College Council report

In its June 30th meeting, College Council discussed the July 8 board agenda, outdoor accommodations for smokers, and the innovative spirit at Lane. Council recommended adoption of two board policies, one raising the public bidding threshold to \$25,000 and one new policy governing personal services contracts. Council also discussed the Facilities Management Committee reaction to council's request for more suitable outdoor accommodations for smokers. The FMC recommends four heated shelters on campus and one shelter at Florence. Council approved the recommendation in concept, suggesting that one shelter be built on a trial basis as funds become available. The innovative spirit discussion centered on current obstacles to innovation at Lane, i.e., a lack of flexibility in resources and a relatively rigid bureaucracy that makes it difficult for new ideas to be implemented. Over the coming year, the council and administration will work on the problem of changing college operations to foster innovation. President Moskus is preparing a proposal to the board for a "seed money" fund for potential moneysaving projects. However, a remaining major problem is how to fund instructional innovation--projects that will not save money but will result in improved instruction. The next College Council meeting is Tuesday, July 14, at 3 p.m. in the Board Room.



Board report

A proposed site for a new Lane Transit District transfer station was opposed by the Board of Education at its July 8 meeting. The site could swallow up the parking lot across the street from the LCC Downtown Center. President Jerry Moskus said our students heavily use that lot and less than 20 percent ride the bus. Vice President Larry Warford said downtown staff speculate loss of that parking lot would cause a 40 percent decrease in evening continuing education enrollment. Moskus said the mix of offerings at the DTC would then have to be rethought. "We should go on record that this is unacceptable unless our parking concerns are addressed," said board member Roger Hall. The others agreed.

Linda Fossen (formerly Holladay) was appointed vice president for Student Services, effective July 27. Also appointed were Margaret Bayliss in English, Foreign Language and Speech, effective Sept. 14, and Ron K. Bertuce in Performing Arts, effective Sept. 14, both as full-time instructors. Retirements were accepted from Dal Haverland, Counseling, effective Dec. 31, 1992; Betty James, Business, effective June 13; and Dwane Miller, Health and PE, effective June 12.

Approved were a list of capital repair projects totaling about \$725,000, a joint telephone maintenance services agreement with Lane Council of Governments and its other partners with U.S. West Communications for \$29,645, the budget development criteria and process, a bid for 20 automatic door openers for disabled access to Capital City Door of Salem for \$23,097; and the raising of the threshold for formal public bidding to \$25,000 from \$15,000.

Appointed as district clerk was President Jerry Moskus. Appointed as deputy clerks were vice presidents Jim Ellison, Dick Hillier, and Larry Warford, and Financial Services Director Verne Whittaker. Board member Peter Sorenson was appointed to serve as Lane rep to the Oregon Community College Association board, and member Cindy Weeldreyer was appointed to the Lane Council of Governments board. Weeldreyer also was appointed to represent Lane along with Cottage Grove Director Don Strahan at joint site development talks among Lane, the City of Cottage Grove, and South Lane School District. Sworn in to four-year terms were members Chuck Ivey and Cindy Weeldreyer who were reelected in March. Election of board chair and vice chair was postponed due to Pat Riggs and Larry Mann's absence. Mann arrived later in the meeting.

In other business, the management employees working agreement was pulled from the agenda. Discussion was held in closed executive session at 6:30 p.m. Management Steering Committee Vice Chair Lloyd Rain said more time is needed due to a late start and that feelings on all sides are generally positive. Also pulled was discussion of the use of speaker phones at board meeting since Chuck Ivey had requested the item but had to leave early. Brief discussions were held on child care reimbursement for board members and the OCCA legislative platform and will continue at subsequent meetings. A personal services contract policy received board support.

Heceta House lease will be honored

LCC's lease on Heceta House will be honored through December 1993 and the college will be joining discussions with other agencies to determine its future, said President Jerry Moskus at the July 8 Board of Education meeting. Confusion had resulted when ownership of the house inadvertently passed from the U.S. Forest Service to the state of Oregon as an amendment to a routine U.S. Coast Guard funding bill passed by congress last year. The amendment was sponsored by Congressman Peter DeFazio and was intended to transfer ownership of the actual lighthouse only, not the keeper's residence, from the Coast Guard to the state which then intended to open it up to the public.

Meet Linda Fossen



Linda Fossen (formerly Holladay) was appointed vice president for Student Services by the Board of Education at its July 8 meeting. She succeeds Bob Marshall who is retiring after 27 years with Lane.

Linda directed Admissions and Records at Central Wyoming College in Riverton from 1987-92. She also directed Student Services and Admissions at Northern Montana College in Havre from 1985-87 and was student services coordinator at Prince William Sound Community College in Valdez, Alaska, from 1982-85. She coordinated an instruction lab at Northern Montana College from 1981-82 and taught secondary school English for six years before that.

She has a bachelor of science degree in secondary education and a master of education degree in career guidance and counseling from Northern Montana College and a public school administration certificate from the University of Montana in Missoula.

Active in community and civic activities, Fossen has belonged to the American Association of University Women, the League of Women Voters, Soroptomists International, chambers of commerce, genealogical societies, and has volunteered for social service agencies serving victims of violence and abuse.

Lane's national reputation for excellence in instruction and student services attracted the new vice president, she says. Eugene's livability was an added bonus. Well aware of the shrinking funding for higher education in Oregon wrought by Measure 5, Fossen says, "Each place I've worked has faced a major fiscal cutback. I'm comfortable in that role. It can be an opportunity."

Fossen soon will be joined in Eugene by her 15-year-old daughter, Karley, and her 11-year-old son, Kurt. Her oldest daughter, Shaney, recently graduated from the University of Montana and is working in Missoula.

JOINT CLASSIFICATION STUDY

Classified jobs at Lane are under review. The review is called the Joint Classification Study and is being conducted under the guidance of the Joint Review Committee (JRC). Four classified staff and four managers serve on the committee and are meeting every two weeks. They are

working to enable everyone involved to have input, and to ensure that the process is accurate and timely.

The study began when job description questionnaires were distributed in December. The questionnaires were to be completed by employees, reviewed by supervisors, mediated by vice presidents if necessary, and turned in to Personnel. About 100 questionnaires still are outstanding.

Job descriptions that have been returned tpPersonnel Services are being sorted into job classifications such as "security" or "food service." Temporary employee Deb Andereggen is working on this project. She has wide classification experience from both employer and union perspectives. After jobs have been sorted into groups, the JRC will appoint Subject Matter Experts (SMEs) to help write class specifications for each group. Employees and supervisors will have an opportunity to review the class specification drafts. Serving as SMEs will be classified or management staff with several years experience at a job who can provide both historical and current information about the job. If more information is needed, a "desk audit," or personal interview, may be conducted at the employee's work site by Andereggen or someone else from Personnel.

To date, classification specifications are being drafted for Security, the Library, and Archives and 11 of about 90 classifications are in written draft form. The JRC will review those 11

classifications on July 30.
