### Instructional Cabinet report

Instructional Cabinet elected **Science Dept. Chair Tom Wayne** to represent it at College Council for 1992-93. Social Science Dept. Chair Ron Mitchell served 1991-92. The appointment was made at the July 15 Instructional Cabinet meeting. Among other things at the meeting:

Cabinet reviewed the 1992-93 process for **capital outlay requests**. Dick Reid said there are two pots of capital outlay money available: state funds of about \$253,500 for professional-technical programs, and the college's general fund allocation of about \$250,000 for college-wide capital requests. Reid said all credit-instructional units are eligible to apply for the state funds since they all in some way contribute to professional-technical programs. The application deadline for state monies is Oct. 2. The application deadline for college monies will be set after budget development recommendations are made.

Advisory committee annual reports have been critiqued by Vice President for Instruction Jim Ellison. The reports are on their way to a subcommittee and then the Board of Education.

The **faculty overload policy** needs clarification, cabinet members agreed. Vice presidential approval of overload requests was proposed.

**Teaching classes by computer** is becoming a reality on Lane-NET, said Jim Ellison. Lane-NET is a channel of ED-NET that will allow local rather than long-distance calls. Working with personnel from 28 cooperating agencies are Telecourses Coordinator Cynde Leathers, Computer Information Technology Program Coordinator Linda Loft, and Cooperative Education Department Head Bob Way. Ellison said the cost to LCC might be \$4,000 a year.

The UO has proposed that Lane offer some of its classes in French and Spanish, said Ellison. The classes would be open both to UO and LCC students and would be taught by instructors laid off at the university then hired by Lane. UO facilities would be used. The proposal must be approved by the State Board Of Higher Education.

Ellison said \$150,000 has been provided for **additional class sections** for 1992-93. Demand is expected again in math, English, science and social science. Business demand seems to have leveled off.

LCC at Cottage Grove Director Don Strahan said that some people have been **registering for classes in Cottage Grove as a back-up** in case they don't get in the same class on main campus. This has artificially filled some Cottage Grove offerings. Strahan will work with Computer Services Director Jim Keizur on solving the anomaly through ClassLine.

The revived Energy Management Technician Program should receive \$200,000 a year in funding for three years or more from the Bonneville Power Administration, said Tom Wayne. Tuition will be in excess of the subsidy. He said the program already has filled its 35 slots from among 45 applicants.

Instructional Cabinet is scheduled to meet again Aug. 5 at 1:30 p.m. in the Board Room.

# **College Council report**

College Council learned about "That Pioneer Road," a play about a shortcut from the Oregon Trail into the lower Willamette Valley, at its Aug. 4 meeting. The play was written by journalism instructor Pete Peterson and it will be produced by Performing Arts in the fall of 1993 as an interdepartmental collaboration.

Council reviewed the Board of Education agenda for Aug.

12. A discussion of the Diversity Task Force was postponed until Donna Albro could attend. President Moskus proposes to change its status to that of a standing college-wide committee.

The committee structure document was again reviewed and slight revisions were suggested. Moskus said the next step is to issue a description of each of the committees and perhaps publish an annual directory of committees and their memberships.

A discussion on internal charge-backs to departments was postponed so it could be given more time. Ted Kotsakis, Lloyd Rain and David Schiappa will gather information for discussion at the next meeting. No College Council meetings are scheduled yet for the remainder of August, or for Sept.

# Financial aid applications and enrollment up

LCC reports a 33 percent increase in financial aid applications and a 11.5 percent increase in enrollment for summer term. Over 4,800 financial aid applications have been received for the 1992-93 academic year which began July 1. The college expects to process up to 8,000 applications for the year, an increase of 33 percent over last year. Financial aid applications have more than doubled since 1987-88.

Vice President for Student Services Linda Fossen says the increase in demand coincides with the conversion to the new computer system. Both have caused a delay in financial aid awards. Checks for some completed applications were disbursed three weeks late. Students who applied late and missed the filing deadlines have had to wait longer.

The crush has exhausted work-study and some grant award funds but Pell grants and loans are still available for fall, winter and spring terms. These can sometimes be disbursed retroactively for summer. Earlier this summer, the college provided emergency no-interest loans in anticipation of the increased demand. Staff are working overtime to try and catch up from the delays. "We sympathize with the students," says

Fossen. "We're concerned that we do all that we can to nepp them achieve them concerned that generating the total unduplicated credit and non-credit enrollment for summer is 6,554, an 11.5 percent increase The total unduplicated credit and non-credit enrollment for summer division credit transfer classes alone," says "We're concerned that we do all that we can to help them achieve their educational goals."

over last year's 5,876. "There is a 25 percent increase in lower-division credit transfer classes alone," says Fossen.

# New Board policy adopted

At the August Board meeting a revised Board Policy 3420, Personal Services Contracts, was adopted. Briefly, every contract for personal services in excess of \$2,500 shall be based upon screening and selection procedures developed by the college administration. All personal services contracts greater than \$25,000 shall be approved by the Board.

As a revised Board Policy Handbook is nearing completion, the policy will not be distributed, but will be included in the new Handbook. Until that time, the policy is available in the President's Office.

### New student orientations

New student orientations began August 17 and will run through September 18. They are being held Monday through Thursday at 10 a.m., 12 noon and 2 p.m. Evening orientations will be held on September 8, 10, and 15 at 5:30 p.m. Orientations will take place in Industrial Tech., room 201.

## **Bid and quotation thresholds**

The Board has approved an increase in the college's Bid and Quotation thresholds to coincide with Oregon Administrtive Rule 125. The new quotation threshold is \$2,500. Any purchase of \$2,500 or more requires at least three competitive quotations (unless the purchase qualifies under one of the statutory exemptions) and the signature of a Vice President.

Any purchase of \$25,000 or more requires the formal bidding process and award approval by the Board (with a few exceptions). Also, all quotations of \$15,000 or more must be in written form on the vendor's letterhead.

Open purchase orders may be issued up to \$14,999, and each individual purchase within a blanket PO must be less than \$1,000 (we are retaining this limit until we gain additional experience with the new thresholds); thus, any purchase of \$1,000 or more requires a separate PO. We can discuss exceptions if you believe they're warranted.

An additional note on our conversion to the new mainframe system: There is no provision for change orders within the new automated purchase order system. For the time being, Accounts Payable will pay small excesses (such as for freight) without additional paperwork. If any substantial increase of cost is desired, a new PO will be required.
