ADVISORY COMMITTEE WANTS SPORTS RESTORED - The LCC Sports Advisory Committee on Saturday asked the Board of Education to consider adding back four sports cut a year ago. Restoration of men's and women's cross country, women's volleyball and men's baseball would cost about \$84,000 in 1992-93, said proponents, who suggested that the LCC Foundation be involved in athletics fundraising.

Board members expressed both sympathy and caution. They did not endorse the proposal but invited further exploration into finding a means to support a quality comprehensive athletics program. President Moskus said he would discuss the issue with the Foundation.

WINDOWS INTO CHINA ON EXHIBIT - "Windows into China: People in the People's Republic," an exhibition showing everyday life in China, is showing in the Mezzanine Gallery, Library, through April 22. Special activities will be held on Thursday, April 2, at 4 p.m. in the gallery to promote the exhibit. Violinist Xing Ping Chenn

from Beijing, visiting scholar at the UO School of Music, will perform contemporary and traditional Chinese music. Meikuei Chen from Taiwan, an Asian studies major at UO, will play traditional Chinese music on the ku-jing, a stringed instrument known as the koto in Japanese culture. Willow Zheng, a graduate of the Xian Academy of Fine Arts in Xian, will demonstrate Chinese brush painting styles and discuss developments in contemporary painting.

The exhibit is on a two-year tour of 20 library galleries in Oregon. It is sponsored by Linfield College.

THREE TO BRING BACK ASIAN PERSPECTIVE - Mary Forestieri, Velma Jesser and Tom Reimer have been accepted to represent Lane in an Asian studies institute sponsored by the University of Hawaii, the East-West Cultural Center, AACJC, and the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. The three serve on Lane's International Intercultural Committee.

The institute's purpose is to provide Asian content and perspectives for undergraduate curricula in AASCU and AACJC member colleges. Study spans three years beginning with a June 14-July 4 seminar in Honolulu providing training in historical and cultural differences of contemporary Asia and in curriculum development for the next academic year. Next summer, selected institute alumni will attend a field seminar in Asia. In-service workshops will be offered the third year at regional centers that emerge out of the network of participating institutions.

ESL INSTRUCTORS ATTEND CONVENTION - Lane was well represented at the 1992 Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) convention in Vancouver B.C. in March. TESOL is the professional association for ESL instructors. This year's conference drew 6,450 participants from over 30 countries. Attending from Lane ESL were: Maxine Frauman (lead instructor), JoAnn Hueth, Norm Johnson, Demetri Lontos, Jan Lyon and Christine Seifert. Fraumann and Johnson presented, "Knocking Down Classroom Walls: Student-Based Learning Projects." Instructors returned with new curriculum ideas and materials including new texts to be used spring term.

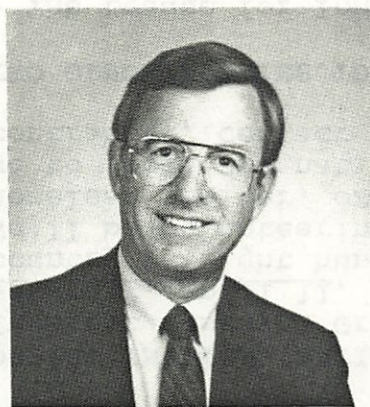

PORTER TO LEAD FLORENCE CHAMBER - Bill Porter, Director of LCC at Florence, will add to his volunteer schedule the presidency of the Florence Chamber of Commerce effective July 1, 1992. "I've been working to get as immersed in the community as I could, to get the college known," says Porter, and he has succeeded. He says LCC at Florence experienced its largest enrollment ever this winter at over 1,000 headcount (including some duplication). Previous terms averaged 350 to 450 enrollment. He reports expansion in all offerings and a growing number of senior citizens enrolling as Florence becomes more and more of a retirement community.

Porter says the chamber will be involved in the Florence centennial in 1993, in continuing to court tourism and develop other economic development opportunities, and in lobbying to make Highway 126 safer. Other activities going on in Florence include a new performing arts center, and a new golf course and resort.

WINTER TERM HONOR STUDENTS NAMED - Lane Community College has named 932 students to its winter term honor roll. The honor roll has four divisions. The President's List requires a 4.0 GPA and had 384 students. The President's Scholars List requires that GPA for three consecutive terms, which 44 students achieved. The Vice President's List requires a GPA of 3.55 to 3.99 and had 438 students. The Vice President's Scholars list requires that GPA for three consecutive terms, which 66 students achieved.

FEDERAL INCOME TAX WITHHOLDING CHANGE ON APRIL PAYCHECK

THE IRS HAS ISSUED NEW WITHHOLDING TABLES FOR EMPLOYERS TO USE IN PLACE OF THE JANUARY 1992 REVISION. THE NEWEST TABLES WILL REDUCE THE AMOUNT OF INCOME TAX WITHHELD FROM YOUR PAYCHECK AND YOU WILL HAVE MORE MONEY TO SPEND EACH MONTH. HOWEVER, THE LEGISLATURE IS NOT REDUCING YOUR TAX LIABILITY. WHEN YOU FILE YOUR TAX RETURN FOR 1992, IF YOUR WERE EXPECTING A REFUND, IT WILL BE SMALLER OR YOU MAY OWE. IF YOU WERE EXPECTING TO OWE, YOU WILL OWE MORE.

IF YOU DO NOT WANT YOUR WITHHOLDING TO CHANGE (ACCORDING TO THE IRS) YOU SHOULD COMPLETE A NEW FORM W-4 "EMPLOYEE'S WITHHOLDING ALLOWANCE CERTIFICATE". YOU SHOULD CLAIM THE SAME NUMBER OF WITHHOLDING ALLOWANCES AS BEFORE, BUT INDICATE ON LINE 6 OF THE FORM AN ADDITIONAL AMOUNT OF TAX TO DEDUCT FROM EACH PAYCHECK.

THE NEW WITHHOLDING TABLES WILL REDUCE THE AMOUNT OF TAX WITHHELD EACH MONTH ON THE SINGLE RATE BY \$14.40 AND ON THE MARRIED RATE BY \$28.80. EMPLOYERS ARE SUGGESTING THAT EMPLOYEES REQUEST \$15 (FOR THE SINGLE RATE) OR \$30 (FOR THE MARRIED RATE) AS AN ADDITIONAL AMOUNT TO DEDUCT FROM EACH PAYCHECK IF YOU DO NOT WANT YOUR WITHHOLDING TO CHANGE.

THE W-4 FORM IS AVAILABLE AT PERSONNEL SERVICES FROM THE FORMS RACK. YOU MAY CHANGE YOUR W-4 AT ANY TIME BY FILLING OUT A NEW FORM. FORMS MUST BE RETURNED BY APRIL 23, TO BE EFFECTIVE ON THE APRIL PAYCHECK.

2. Nominations will be routed to the Personnel Department for verification of eligibility.
3. Nomination forms and COMPLETED rating sheets will be returned by selection committee members to the chair of the selection committee for compilation of summary rating sheet. If a decision cannot be reached, the committee will request additional information from the nominators of the individual nominees.
4. The decision (and summary sheet) will be forwarded to the Office of the President and Institutional Advancement PRIOR TO THE LAST FRIDAY OF THE MONTH.
5. The President (or designee in the event of his unavailability) will make arrangements with Department Manager of the monthly winner to pay a "surprise visit" to the winner on the first working day of the month to bestow the award, **AND** set a date to take the employee of the month to lunch. Staff from Institutional Advancement will provide press and film coverage of the "surprise visit."
6. An 8 x 10 print will be forwarded by Institutional Advancement staff to the Office of the Vice President for Community & Economic Development. The 8 x 10 picture of each monthly winner will be posted on the LCCEF bulletin board in the cafeteria. A parking space shall be designated for the monthly winner's use for that month.
7. Original nomination, rating and summary rating sheets for monthly winners will be retained for selection of annual outstanding classified employee.

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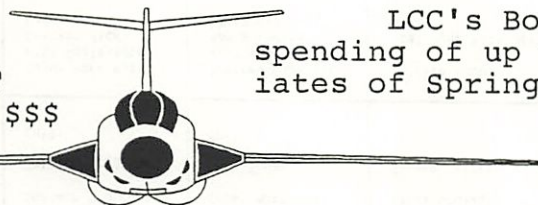

AVIATION FACILITY AT EUGENE AIRPORT GETS PLANNING \$\$\$



LCC's Board of Directors has approved the spending of up to \$25,000 to hire Amundson Associates of Springfield to do preliminary planning for a aviation facility at Eugene Airport. The vote last Wednesday night was 4-2, with Chuck Ivey and Larry Mann urging

more study before planning money was approved. There is concern that the facility may be too costly and that the job market for aviation maintenance technicians is generally outside Lane County. Proponents see the field as a growth industry with plenty of jobs. Eugene Airport sees the facility as a key element in attracting aviation-related support businesses that would help it grow.

TUITION DECISION DELAYED - The Board put off until its May 13 meeting a decision about raising tuition \$1 per credit hour in each of the next three years. Directors want more data about the impact on students. The hike would produce about \$300,000 per year in new revenue to help offset the effects of Measure 5.

THREE MORE RETIRING - Closing out careers at LCC are Margie Holland, instructor/counselor since 1970; Elsie Long, instructor in the Study Skills Department since 1974; and Larry Murray, director of MDTA from 1968 to 1983 when he became dean of Community Education and Economic Development Division.

BUDGET STILL UNSETTLED - Earlier estimates that LCC will be able to meet present obligations in the fiscal year which begins next July 1 remain constant. But, FY 1993-94 doesn't look as rosy, according to Vice President for Administrative Services Dick Hillier. He now says a shortfall between \$3 million and \$7 million is "realistic." He wants to put as much money as possible into savings to offset the expected shortfall. The debate on that will continue, though managers meeting with Hillier last Wednesday seemed to lean toward making cuts earlier rather than later. Stay tuned.

FUNDING COULD CHANGE COLLEGE PROGRAMS - President Jerry Moskus told managers last week that Measure 5 could impact the mix of programs and services. "We used to decide what programs and services we would offer on the basis of what the community wanted, what would please the voters, and so on," he said. "Now the state is moving toward allocation of funds nearly totally on an FTE basis. This causes the college to wonder about services which generate no FTE or the least FTE." At this point, no decisions have been made, but the situation is expected to generate much discussion as Measure 5's impact is felt more and more.

ALREADY FULL - Dental Assisting's 1992-93 class is already full, with 30 students and eight alternates. This is the second consecutive year that it has filled long before the mid-July deadline.

He has been a consultant or evaluator for 75 two- and four-year colleges and universities and recently for programs in Guam, Japan, Saipan, and the Micronesian Islands.

FOUNDATION RECEIPTS MORE THAN HALF A MILLION SINCE JULY

The LCC Foundation has receipted \$599,031 in gifts for 1991-92 to date, says director Joe Farmer. *"Fundraising in the third quarter, while ususally slow, has been very busy. Plans for the second annual Business Campaign have been completed and thirty-five volunteers are calling on over 250 prospects."*

"Also, members of the Foundation's Board of Trustees Planned Giving Committee have been putting together plans to call on 25 individuals in the community to do a feasibility study for a planned giving campaign."

"In addition to the fund-raising programs, we are in the process of selling all three of the condominiums that were given to the Foundation in December and January. These funds will be used to develop a scholarship endowment for local high schools."

In all, the 1991-92 gifts include \$98,427 in cash, \$301,804 in materials and equipment, and \$198,800 in real estate. (These gifts do not include contributions of services. The IRS will not grant a deduction for a contribution of services to a charitable organization, not matter how valuable such services actually may be.)

RADIOTHON NETS GOAL

KLCC/KLCO's Spring Radiothon ended during "Car Talk" on Sunday, April 12, when the \$89,700 goal was met after 13 and one-half days of fundraising. Pledging support were 1,375 people in addition to 540 pre-radiothon contributors. More than 800 pledges came from Eugene/Springfield, 120 from Newport, 75 from Corvallis, 58 from Bend, 38 from Roseburg, and 31 from Salem. Overall, pledges were received from 106 communities. The average pledge was \$47.99 and the average "Thonbuster" donation was \$43.91. Over half the station's budget comes from listener contributions.

MANAGEMENT EVALUATION DISCUSSION CONTINUES

Managers could be evaluated on their performance related to college goals, personal qualities, and performance related to skills and abilities. That was the discussion of the Management Evaluation Subcommittee at its April 17 meeting. The committee broke into subgroups to discuss the three areas of evaluation.

Suggested examples of college goals on which a manager's evaluation might be based included shared decision making, affirmative action, providing a quality learning environment, efficiency of operation, service to new populations, community service and positive relations with the community, department strategic and operational planning, and quality service to clients. It was suggested that evaluation on college goals might be more subjective, between the supervisor and manager.

Another subgroup debated whether to evaluate a manager on personal qualities. Some said that a performance problem may be tied to a personal quality and manager and supervisor need to know that to be able to solve the problem. Others felt that personal qualities should not be judged and that a performance problem related to personal quality would need to be approached through other means than asking for a change in personality.

Performance related to skills and abilities would include job knowledge; decision making, problem solving, judgment, analytical skills; technology skills; personnel development; organizational commitment; interpersonal relations; productivity; supervision, delegation, ability to motivate; leadership; financial management; organizational skills; cooperation (institutional and interdepartmental); ethics; safety; initiative; inspiration; and motivation.

The subgroups will continue to meet on their own and will make presentations and recommendations to the full committee later. The committee meets again on Friday, May 1, from 8:30-10 a.m., room to be announced.

NON-CREDIT STUDENTS COMING BACK FOR MORE

A spring 1991 survey of non-credit students reveals that 81 percent expect to take additional classes at Lane within the next five years, reports the April 1992 issue of Datapoints, a newsletter published by Research, Planning & Evaluation. The study also found:

- 82 percent said Lane offered the classes they desired
- 64 percent of non-credit students work full- or part-time while attending Lane
- 69 percent pursue general interest classes
- 13 percent attend Lane to prepare for a new job
- 10 percent attend Lane to upgrade their job skills
- 67 percent preferred evening classes
- 43 percent preferred weekday classes
- 94 percent either preferred or found evening classes acceptable; and
- 65 percent thought weekend classes would be acceptable

A stratified sampling technique was used to identify 610 students to be surveyed on the basis of sex, age and address. More than 43 percent, or 265 students, responded. Respondents generally were representative of the sample.

CLOTHING EXCHANGE BARES ITS RECORDS

The Clothing Exchange has helped 13,615 people with clothes and has distributed 35,583 articles of clothing in the last seven years, reports Campus Ministry.

ESL, OTHER PROGRAMS CAN EXPECT CONTINUING IMMIGRATION IMPACT

The need for English as a Second Language, basic skills, counseling, financial aid and other services will increase along with Oregon's increasing immigration rate, predicts Larry Brown of Research, Planning & Evaluation in the April 1992 issue of Datapoints. Brown says although Oregon has not been a primary state for immigration through the years, that will change in the next decade, perhaps markedly. (Fortunately, Lane's ESL program is thriving; see item below).

Neighboring California is not expected to have a white majority population by the year 2000, and the same for Texas and New York by 2020. The US. overall is expected to have a non-white majority population by about 2050.

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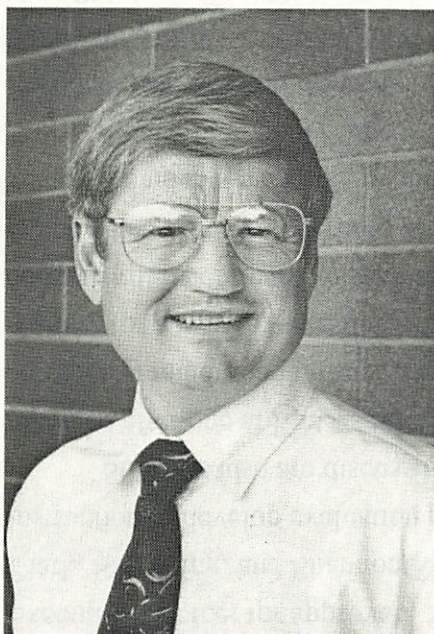

SCIENCE INSTRUCTORS NAMED CO-INNOVATORS

No slave to television or computers, Robert Boettcher and Stanton Swank instead have mastered these two icons of modern life and put them to work as teaching aides in science classes at Lane Community College. Students raise light pens instead of their hands and ask televisions instead of instructors for basic study and review of anatomy and physiology. It's called interactive media technology. Boettcher and Swank's developments in this area have won them federal grants,

nationwide speaking engagements, and now the Co-Innovators of the Year Award at Lane sponsored by the League for Innovation in the Community College.

Videodisc Technology. Boettcher chairs the Science Computer Committee at Lane and championed the use of computer-managed videodisc technology in his department. He developed an interactive review system with case histories on oral pathology for use by dental hygiene students. He has reviewed hypercard software for controlling interactive video for publishers as well as other schools and has adapted some for use at LCC. Right now he's working with a publisher to develop a database of 5,000 images for a videodisc and will described his work at a conference in June at the University of Utah Medical School.

Bar Code Technology. Swank uses computer-driven videodisc presentations in his classes as well as computer-aided instructional devices. For example, anatomy and physiology students can sit down with a model of the subject they're studying, such as a skeleton, and a Macintosh computer. If they need more information about a part of the skeleton, say an armbone, they scan a bar code imprint on the armbone with a light pen. The light pen is wired to the computer. Scanning the bar code activates a data base that produces detailed information on the computer monitor for the student to read. It also activates a voice sound system that pronounces the scientific name of the part, in this example, humerus for armbone. Swank helped design the bar-code system and wrote the software.

Student Success. The innovations allow students the freedom to explore at their own paces. They don't have to ask for instructor feedback as frequently. Instructors are freed from presenting and reviewing material that students can learn through use of the interactive programs instead. As a result, more students are successfully completing their science courses than before.

Boettcher, 51, has taught at LCC since 1966. He received a B.A. degree from Jamestown College in 1963 and an M.S. from the University of Oregon in 1965. He lives in Creswell.

Swank, 28, has a B.S. from California Polytechnic State University, 1987, and a M.S. from the University of Oregon, 1990. Both degrees are in biology. Before joining LCC in 1990, he worked as a researcher for both the Cal Poly health center and at Syntex Pharmaceuticals in Palo Alto, CA. He resides in Springfield.

ONLY HALF OF RECLASSIFICATION QUESTIONNAIRES ARE DONE

About 50 percent of classified job description questionnaires distributed to collect information for the reclassification process have been returned to Personnel Services, Classified Council learned at its April 22 meeting from LCCEF spokesperson Alen Bahret. Personnel distributed the questionnaires in December and hoped to have them back by March 15. The questionnaire process has proved far more time-consuming than predicted, said Bahret. Because of this, those employees who want to request an individual reclassification should go ahead and do so and not wait for the reclassification process. He added that the new contract provides for appeal of denial of reclassification requests and that a Personnel decision can now be reversed. He said the union will hold a meeting on April 30 to go over the new contract and other business.

Council discussed how to use some unspent funds and may contribute a portion to the Evelyn Tennis scholarship being coordinated by the union.

Facilitator Jill Bradley asked council members to get the word out that the council is often asked to nominate classified employees to serve on various college committees. She would like to establish a pool of people willing to be called upon.

Classified Council meets again on May 13. Karen Bond will facilitate.

FACULTY EVALUATIONS DOMINATE COUNCIL DISCUSSION

Faculty evaluations are under discussion by a new task force and by student government, Faculty Council learned at its April 23 meeting.

The Faculty Evaluation Policy Task Force was established by the President and College Council last term to draft a faculty evaluation policy in response to a new accreditation standard, said Pat John, a member of the task force.

The proposed policy calls for substantive evaluation of all faculty at least every third year, in accordance with the new accreditation standard. It states that evaluation should identify faculty strengths and weaknesses, encourage self-improvement, provide a basis for growth, and help the college improve its inservice training. Currently, the frequency and method of evaluation at Lane varies from department to department.

Faculty Council made minor suggestions about the wording. The policy also is being reviewed by Executive Cabinet, College Council and Instructional Cabinet. After review, a final draft will be submitted to Executive Cabinet for approval. Serving on the task force with John are Jill McKenney, Julia Poole, Dennis Clark, Sandy Ing, and Shannon Kracht. John said a second task force will be appointed by the Office of Instruction to develop evaluation procedures.

Students also are discussing faculty evaluations. They would like to use a numeric ratings system modeled after one at Kansas State University. Council members said their own experience shows that student comments, rather than ratings, are more valuable. Councilors also expressed the belief that students are really looking for a way to weed out unsatisfactory instructors, rather than evaluate all faculty on a regular basis. The council will recommend to student government that it not pursue its evaluation proposal but instead get involved in the new task force and perhaps form a joint committee of students, faculty and administrators to provide a stronger voice for students in faculty evaluation.

Council ran out of time to finish a discussion on the ratio of full-time to part-time faculty. LCCEA President Don Micken wants a contracted ratio. He says comparative data about other community colleges issued by the state Office of Community College Services is not the same as data from the Oregon Education Association. He will bring more information to the next council meeting.

Faculty Council meets again on Thursday, May 14 from 3-5 p.m. in the Board Room.
