Insurance in retirement

Classified and management employees need to remember that changing insurance carriers and/or adding dependents must be done at the open enrollment prior to the date of retirement so that the insurance coverage may continue into retirement. Faculty employees must have two years of immediate prior coverage with OEA Choice before retirement to be eligible to carry their insurance into retirement. Once you retire, you cannot add a dependent or change insurance carriers.

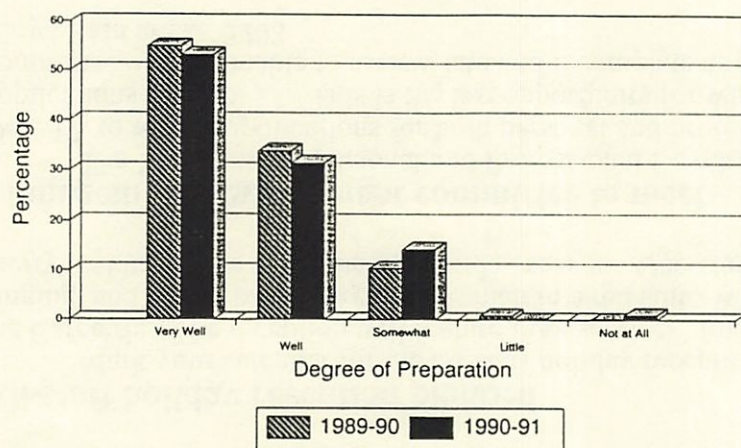

Nominators said McNair is dedicated to helping students succeed. He does whatever it takes to get the job done. "I've seen him here till six o'clock on a Friday night still working to get the computer system running for students. Next morning, he's here again, helping students register and orienting new staff," said a co-worker. Many staff as well as students have learned their Macintosh computer skills from him. Board to decide on South Lane School District proposal

The Board of Education will meet Wednesday, Dec. 9, at 7:30 p.m. in the Board Room. In preliminary business, the president will provide an LTD bus transfer site update, among other things. The consent agenda includes bid awards for the national public radio contract, a request for proposal for a computer programming consultant, and personnel appointments and retirements. The staff report will be on athletics. In old business, the board will hold second readings of policies regarding disposal of surplus property and the contractual authority of the president and may announce up to three Budget Committee appointments. In new business, the board will hold its first reading of the safety policy and take action on the budget calendar and the South Lane School District bond proposal.

The board will meet at 5:30 p.m. prior to the regular meeting to hold a work session on the South Lane proposal, the budget, and board self-study.

A team on a mission: Helping you deal with change

LCC creates bond

I am a VISTA volunteer who relocated to Eugene from Pennsylvania to work on a Catholic Community Services-sponsored project called the Peer Mentor Project.

The aim of the project is to hook up low-income persons to training programs of their choice—be they self-improvement and enhancement, academic or technical—with the help and support of mentors. Both peers and mentors are drawn from the low-income population. Together, we attempt to reduce or eliminate barriers that are part and parcel of the cycle of poverty, i.e., no job skills, low-paying jobs, no money, and eroding confidence and self-esteem.

The majority of our participants have linkages to Lane Community College because of its accessibility. Consequently, our contacts with LCC have been varied and frequent. Project participants go there for career and academic counseling, GED assessment and testing, financial aid and, not infrequently, to be absorbed by that part of humanity that the college population represents. This creates a bond, however tenuous and superficial, that keeps one from feeling isolated and alienated. T.S. Eliot put it ever so aptly when he said, "There is no life without community."

We have truly been impressed by the concern and care shown by representatives of LCC at every level. They do their job with humility and grace.

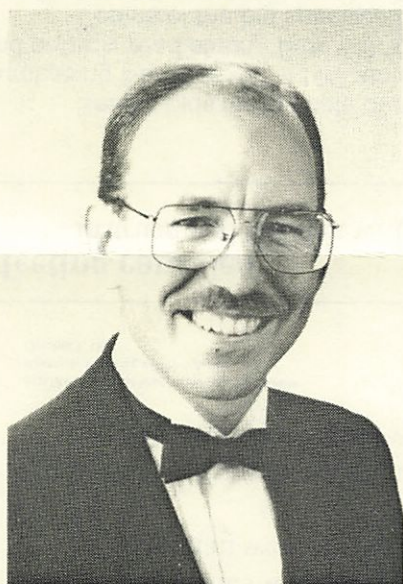

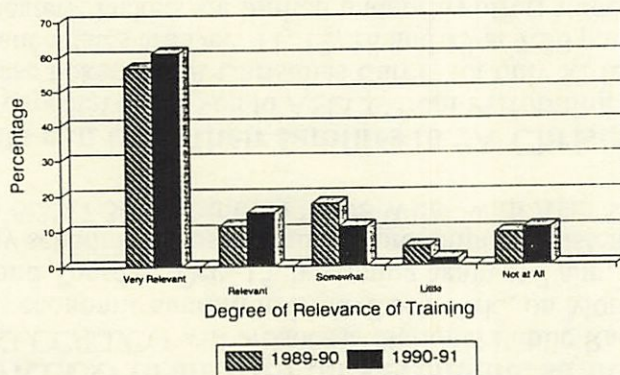

An all-staff meeting will be held Wednesday, Dec. 16, from 2-3 p.m., in Performing Arts Main Theater. Executive Cabinet officers will recap the budget situation and announce recommendations.

College Council likes South Lane School District proposal

At its Dec. 1 meeting, College Council indicated support for a proposal from **South Lane School District** and the Cottage Grove City Library that the college join a bond proposal to build a new high school campus in Cottage Grove. The campus would include a facility leased to Lane and some facilities would be shared, if the college agrees. Occupation would be in 1996. There would be no increases in services and cost would be minimal, said LCC at Cottage Grove Director Don Strahan. He said the proposal is seen as complementary to education reform in Oregon. South Lane believes the arrangement would be helpful to its students, Strahan said. In addition, market research has suggested that Lane's partnership would be seen as a plus by voters in the bond election scheduled for summer. Most council members expressed favor with the idea. The Board of Education will discuss it on Dec. 9.

Also at the meeting, President Jerry Moskus said that the **governor's mandated budget** released that morning was not the best news for Lane, but not the worst either. The mandated budget, based on existing revenue, would create a \$1.1 million deficit at Lane in 1993-94 and \$3 million in 1994-95. Her budget is a proposal subject to legislative action. The governor proposed two alternative budgets which assumed increases in taxes or new taxes.

Council heard a presentation from an ad-hoc self-formed **Transitions Team** and approved its intent to recommend transition services to help employees cope with changes at the college. Changes cited were budget reductions, computer conversion, classification study, a shift from local to state funding, and shared decision making, among others.

Nominations to the **Future Faculty Task Force** were submitted.

Council discussed a Nov. 23 work session with the Board of Education on shared decision making (see below). Jim Ellison said the session made him realize that the board's role is changing as much as anyone's. Council meets again Dec. 15.

Board and council learn more about shared decision making

A meeting unheard of at some campuses took place for the third time at Lane Community College the other night. It was a joint session of the Board of Education and College Council, a roll-up-your-sleeves and drop-your-formalities get-together on Nov. 23 in the Board Room. President Jerry Moskus observed that this kind of meeting would never happen at some colleges, where staff are discouraged from talking directly with board members. Ted Kotsakis said that once was true at Lane. Such prohibitions went out the door when shared decision making came in.

It was the impact of shared decision making on the role of the board that was the special focus of this meeting. It was facilitated by Dr. Maralyn Turner. She teaches at the University of Portland and consults with both private and public organizations.

Turner said we are building a new, participatory system on top of an old, autocratic one. We all learned the old system in school, church, work and family. It was based on an economy of volume. But the economy changed in response to global changes. The new imperative is quality, not quantity. Research shows that quality is best achieved through a participatory process.

Making this transition will draw employees from dependent to independent to interdependent behavior. They will experience denial, resistance, exploration, and finally, satisfaction. It may not work for everyone, and it will take a long time. Structure and communication are needed to guide transition. A shared decision making structure should define what decisions go through the process, because, in fact, not all decisions should or can; and how the system works must be repeatedly communicated.

There was general agreement that the old-style board doesn't fit anymore. Board members' concerns and questions varied from its risk of being a rubber-stamp board to dealing with changes beyond its control such as the funding shift from local to state to being flexible when state regulations are not to the challenges of collective bargaining. Don Micken said that until recently, "We've always felt that the board had total and final decision-making power." Turner again encouraged the college to keep clarifying its system of shared decision making and keep communicating it.

To evaluate shared decision making at Lane to date, the examples of the smoking policy decision and the current budget reduction decision-making process were discussed. Both errors and successes were found. Board Chair Pat Riggs suggested that more specific topics like these be evaluated in the context of the shared decision making process at more collaborative meetings like these. The idea received support. As Dr. Turner said at one point in the evening, "You can't ever go back now, given all that's changed already."

No students attended the meeting. Board members Chuck Ivey and Larry Mann were absent.

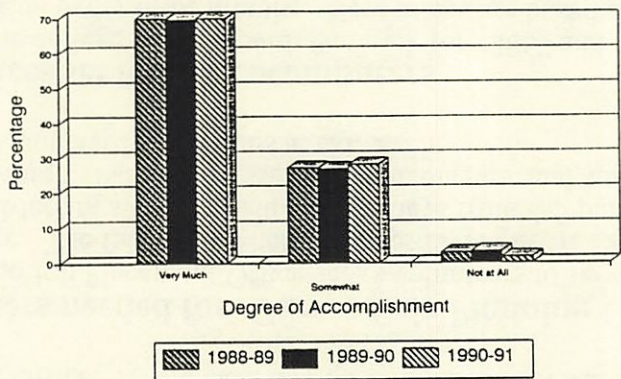

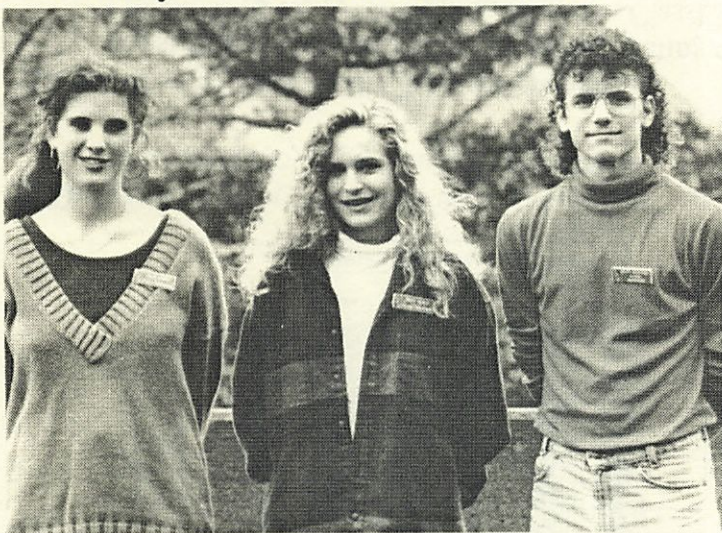

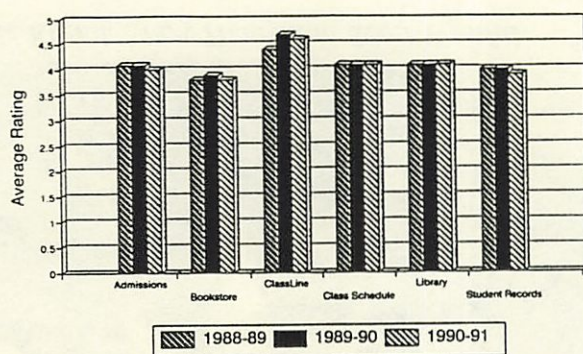

Let your fingers do the job-hunting

Lane has been selected as a test site for one of the State Employment Division's new touch-screen computer kiosks. The touch-screen computers provide information on available jobs, unemployment benefits and other services. The system will be installed winter term. Location has not been finalized but a high-traffic area is desired.

Users can obtain information by touching color images on the computer screen. A video narrator gives instructions for those who cannot read. The system offers five categories: the addresses and hours of employment offices, job-training services, unemployment benefits, available jobs and career information, and community services such as food, housing, clothing, etc. This is a pilot project funded through a grant from the U.S. Dept. of Labor.

State Employment Division plans for the near future include providing the information in Spanish and allowing individuals to use the machines to apply for jobless benefits. Later on, the state hopes to expand the system to include other state and local agencies so that users might register their vehicles or pay parking tickets by computer.

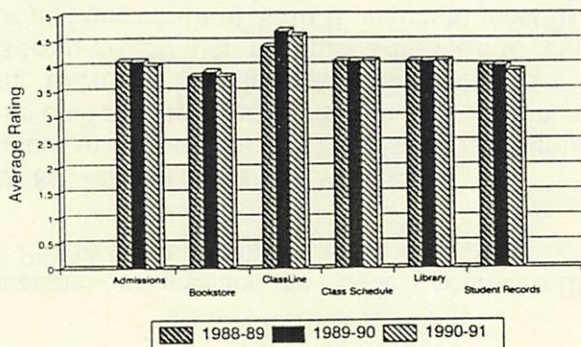

Budget recommendations detailed

Members of Executive Cabinet announced Wednesday in an all-staff meeting the first round of recommendations for possible budget cuts. The recommendations are described in a memo distributed at the meeting. Also distributed was a flyer outlining transition assistance for staff. If you need a copy of either document, contact the President's Office at ext. 2200. A brief summary of the recommendations follows.

The college anticipates a **\$1.1 million reduction in 1993-94 and \$3 million in 1994-95** if the legislature follows the governor's mandated budget. (The memo distributed at the meeting mistakenly states \$2 million for 1994-95; please note the correction.) President Jerry Moskus noted that the cuts are the first of many expected to follow and they come at a time when the college should be adding services in response to increasing community needs. The college assumes that the legislature will follow the governor's recommended budget. If it does not, Lane still could face up to \$5.5 million in reductions during 1993-94 alone. The Measure 5 revenue replacement requirement for community colleges expires after 1995-96. In addition, state equalization of funding for community colleges is expected to hurt Lane, which has enjoyed greater than average local support.

Recommendations are based on the college's **long-term vision, projected increases in demand, and probable state funding guidelines**. The "Principles" and "Budget Development Criteria" developed earlier this year closely guided the recommendations, as did information in the function sheets. Three ways of making up the deficit were proposed: budget adjustments and reallocations, revenue enhancements, and function reductions.

Budget adjustments and reallocations include removing restrictions from some fee revenue, and anticipated savings from changing medical insurance carriers.

Revenue enhancements include a tuition increase of \$1 per credit hour for 1993-94 with corresponding increases in non-credit tuition. Further hikes are likely. In spite of this, Lane tuition would remain relatively low compared to other Oregon community colleges. Also, reimbursement to cover students referred to the Adult High School program by district public schools is anticipated.

Program /function reductions make up the balance. More than half are from position vacancies. Specific program /function reduction recommendations follow.

It was recommended that the college no longer fund primary health care for students, but that **Student Health Services** continue to provide basic emergency and referral services. Students may consider restoring the cut services through a student fee as once was the case at Lane. The college estimates such a fee would be about \$8 per student per term to match current services. Net savings from eliminating primary health care from general fund support will be approximately \$155,000.

It was recommended that a currently vacant **Counseling** position be eliminated. Counseling is looking to technology, redesign of service delivery, and grant funding to make up the position loss. Net salary and related savings from eliminating the counseling position will be approximately \$65,000.

It was recommended that general funding for **KLCC** be reduced. The station historically has been funded through a variety of sources including listener donations, underwriting, public radio and foundation grants. Net savings in 1993-94 from reducing KLCC will be approximately \$10,000.

It was recommended that two currently vacant **Community Education** management positions be eliminated. This will result in a net savings of approximately \$120,000.

It was noted that the reorganization of **Institutional Advancement**, which resulted in the elimination of one management position, will result in a net savings of approximately \$10,000.

It was recommended that the currently vacant third shift operator position in **Computer Services** be eliminated. This will result in a net savings of approximately \$35,000.

It was recommended that a vacant management position in **Financial Services** be eliminated. This will result in a net savings of approximately \$30,000.

It was recommended that certain faculty positions already vacant be eliminated: one in **Physical Education** for a net savings of approximately \$56,000, and one in **Business** for a net savings of approximately \$54,000.

"While all budget reductions are painful," says the Cabinet memo, "we believe the recommendations will allow us to realize our future goals and **meet increasing demand with the least impact on students and employees.**

The next step in the budget reduction process is to hold open hearings. They are scheduled for Jan. 11 at 1:30 p.m. and Jan. 12 at 8:30 a.m., locations to be announced. Initial recommendations will be presented to the Board of Education on Jan. 13. The board will hear final recommendations on Feb. 10.

Transition assistance available

Also at the all-staff meeting on Wednesday, Vice President for Student Services Linda Fossen said that the Transitions Team is planning recommendations to **help staff cope with the budget reductions.** A flyer was distributed listing what's in the works. Recommended are career and life planning services, job search workshops, retraining and outplacement assistance, personal development services, financial counseling, and general layoff information. Many of these services already exist. The Transitions Team meets again Dec. 17 from 2-3 p.m. in PE 205. Anyone may join the team at any time. There is no official chair, but for more information, contact Fossen at ext. 2315.

JOINT CLASSIFICATION STUDY

Personnel Services and members of the Joint Review Committee continue to work with classified employees on the Joint Classification Study. Approximately 340 positions have been reviewed. The JRC meets every two weeks to review the drafts of class descriptions. Some updates:

The office and administrative support group held its first Subject Matter Expert meeting to begin work on this large family of positions on Nov. 24.

The data processing class descriptions are still undergoing review by their SME group, which meets again Dec. 17.

An open meeting was held with employees from custodial, laundry, grounds, health and physical education, on Dec. 11.

Two open meetings were held with employees from child development and parent and provider workshops on Dec. 9 and 15.

There are still some job description questionnaires which have not been completed by employees and/or managers. Board takes first step in South Lane partnership

A proposal from South Lane School District to build a new high school, city library and LCC branch facility received concept approval from the LCC Board of Education at its Dec. 9 meeting with a vote of 5 to 1. Larry Mann opposed the proposal saying that he approved such partnerships in general but that Lane should be seeking arrangements districtwide, not just in Cottage Grove. Chuck Ivey was absent.

In other action, the board approved unanimously:

- an as-needed **computer programming services contract** to Software Designs of Redmond, Wash., not to exceed \$50,000 per fiscal year for 1992-93 and 1993-94;
- contract renewal and affiliation with **National Public Radio** for 1993 for \$97,017;
- board policy revision to allow use of an outside service for **surplus property disposal**;
- revised board policy to clarify the **contractual authority of the president**;
- new board policy on **safety**;
- **budget calendar** for 1993-94, with board members asking for earlier receipt of budget information;
- appointments of **Kathryn Reid**, Student Health nurse, effective Nov. 13, **James Wychules**, Food Services manager, effective Dec. 14; and retirement of **Joyce Kofford**, Student Services, effective Jan. 31;
- appointment of John Hamilton of Junction City to the **Budget Committee**.

Harland Yriarte and Bob Creed delivered a staff report on **athletics**. The board expressed support for athletics and sympathy for the cuts the department has undergone over the years but did not recommend additional general fund support.

President Jerry Moskus reported that Lane is the first choice for a proposed regional **public safety training center**. The interagency proposal has been in development for some years. Police, fire, 9-1-1, EMT and corrections training would be offered through Lane under the proposal. The board supported the idea. In other statements, Moskus said:

- **tuition from international students** totaled \$925,000 last year, or 5.3% of total tuition revenue from 3 percent of the students;
- classes will not be held **Martin Luther King Day**, Jan. 18, so staff may attend in-service;
- 63 percent of the children in the Child Development Center are **children of student parents**, up from 30 percent a year ago;
- Lane may receive \$900,000 in federal funds for its **aviation maintenance program** through Sen. Mark Hatfield's office, thanks to the efforts of Larry Warford and others;
- the old **mainframe computer** sold for \$1,111;
- the state is considering merging community college and workforce offices into a single **Department of Workforce Development and Community Colleges**;
- **Lane Transit District** favors the McDonald Theater site across from the LCC Downtown Center for a new terminal; lost parking may be made up via a new parking garage; an environmental assessment is next;
- Benchmarks show a decrease in our **student retention rate**; after the budget, this should be our first priority, said Moskus.

In other discussion, attorney Tim Harold advised Roger Hall that his marital status to an LCC instructor will not prohibit him from taking part in non-financial faculty contract negotiation issues.

The next regularly scheduled board meeting is Jan. 13.

Art Department Gallery will feature instructor's work

"Craig Spilman—Recent Work" will show at the Art Department Gallery from Jan. 4-22. The show consists of drawings, intaglio prints, and oil paintings. Spilman will lecture on his work on Thursday, Jan. 14 at 10 a.m. in the gallery, thanks to ASLCC sponsorship. A reception for the artist will follow the lecture at 11:30 a.m.

All the work in this show is based on the image of a house. Spilman has been working with this theme for several years. His houses suggest much more than just a building. Like poetry, they allude without being specific. "Houses tell a story," he explains. "They suggest human activity without a human form. For me the house images have a nostalgia that is pleasant, mysterious, implying the unknown...and there is something about loneliness in them...A house is a witness to whatever has occurred both inside and around it: personal histories, war, the passage of time." Spilman considered using human figures in the house paintings, but he decided that the simplicity of the single image was more powerful. There is only one human form in one of the prints.

Spilman nearly cut off one of his fingers recently while chopping wood. A student asked him, "What would you do if it had been on your right hand?" Spilman replied "I would have learned to draw and paint with my left hand very quickly."

It's the word quickly that tells a lot about him. Spilman can't remember a time in his life when he didn't draw. His mother encouraged him to draw when he was very young. He eventually completed his master's in fine arts at the Instituto Allende in Mexico following his bachelor's at San Francisco State. He has taught at Lane since 1971, after teaching at Maude Kerns Art Center for four years and at the Instituto Allende for one year. Spilman has exhibited extensively throughout Oregon and in Hong Kong, Australia and California. His finger is healing nicely.

More on President-elect Clinton's educational reforms

At the annual conference of the National Council for Resource Development in Washington, DC, attended by Grants Coordinator Sarah LaMaster, a legislative update session included an overview of President-elect Bill Clinton's plans for educational reform. At the session, Bob Shireman, legislative aid to Senator Paul Simon, described his interpretation of the Clinton-Gore plans for education drawing from campaign rhetoric.

Mr. Shireman divided the education reform agenda into five areas: (1) "Second Chance" programs, such as the youth opportunity core, dropout prevention programs, and youth opportunity centers; (2) School-to-work programs, such as youth apprenticeships and tech-prep type programs; (3) Workplace training; (4) Displaced worker programs; and, (5) National service programs, tied to student loan repayment.

He said that Congressional staffers and members of the Clinton transition team were all struggling to figure out how Clinton will implement his campaign promises for educational reform. They are looking at existing programs and appropriations and no-cost avenues as well as new programs and new money. Whatever the Clinton administration chooses to do, they will have to contend with the Budget Enforcement Act, passed in October 1990, which stipulates a "pay-as-you-go" policy with overall caps on spending. Even if Clinton can implement changes in the budget rules, he will still be constrained by the issue of deficit reduction.

The Grants Library now has on file a copy of one of Clinton's speeches on education and excerpts from the Clinton-Gore plan for education and for accommodating the Americans With Disabilities Act. Call Sarah LaMaster, ext. 2312.



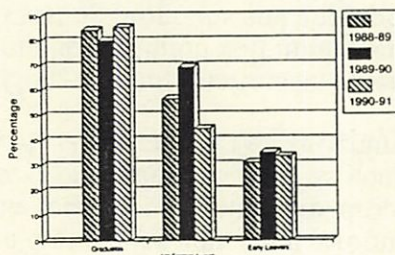

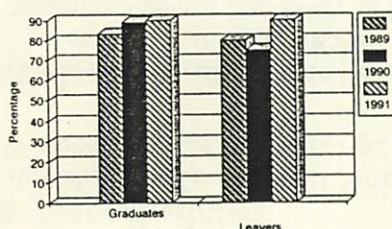

Springfield woman wins \$1,500 scholarship

While in high school, Horner was involved in accounting, competed in volleyball, lettered in track, participated in Teens Against Drug and Alcohol Abuse, was named to the National Honor Society, and was a senior homecoming princess.

Faculty Council finds staffing balance affected by variables

Faculty Council met Dec. 10 and continued discussing how to assure that an appropriate balance of full-time to part-time faculty be maintained at the college. Two events have raised the issue: the hiring of extra part-time faculty in some departments over the last couple of years to meet enrollment growth, and the fact that by the year 2000, 60 percent of the current faculty will have retired.

At Thursday's meeting, council members compared information from their departments about the full-time:part-time ratio. They discovered that there are many ways to figure the ratio and many variables, for example, headcount vs. FTE, and how to count contracted faculty who are part-time by personal choice. It was concluded that current board policy reflects the appropriate sentiment of maintaining a majority of full-time faculty, and that refinement such as defining that majority numerically would require a standardized method of collecting and comparing data.

Council reviewed results of its last brainstorming session on what issues it should be working on. Fifteen issues were named. Among the leading issues were the future of LCC; classroom and resource allocation; the interplay of accessibility, quality and affordability; technology in education; the balance of transfer, professional-technical, continuing education, and basic education; education reform in Oregon; and professional development.

Faculty Council's next scheduled meeting is Thursday, Jan. 14, from 3-4:30 p.m. in the Board Room.

College Council report

College Council again discussed internal chargebacks at its Dec. 15 meeting. Of particular interest was that some departments use chargebacks to cover salaries that are not otherwise covered by the college general fund, such as in Printing/Graphics. It was noted that chargebacks are symptomatic of larger policy issues such as prohibiting use of outside vendors for some services. President Moskus and his assistant Marie Matsen will examine college policies that affect internal chargeback practices and report back to council.

Like Faculty Council, College Council struggled with what issues it should be addressing. Need for a clearer vision was expressed but some confusion resulted about what constitutes vision. Moskus noted that the impact of Measure 5 also has added to the confusion. It was agreed that vision means a picture of the future, and a picture of the college as a whole. Discussion will continue.

The next regularly scheduled meeting is Tuesday, Jan. 5, 1:30-3 p.m., in the Board Room.

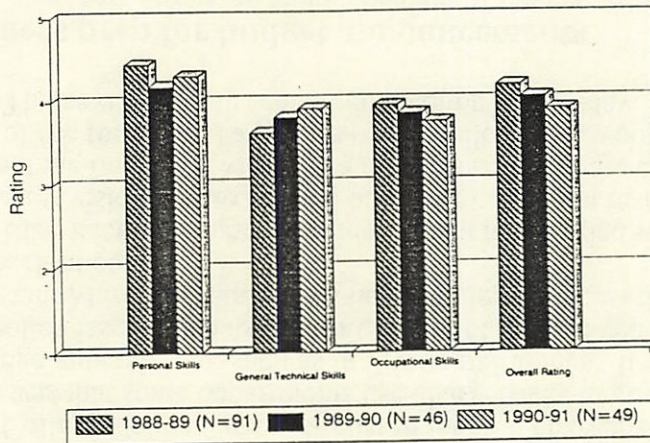
Managers prep for budget announcements

Managers discussed announcement of budget reductions at the Dec. 11 Managers Forum. Germaine Mock described the bumping procedures for classified employees. Managers who went through budget reductions five years ago shared their experiences of helping staff affected by reductions.

During the second half of the meeting, President Moskus led a discussion of an article on high performance work systems. The discussion focused on how to break down the conflict that arises in an organization like Lane where both loosely organized work teams and tightly controlled hierarchies exist and must interact with each other. The next Managers Forum is scheduled for January 15, 8:00 to 10:00 AM. The agenda includes review of important board issues, information on 1993-94 budget project requests, and Americans with Disabilities Act training provided by a consultant.

Roger Bassett named new commissioner

The State Board of Education on Friday named Roger Bassett as commissioner of Oregon community colleges. Bassett, now director of government relations for the State System of Higher Education, will begin his new job in January.

He replaces Dale Parnell who resigned Sept. 15 to teach at Oregon State University. Debbie Lincoln, another finalist for the post, is serving as acting commissioner. The third finalist was Clatsop Community College president Doreen Dailey.

Bassett, who will report to the Board, will be chief executive officer of the state agency responsible for the governance of Oregon's 16 community colleges. In his present position, he represents the State System of Higher Education before the legislature and advises the chancellor, governor and university and college presidents. For nearly nine years he was executive secretary of the Oregon

Community College Association. He holds a bachelor's degree in political science and a master's degree in public administration from the University of Washington.
