The Board of Education will hold a public hearing on Wednesday, June 10, at 8 p.m., for the purpose of discussion with interested persons the budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1992 and ending June 30, 1993. The general fund is about \$48 million. A copy of the budget is available for inspection in Administrative Services.

Another perfect pass rate keeps dental students smiling

Second-year dental hygiene students all passed the National Dental Hygiene Board exam held at Lane on March 30. This year's class of one male and 20 female students scored an average 88.23 points out of one hundred and are to take the Western Regional Examining Board test in Portland June 20-24. The regional exam qualifies students for licensing in Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Utah, Arizona and Alaska.

Dental Program Hygiene Coordinator Sharon Hagan says the program is tough but attracts bright and determined students lured by a secure job market. Students must recruit their own patients as well as master a tough course load of anatomy, biology, oral roentgenology, pharmacology and other sciences while learning the techniques and procedures of dental hygiene.

Hagan says the students urgently need patients to travel with them to Portland for the regional exam. Patients should be adults with a minimum amount of fillings and whose teeth haven't been cleaned in four to five years. College Council to review agendas and issues

College Council meets from 3-5 p.m. today in the Board Room. On the agenda are the June 6 work session agenda with the Board of Education, Executive Cabinet, and College Council; accommodations for smokers; June 10 Board of Education agenda; innovative spirit at Lane; and revision of board policy concerning academic freedom and responsibility. Council is scheduled to meet again on June 16 from 3-5 p.m. in the Board Room.

Work session to be held on budget development criteria and process

A joint work session on budget development criteria and process to prepare for coming changes and possible cuts in 1993-94 and beyond will be held by the Board of Education, College Council and Executive Cabinet on Saturday, June 6, in the Cafeteria. The meeting is open.

Considered will be the existing College-Wide Goals and Areas of Focus for 1991-92 through 1994-95, the Reshaping Task Force report, planning criteria used by the vice presidents in November, 1980, and the vision paper resulting from a Sept., 1991, work session, and Oregon benchmarks, among other things. The Daily has a copy of the agenda and packet for review; call ext. 2591 for assistance.

One man's perspective: Tom Birkenhead talks about shared decision making

Tom Birkenhead talked about shared decision making at a professional development workshop for classified staff on May 28. Birkenhead served on the original Shared Decision Making Task Force in 1990.

He said that many of us at Lane still are unclear as to what shared decision making is and how it works. "We have a document," he said, referring to a report submitted by the task force to the President in January, 1992, "but what have we done with it?"

Shared decision making is the middle ground between autocracy (by managers) and free reign (by employees), said Birkenhead. He said managers can use three methods of involving employees in decisions. One is to consult employees individually. Another is to seek consensus; many people think consensus seeking is shared decision making in its entirety. A third way is the democratic process, to take polls or votes. Any method may be found appropriate depending on the decision. But in all cases, the manager still must make the final decision. "We have to have pinpoint responsibility."

Birkenhead emphasized the need for training for all staff at Lane in shared decision making. "If we were a family, we'd all be brought in together." He expressed concern that shared decision making at Lane may be encouraging compromise, which "can erode an excellent idea," and is fostering teamwork at the "at the expense of the talented individual." However, the benefits are many.

Shared decision making gets more ideas from more people; it facilitates synergy and creativity; it provides managers with a frontline perspective. People are more accepting of an idea they had a part in and when a group is involved, more errors are caught and biases avoided. Shared decision making also provides an avenue for social interaction and esteem-building, said Birkenhead.

He said we need to improve communication, both contribute to and read the Daily, perhaps define shared decision making department-by-department, and learn to govern our meetings more effectively.

Classified staff hear from the president

President Jerry Moskus discussed the state of the college with classified staff as part of a day of professional development activities on May 28. He described the continuing impact of Measure 5 and how that might affect the college. "We will have to make changes," he said, and advised listeners to the following:

- · expect a shift from local to state control; expect a focus on Oregon, not on Lane
- prepare for fluctuations in funding driven by politics
- · do more planning for contingencies
- manage your workload more efficiently; expect to serve more students without more staff; search for technological aids, other means of efficiency
- expect more of an emphasis on FTE

The president said Lane's financial future is uncertain as ever. He said the state legislature funded our tax base for 1991-92 and 1992-93 but may not continue to do so, as it is not required to do so under Measure 5. He said the Board of Education, College Council and Executive Cabinet will meet for a joint work session on June 6 to begin establishing criteria to guide the college in making cuts, should that become necessary for 1993-94 and beyond, and said there will be hearings and other avenues for all staff to contribute to the decision-making process.

Mainframe conversion making progress

Guest Jim Keizur at the May 27 Classified Council meeting said he hopes to have Financial Services, Financial Aid, Personnel, Continuing Education, Student Records and some other departments up and running on the new mainframe system by July 1. Training sessions will be offered to help people learn how to log on and off the new system and how to use it. He said if people have requests for information or help right now, they should call him and he would probably assign Bill Fletcher to calls from IBM compatible users and Thad Cowdin to Macintosh users. He said 85 personal computers from Omnitek have been installed across campus out of 130 ordered.

In other business, Classified Council heard reports about poor air quality in the Center Building and said Kay King is collecting information on that issue. Council intends to publish a list of how classified staff has used and benefited from professional development funds. It also will publish an annual report. The meeting ended with a farewell reception for Karen Bond. The next meeting is scheduled for June 24, 3-5 p.m., Shirley Perry facilitating.

Faculty Council preparing statement on full-time/part-time faculty ratio

The college should "maintain a strong majority of well-qualified, full-time contracted staff," according to a statement being prepared by Faculty Council. Council went over the statement at its May 14 meeting. The statement also contained language supporting the use of part-time staff to meet certain needs such as economy of operation or specialized skills and stated that needs vary by department. Council intends to survey departments, possibly this summer, and other faculty, probably this fall, to gather feedback, and will gather historical data on the use of part-time faculty at Lane. Linda Loft reported that Instructional Cabinet also has been discussing the issue, where department managers recommended a 25:30-75:70 ratio but met with some lack of enthusiasm from the vice presidents. Faculty Council's subcommittee will continue working on the position statement and gathering other information. Serving on that subcommittee are Maxine Frauman, Bill Griffiths, and Allan Kluber.

In other business, LCCEA President Don Micken said the college is considering changing insurance carriers and perhaps hiring just one carrier. Micken said he wants to make sure OEA Choice has a competitive chance since a majority of faculty prefer that plan.

Insurance agent of record to be recommended; but method of payment and consolidation of coverage is still in review

An agent of record for employee benefits insurance will be recommended to the Board of Education but how the agent is paid and how to consolidate coverage is still in question. Those were the results of a meeting held June 9 with members of two insurance committees and College Council attending. The meeting was called to

clarify concerns raised by College Council at its June 2 meeting.

William M. Mercer will be recommended to continue as agent of record. Mercer holds the current threeyear appointment, which expires June 30. Mercer and one other company, Johnson Benefits, submitted proposals. Mercer asked a \$3,500 monthly fee or 2 percent commission and Johnson asked a \$2,500 monthly fee or 1.35 percent commission. Although Mercer's bid was higher, members of the insurance committees told Council that Mercer's performance record, history with the college, and understanding of consolidation of coverage are likely to result in overall savings to the college. Council supported the recommendation to go with Mercer. Dick Hillier said he would like to put the recommendation to the Board of Education in July.

In the meantime, representatives of the three employee groups will meet with Sue Colvin to review how the agent should be paid and what is involved in consolidating carriers. There is a concern that allowing the agent to be paid by commission from the insurance carriers may not best serve the college. The other option is for the college to pay the agent a flat fee. Donald Micken will represent LCCEA, Jerry Sirois will represent LCCEF, and Ted Kotsakis will represent management. That group will decide if an open forum is needed in the fall to discuss

consolidation of coverage.

Summer Term Classes Begin June 22

Budget approved

The Lane Community College Board of Education unanimously approved the 1992-93 budget at its meeting on June 10. Appropriations include \$46,747,279 in the general fund. The budget represents a slim 1.6 percent increase over 1991-92. It will enable the college to serve an anticipated 9,170 full-time equivalent (FTE) student demand. This year the college budgeted for 8,865 FTE but now projects to have served 9,070.

The board also unanimously approved a 4.9 percent salary increase and three-year contract for President Jerry Moskus, who will be paid \$81,000 annually. This is about \$20,000 below the median salary paid to

presidents nationally at similar-sized community colleges.

Bid awards were approved unanimously for purchase of a vacuum air exhausting system for Mechanical Technologies auto body lab from Industrial Finishes & Systems of Eugene for \$19,555; five instructional engine lathes for Mechanical Technologies metal fabrication classes from Portland Machinery Company of Portland for \$46,950 plus authority to buy more later if funds are available; and a rotary chiller for the campus' central heating and air conditioning system as an energy conservation measure from The Trane Company of Portland for

After discussion, the board approved purchase of a point of sale and store management computer system for the Bookstore from MBS Systems of Columbia, MO, for \$116,324 plus \$27,000 for training and conversion and miscellaneous hardware with a six-to-one vote. Larry Mann voted no. Mann also cast the only no vote against the approval of an automation system for the Library from Innovative Interfaces of Berkeley, CA, for \$247,350 plus first-year maintenance costs of \$22,843 and up to \$25,000 for conversion and site preparation. Earlier in the evening, member of the audience Bob Spencer spoke against the MBS system.

Personnel matters approved on the consent agenda were appointment of Diane Dann as director of Institutional Advancement, appointment of Mark C. Harris as Substance Abuse Prevention Coordinator, appointment of Brad Joens as instructor and head track and field coach, and acknowledgment of the retirement of

Floyd Weitzel from Science.

The board approved year-end budget transfers, routine levying of taxes, and funds to cover higher than estimated costs from last summer's emergency installation of a failed chiller. The board heard a report from the Business Development Center, reviewed benchmarks on community perceptions, and acknowledged other communications. The board meets again July 8.

Leadership Abstracts, a publication of the League for Innovation in the Community College, features an article by LCC President Jerry Moskus and UO Professor Gerald Bogen in the May 1992 issue titled "Preventing

Problems in Board-President Relationships."

The article shows how a successful board-president relationship can be achieved following Lane's example. At Lane, the newly-hired Moskus brought in Bogen to help him and the board decide what their relationship should be from the outset. They engaged in a series of workshops to chart domains of responsibility and identify areas of potential conflict. In the process, case studies, the playing out of possible scenarios, and a questionnaire were used. The sessions led to consensus in the form of a responsibility matrix that has since guided the president and board and served as a basis for presidential evaluations.

The two-page treatise includes details of technique and process that should prove useful to other

Energy management program charging up at LCC

When the Northwest Power Planning Council named conservation as its primary source of electricity for the future at a predicted cost of \$7 billion by the year 2003, lights went on at Lane Community College and the Bonneville Power Administration. This means jobs requiring specialized training, the organizations realized, so they got together and designed the Energy Management Technician Program, slated to begin this fall at LCC.

The two-year associate of applied science degree program includes a sequence of courses designed to provide training in energy efficiency improvement in the commercial sector. Also included are courses in communications, math, business, computer science and building maintenance. Each student specializes in one of three areas in addition to energy management: business and marketing, facilities management, and engineering technology. Thirty-five students a year will be accepted into the program. The only other such program serving the Northwest is at Edmonds Community College in Washington.

LCC Science Instructor Allan Gubrud and BPA Conservation Engineer Ray Wiley say the energy surplus enjoyed by the Northwest in the 1980s has dwindled due to population growth, economic recovery, and environmental protection. Less costly but more labor intensive conservation is favored over new generating

resources such as coal and nuclear.

Dislocated Worker Program counts successes

The Dislocated Worker Program at Lane counted 454 majors for spring 1992. The 10 leading fields were Business Management, 40 majors; Accounting, 30; Nursing, 27; Construction Technology, 26; Auto Body, 21; Diesel Technology, 20; Recreational Vehicle Technology, 20; Auto Technology, 18; Computer Programming, 18; and Welding, 18. Majors were declared in 70 fields, plus ABE/GED.

Winter term data showed dislocated workers earned an average grade point of 3.23 on an average 11-hour load. Fifty-eight made the President's List, which requires a 4.00 GPA for 12 or more credits, and 40 made the

vice president's list, which requires 3.55-3.99 GPA for 12 or more credits.

Vice president candidate offered the job

President Jerry Moskus told College Council on June 23 that he has offered the post of vice president for Student Services to Linda Holladay and received her verbal acceptance. The Board of Education must approve the appointment. Holladay has a public school administration certificate from the University of Montana and a master's degree in career guidance and counseling from Northern Montana College. She has been director of Admissions and Records at Central Wyoming College since 1987. At Northern Montana College she held two positions: 1986-87 as director of Student Services and 1985-86 as registrar/director of Admissions. From 1982-85, she held the position of Student Services coordinator at Prince William Sound Community College in Valdez, Alaska.

Also at College Council, Linda Loft reported that Faculty Council is discussing the faculty level change

system. Don Micken said an inservice workshop on the subject will be offered in the fall.

ASLCC President Bill Hollingsworth announced that the student government has recruited social science instructor Greg Delf to serve as faculty advisor to ASLCC. Student Activities Director Barb Delansky also advises ASLCC. This is allowable under the student government constitution, said Hollingsworth. The ASLC vice president has resigned for health reasons and Hollingsworth will appoint another in the fall. An ASLCC retreat has been postponed until September. Hollingsworth has made the national dean's list of Phi Theta Kappa, the international scholastic honor society for two-year colleges.

Council again reviewed budget development principles and criteria for 1993-94 and beyond. The suggested revisions will be presented at the June 30 meeting for final approval. The criteria are due to be presented to the Board of Education on July 8. The main revision was to add a principle and a criteria about

serving diverse and historically underserved populations.

In a self-evaluation discussion, council felt that it and other councils were gradually improving and that shared decision making at Lane had made significant progress. Communications are better thanks to members of each council attending other council meetings, sharing minutes, and good coverage by The Daily. Council will continue discussing policy matters and reviewing board policies and agenda items.

Jay Marston and Marie Matsen have been working on a college calendar. Marston has met with the vice presidents on the issue. He said there at least will be a "what is" calendar available for 1992-93, and a year from now, a unified calendar that accommodates a timely information flow among councils should be in place.

Tuition hikes and program cuts forecast at community colleges

The impact of a possible 20 percent state budget cut on community colleges and four-year schools was described in a joint news conference by Community College Commissioner Dale Parnell and State System of

Higher Education Chancellor Thomas Bartlett last Tuesday.

Parnell said the state's community colleges together are facing an \$86 million shortfall in 1993-95 and will have to make it up by increasing tuition or turning away applicants or a combination of both. If tuition alone were relied upon, average annual statewide community college tuition could jump from \$920 to \$1,200 or \$1,300. At Lane, tuition would jump \$10 per credit hour from \$24 to \$34, a 40 percent increase. Lane projects a \$3 million deficit for the 1993-95 biennium.

President Jerry Moskus says a dramatic tuition hike at Lane would limit accessibility. The alternative is to cut programs and services. "Measure 5 presents us with a dilemma," says Moskus. "We can raise tuition to keep from cutting services, or we can cut services and programs to hold tuition down. Neither alternative will provide the level of access to programs that the community needs." Moskus said he is heartened that the commissioner and chancellor are working together to solve the challenges to higher education in Oregon caused by Measure 5.

The budget development process for LCC for 1993-94 and beyond is underway. Principles and criteria to

guide budget cuts will be recommended to the Board of Education on July 8. In September and October, departments will evaluate their programs as they relate to the budget development criteria and recommendations will be announced in December.

Classified Council concludes 1991-92

Classified Council met June 24 and wrapped up the year with a few announcements and continuing concerns. Sally Wilson is going off council as a representative but will remain available as an alternate. Susan Carlile will replace her. Council's annual summary is at Printing/Graphics and will be distributed next week. David Schiappa will be council treasurer for 1992-93. He also will attend July College Council meetings until a permanent representative is found. Gloria Jarvis will be the third council facilitator for 1992-93, rotating with Jill Bradley and Shirley Perry. Still needed are a recorder, and permanent reps to College Council and Faculty Council. ASLCC has asked if it could send a rep to council, an idea which met with approval.

Air quality in Center Building continues to be a source of discomfort and concern. Rosemary Busby shared that concern with College Council at its last meeting. David Schiappa recommended alerting members of

the college Safety Committee. He said SAIF or OSHA offer air quality testing and suggestions for improvement. Another continuing concern is the reclassification process. Sue Colvin has sent a memo to managers asking them to check into the delay of classified job description questionnaires that have not been turned in to Personnel. The delay could be at the employee, supervisor or vice president level. Response to the memo is unknown. Personnel plans on having a clerk hired July 1 to process the questionnaires.

Council's next meeting is July 22, 3-5 p.m., PE 205. Council tentatively agreed to hold its August meeting on the 26th at LCC at Florence to facilitate awareness of that part of the college.

Management Evaluation Subcommittee to meet

The Management Evaluation Subcommittee will be meeting during the week of July 6 to incorporate changes suggested by the Management Steering Committee to the proposed evaluation instruments. Because of the length of the document, we will not send copies to all managers until after the next round of revisions. However, anyone interested may pick up a copy of the current draft in the President's Office. Comments and suggestions are welcome and encouraged.

Grant planning meeting

There will be a planning meeting on July 7, 1992 in PE 205 at 10 a.m. to start planning for a TRIO Student Support Services grant application. All interested staff are invited to help us plan and write this grant.

TRIO Student Support Services grants are awarded to "conduct special projects that assist students to enroll in, remain in, or complete college..."
