Sixth Week of Spring Term

The Story of el Cinco de Mayo

No country in the world has had a more dramatic history filled with bitter conflicts and forceful personalities than Mexico. One chapter of this history we celebrate tomorrow -- the battle of Puebla.

Constant warfare, graft, and mismanagement by President Benito Juarez's predecessors had emptied the treasury. When Juarez took over the army, the civil servants and the police had not been paid for months. Juarez therefore declared a two-year moratorium on the payment of all foreign debt, including compensation for French and British property destroyed in the fighting. Using his anger over the moratorium as a pretext, France's Emperor Napoleon III made another attempt to gain a foothold in the New World. He ordered French troops to Vera Cruz, where they drove Juarez's government back into northern exile.

The French, observing the discipline and the equipment of the Mexican troops, came to the conclusion that 6,000 European troops could master the country. They advanced upon Puebla, where they were assured that the priests would welcome them with clouds of incense and girls would fling wreaths of flowers about their necks.

Instead they found an army of peasants commanded by Ignacio Zaragoza, a Texas-Mexican. The army consisted of ex-guerilleros and amateur generals still armed with guns the British had captured from the first Napoleon of Waterloo. The Mexicans, concealed behind tall cactus plants in the slopes of the Cerro de Guadeloupe, threw the French into a state of disarray. The French used up half of their ammunition in two hours of confused fighting and finally withdrew.

On May 5, 1862, the French Army, with the loss of more than 1,000 men, was flung back to Orizaba and the coast.

The victory in itself was not as important as its moral significance. Cinco de Mayo celebrates the struggle of a people determined to create their own future -- a struggle common to many peoples of the world.

Tuesday, Cinco de Mayo, is the 130th anniversary of the battle of Puebla.

It was hard to tell which was bigger: Rosemary Busby's surprise at being named Outstanding Classified Employee of the Month for May, or the festive balloon presented to her by Vice President Jim Ellison last Friday morning at the Business Development Center. Busby also received a certificate, an invitation to lunch with the president, roses from her boss, and applause from fans. She gets parking privileges and will have her portrait posted on the LCCEF bulletin board all month.

This is what the awards committee heard from Busby's co-workers: "She has been the glue holding the place together through many transitions ... she is a shining example of courtesy and respect ... she can diffuse and dispatch 99 percent of the problems that face the center on a daily basis ... Rosemary is a great help. She gets it done."

Busby has been administrative assistant at the Business Development Center since 1982. She worked in Continuing Education for nine years before that. Her diverse duties have included hosting and teaching international groups that contracted with the department for training. MEMORANDUM

TO: LCC Community
FROM : Jerry Moskus
RE: Budget Requests

We are approaching the end of a very long and difficult process of preparing the 1992-93 LCC operating budget. Part of that process involved departments developing project requests for additional budget money. As anticipated, the total dollar amount of the requests far exceeded the amount of new funds available.

The Vice Presidents worked with their managers to prioritize the requests within each branch. After much input and discussion, the Vice Presidents gave their integrated list of recommendations to me on April 27. The recommendations also went to the Budget Review Group, a representative committee designed to evaluate the Vice Presidents' recommendations and report to me their own recommendations.

Through no fault of their own, the Budget Review Group was not able to send their recommendations to me until Monday, May 4. I had to make my own recommendations to the LCC Budget Committee on the evening of Wednesday, May 6. You will understand that this time frame did not allow for any communication with persons or departments affected by my decision (the decisions were not completed until Wednesday afternoon).

Along with this issue of The Daily, each department has received copies of the updated list of my recommendations. I encourage you to examine that list. On the reverse side of this Daily are printed the explanations for some of my recommendations that differ from those of the Vice Presidents.

I concur with the recommendations of the Vice Presidents and the Budget Review Group for \$250,000 for Capital Equipment and an overall 4% increase in Materials & Supplies. The Vice Presidents will decide as a group how the Capital Equipment money will be distributed. The 4% increase in M&S will be given proportionally to each Vice President to distribute as needed within branches.

I want you to know that the Vice Presidents and I have already started planning for the 1993-94 budgeting process. Later this month, the Board and College Council will decide on the process and set time lines. I assure you that we will have extensive discussion and deliberation over the next year's budget and that the schedule for budget decisions will be widely published and adhered to.

Affirmative Action Office Budget

The \$50,000 for outside services should be non-recurring. The visiting instructor program is necessary only because we cannot offer permanent positions at this time; when we are able to fund new positions, the \$50,000 will not be needed in this line.

The Budget Review Group recommended that a \$10,000 line item for staff and student training (e.g. sexual harassment, cultural diversity) and other campus-wide diversity activities be funded on a non-recurring basis. Training in diversity and other Affirmative Action activities will be necessary every year in the foreseeable future and therefore I am recommending this line item be recurring.

SSS/TALN

The \$4,000 for operating supplies should be non-recurring, pending a renegotiation of this contract with the granting agency during 1992-93.

Student Services/Instructional Support International Student Scholarships

This amount should be non-recurring, pending review of this contract during 1992-93 by the International Intercultural Education Committee.

RSVP Senior Companion Directors' Salaries

As a result of the budget review, changes will be made in the program to generate new revenues. These contracts must also be renegotiated during 1992-93. Change to non-recurring (as with TALN, above).

Customized Training Director's Salary

The salary should be non-recurring. Over the next year, a plan will be developed (and at least partially implemented) to make this operation pay for itself. We cannot justify continuing to support training to individual private businesses out of general fund monies.

Financial Aid Forensic Talent Grants

Make non-recurring. All talent grants should be reviewed during 1992-93.

Employee Benefits/Tuition Waiver

I support the Budget Review Committee's recommendation that we review this program during 1992-93. Change amount to non-recurring.

Child Care Resource Connection

This grant program must be carefully reviewed and then renegotiated during 1992-93.

Institutional Advancement/Daily for Shared Governance

Omit (\$2,400). I will fund this out of my office budget.

Continuing Education - Rent

Omit (\$11,643). The paying of the rental cost for off-campus classes out of general fund (rather than by student fees) would result in curtailed offerings off-campus as college revenue problems worsen.

Addition: Student Assistants

Add the \$13,815 resulting from my recommendations (above) to "04" (part-time salaries) to employ currently-enrolled students part-time. This will help compensate for an increasingly tight local job market.

A reclassification update by Sue Colvin of Personnel will be presented to Classified Council today at its 3-5 p.m. meeting in PE 205, among other business. The meeting is open to anyone interested.

The LCC Budget Committee will meet from 6-8 p.m. tonight in the Board Room. Members will review **budget strategies** for tuition, budget request funding level, size of unappropriated ending fund balance, and establishment of a reserve for revenue shortfall account. Subcommittees also will report.

The LCC Board of Education will be asked to vote on a **tuition hike** of \$1 at its 8 p.m. meeting tonight in the Board Room. The board met Monday to thoroughly discuss the proposal which would raise tuition effective summer term to \$24 per credit hour for in-state tuition, \$89 for international/out-of-state tuition, and \$40 per credit for high school completion. The senior discount would remain at 50 percent.

The board also will vote on whether to approve a contract to Systems West Engineers of Eugene for **energy conservation design** not to exceed \$75,000; purchase a **point-of-sale system** for the bookstore in the amount of \$116,324 to MBS Systems of Columbia, Missouri, plus \$27,000 for training and related expenses; purchase **heating system boilers** from PSI/Farnes Company of Portland for \$59,619; purchase an **electromechanical filing system** for student records from Oblique Northwest of Salem for \$19,262; and purchase **microscopes** for the science department from Scientific Instrument Company of Bellevue at a price of \$1,487 each, not to exceed a total of \$41,686.

Other action items on the board agenda include approval of additional expenditure authority to manage increased **bookstore** business; authorization to increase the special revenue fund appropriation for **grants and contracts** budgeting purposes; appointment of a board member to the **federal action task force** of the Oregon Community College Association; and approval of the **chemical dependency counselor training** two-year associate of applied science degree program and the **office assistant fast track** six-month certificate of completion program.

In other business before the board, Board Member **Cindy Weeldreyer** will report on the March seminar of the Association of Community College Trustees in Washington, DC, and two videos will be shown, one on **Oregon tax structure** and another on the Oregon Community College Association 1993 **legislative agenda**.

Faculty council meets tomorrow

Faculty Council will meet on Thursday, May 14, from 3-5 p.m., in the Board Room. Action/discussion items include the ratio of full-time and part-time faculty and next year's Faculty Council.

Cost-cutting plans to be developed

Facing long-term reduced revenues for LCC, President Jerry Moskus told CED managers on Monday that he wants staff to begin developing criteria and a process for possible cutbacks. He said he'd like to have a plan in place by January, 1993. A possible cut in state support ranging from \$3 million to \$7 million for fiscal year 1993-94 has been forecast. Moskus said he wants to develop various plans for different level cuts in order to be ready for whatever happens. He wants to avoid staff cuts, but acknowledges that may not be possible. Rather than having departments share the reduction and all be weakened, he expects to eliminate whole programs as necessary. The budget for 1992-93 still looks favorable, with the state suggesting that a two percent increase is likely.

Clinton speaks to South Eugene High School students at Lane

Democratic presidential candidate Gov. Bill Clinton of Arkansas spoke live via Ed-Net with a group of about 30 South Eugene High School students at Lane on Wednesday. Thirty high schools around the state participated in the event. Lane was one of the sites able to offer both visual and audio service so that Clinton and the students could see each other as well as hear each other. Clinton was the first to appear on the Ed-Net show "Our World Today," which has invited all presidential candidates to appear.

LCC's ability to host the session was made possible by the expertise and spirit of the Electronic Services staff, who had less than a day to respond to the late-breaking request from Ed-Net in Portland. Special thanks to Dennis Mills, Audrey Stribling, Cynde Leathers, student Carrie Ivey-Cone, and all who pitched in to help.

Budget committee report

The LCC Budget Committee met prior to the board meeting on May 13 and tentatively approved the 1992-93 budget. A public hearing on the budget will be held June 10, prior to adoption by the Board of Education.

The committee voted to recommend to the board the \$1 per credit hour tuition increase, which was indeed passed by the board later that evening. The committee decided that if the tuition increase passed, the expected revenue of \$300,000 that would be generated by the increase should go into a comprehensive "hold for allocation" package. The package includes spending plans for 1992-93 in instruction, classified part-time support, and program adjustments. In addition, some monies will be held to cushion anticipated cuts in 1993-94 resulting from implementation of Measure 5.

Tuition increase approved

The LCC Board of Education passed a \$1 per credit hour **tuition increase** by unanimous vote at its May 13 meeting. The increase takes effect summer term. Tuition will be \$24 per credit hour for in-state tuition, \$89 for international/out-of-state tuition, and \$40 per credit for high school completion, and the senior discount will remain at 50 percent. Board Member Peter Sorenson expressed the sentiment of the group when he said, "Just as Dr. Moskus said at our work session on Monday, we'd rather not have tuition at all, but that's not possible given the way community colleges are funded in Oregon."

In other business, the board:

- approved the **chemical dependency counselor training** two-year associate of applied science degree program and the **office assistant fast track** six-month certificate of completion program;
- awarded a contract to Systems West Engineers of Eugene for **energy conservation design** not to exceed \$75,000
- approved purchase of **heating system boilers** from PSI/Farnes Company of Portland for \$59,619
- approved purchase of an **electromechanical filing system** for student records from Oblique Northwest of Salem for \$19,262
- approved purchase **microscopes** for the science department from Scientific Instrument Company of Bellevue at a price of \$1,487 each, not to exceed a total of \$41,686
- postponed approval of a **point-of-sale system** for the bookstore and asked for more information
- approved additional expenditure authority to manage increased **bookstore** business
- authorized an increase to the special revenue fund appropriation for **grants and contracts**
- appointed by unanimous vote Board Member **Peter Sorenson** to represent Lane on an Oregon Community College Association federal action task force

President Jerry Moskus reported that Bonneville Power Administration will help launch an environmental **energy program** at Lane, that benchmark studies show Lane is getting an increasing number of **high school graduates** due to both better marketing and changing conditions at four-year institutions, that we've experienced an **increase in grant revenue**, and that **downtown parking** has generated few complaints after the sale of 29,000 one-hour coupons to date at a cost of \$4,500 to the college. The president also reviewed the proposed reorganization of **Institutional Advancement** and hearing no disagreement from the board, said he would go ahead with that.

Ron Meyers, part-time electrical drafting instructor at Lane and owner of a computer business which submitted an unsuccessful bid for the college microcomputer requirements contract earlier this year, said if he does not receive an award letter or corrected bid tabulation, he will sue. He expressed dissatisfaction with Lane and said he intends to run for the board next year.

College Council to discuss process for budget reduction decisions

College Council meets today from 3-5 p.m. in the Board Room. President Moskus will brief the council on a joint work session with Executive Cabinet to be held May 30 or June 6. The purpose of the upcoming work session is to make recommendations on the criteria and process for making budget reduction decisions for 1993-94.

In other business, council will:

- discuss accommodations for smokers;
- review a proposed committee structure document and determine the next steps toward revision and adoption of the proposal;
- review two new proposed board policies, one on personal services contracts, and the other on procurement rules;
- continue discussion of board policy revisions, including some regarding faculty and students.

Council also will hear reports from other councils and receive a self-evaluation form to complete by May 29. The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, June 2, from 3-5 p.m., in the Board Room.

Reclassification update given

Between 55 and 60 percent of classified job description questionnaires have been completed and returned to Personnel Services, director Sue Colvin told Classified Council at its May 13 meeting. The questionnaires were issued late December, 1991, as part of a reclassification process. Original plans called for a mid-March deadline to Personnel. Colvin said she does not know what is causing the delay. Council members pointed out that delay could be occurring at any level of the questionnaire process -- employee, supervisor, or vice president. Colvin said she will try to find the sources of delay and do what she can to help. She said the Joint Review Committee is considering "how involved it wants to be" after hearing that a similar committee of the Springfield school district actually got involved in reclassification design from the beginning of the process. "The process we selected will tell us how long it's going to take," she said. The classified union has advised its employees who want to ask for a reclassification to go ahead and do so under the existing procedure.

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

Business-education agreement fuels the future of diesel technology

Representing the college were Dr. Jerry Moskus, president; Jim Ellison, vice president for instruction; Ted Kotsakis, chair, Mechanical Technologies; Alan Clark, diesel technology instructor and key author of the grant proposal; Harvey Kelm, diesel technology instructor; and Ann Clark, student counselor.

Demand for skilled labor is driven by advances in technology, a retiring workforce, growth in the heavy equipment industry and other factors, said Siebert. Caterpillar expects 6,000 new earthmoving technicians will be needed in the next five years in the US and Canada by Caterpillar dealers. This puts the pressure on the industry to recruit, retrain, and retain workers. "The best education results from industry-education cooperation," he said.

Phillips said, "At Pape', we're very pleased to participate with Caterpillar and with LCC in this project." Moskus said the college has had success with other business-education partnerships and looks forward to a good relationship with Caterpillar. Coincidentally, he said his father worked as a tool and die maker for Caterpillar in Decatur, Ill., for 25 years, and Moskus himself worked there summers as a college student.

The grant is for 1992-93. Siebert indicated a possibility of continued funding from the foundation. The Pape' officials expressed a commitment to ongoing involvement. The agreement is expected to be formally endorsed by mid-June.

LCC French instructor wins northwest title

Ginny Nelson of Eugene, French instructor at Lane Community College for 23 years, was named post-secondary Teacher of the Year for 1992 by the Pacific Northwest Council on Foreign Languages (PNCFL). She received a plaque and a \$200 check at the PNCFL conference on May 2 in Boise.

College Council report

Budget cuts in 1993-94 are not a foregone conclusion although we must plan for that possibility, President Moskus told College Council at its May 19 meeting. The council will join Executive Cabinet and the Board of Education in a work session to that end on Saturday, June 6, beginning at 8:30 a.m., at Wallace Creek camp east of Springfield off Jasper-Lowell Road.

In other business, council concluded that committee structure and a college calendar are intertwined. A meeting schedule that allows time for discussion and delivery of materials for the various college groups is desired. Council member Jay Marston and president's assistant Marie Matsen agreed to draft a college calendar and present it to council for review.

An Administrative Services proposal to change personal services contracts policy met with objection. Council member Ted Kotsakis and guests Donna Albro and Lloyd Rain agreed to further study the idea and report back to council.

Council reached no consensus on whether to raise the public bidding threshold from \$15,000 to \$25,000 and will continue discussion at its next meeting. Several other community colleges and public agencies use the higher threshold. The bid threshold is the dollar value at which formal public bidding is necessary. Its purpose is to facilitate smaller purchases and provide for greater public scrutiny of larger purchases.

A discussion on accommodations for smokers was postponed.
