove has approached LCC about developing an educational park; local school districts are looking to LCC for leadership in high school-college professional-technical curriculum, head start teacher training, and remediation for high school juniors and seniors who drop out, as state education reform progresses; the county is considering building a youth services campus nearby LCC main campus; the board will be asked to approve purchase of a new mainframe computer in December; enrollment is up 12 percent overall and FTE is up 7 percent; and blood tests of employees in Apprenticeship Building show no lead poisoning.
- Budget calendars were approved for the 1991-92 supplemental budget and the 1992-93 regular budget.
- Rigg's nominee Cj Mann was appointed to the Budget Committee.
- Soft drinks were exempted from public bidding so that market demand may prevail and a vending machine supplies contract was awarded to McDonald Wholesale.
- The board appointed Jane Batterson as a dental instructor and acknowledged the retirements of Emily Rasmussen, Larry Romine, Allan Gubrud, and Thomas Young.

DISPEL THE MYTHS

The Highline Indian Education Program in Seattle, Washington, shares these myth-busters about Thanksgiving in a booklet available from the Multicultural Center:

- The Pilgrims landed in Wampanoag (wam-pa-NO-ag) territory. The Wampanoag were part of the Algonquin-speaking peoples and were neighbors to the Iroquois.

- The Wampanoag lived in wood houses - not tipis.

- Wampanoag's governed themselves through councils open to men and women.

- Iroquois women held the deciding vote in the final selection of council members.

- The Wampanoag always shared food with visitors. This applied to the Pilgrims when they landed.

- The first Indian to meet the Pilgrims spoke English. His name was Squanto. He had been to England and survived Spanish slavery, all before the Pilgrims stood on Wampanoag soil.

- The Pilgrims and the Algonquins each had thanksgiving traditions that preceded their first one together: the Pilgrims feasted once a year and the Algonquins six times a year.

- At the first Pilgrim-Algonquin Thanksgiving, Indian women sat with their men to eat but the Pilgrim women waited until their men had eaten.

- There are still Wampanoag people living in Massachusetts.
