Closure questions answered in operations manual

There's been a lot of confusion the past week over closures and late starts because of bad weather. Following is the official policy on closures in the Business Operations Manual:

• When the college is officially closed, all bargaining unit members, part-time credit instructors, and management employees scheduled to work will be paid as if they worked.

• If you are required to work when the college is officially closed, you are entitled to time off with pay on a straight-time basis.

• If you schedule leave on a closure day, your leave account will be charged as originally scheduled.

Hourly employees are paid only for hours they actually work.

• If the college officially closes after work has started, eligible employees receive leave with pay for the remainder of the work day.

• If you are scheduled to report to work before a closure is announced, but have not reported at the time of the announcement, you may take personal leave, vacation leave, compensatory time, or leave without pay for hours not worked before the closure, as approved by your

• If you choose to come to work late or leave early because of bad weather, you may take leave without pay, vacation leave, personal leave, or compensatory time, as approved by your supervisor.

• If you choose to work all or part of your schedule during an official closure, you receive no additional pay or time off.

The college was officially closed on Dec. 30, 1992. If you have any questions, consult the BOM, "S-5, Emergency Plan," or check with Personnel.

Meet King Provenmire



H. Kingsley Provenmire joined the Flight Technology Department faculty this fall. He came to Lane from America West Airlines in Phoenix, AZ, where he worked as a systems instructor. His aviation background includes positions as research psychologist for the University of Dayton Research Institute in Higley, AZ, training advisor for the US Coast Guard Aviation Training Center in Mobile, AL, and head of research flight operations for the University of Illinois Institute of Aviation in Savoy, IL. He also has consulted in aviation safety and flight training. As of joining Lane, Provenmire had logged more than 7,000 flight hours, 1,000 multi-engine flight hours, and 5,000 flight instruction hours.



itself with man and machine design, and he belongs to the Association of Aviation Psychologists.


What does he like best about his new job? "I get to fly. And I get to work with the leading edge of learning."

Closure questions and answers

The recent siege of snow closures has uncovered some areas of confusion for students and staff. Here are answers to some of the most frequently asked questions. Instructors, please share this with your students if possible.

Q How do we know for sure that the college is closed?

A When the decision is made to delay classes or close the college, the college immediately notifies 10 TV and radio stations, including KLCC. This could happen any time during the day; however, early morning closure decisions are made and reported to the media by 6 a.m. If the stations are not reporting a closure, you should assume the college is open.

Q Should staff report for work?

A When the college is closed or classes are canceled, staff should not report to work unless specifically directed to do so by the media or their supervisor.

Q What do delays mean?

A If the opening of the college is delayed until a certain time, for example, 10 a.m., all classes and other activities scheduled to begin before 10 a.m. are canceled that day. This cancellation would include all classes that *begin* before 10 a.m. even if the class is scheduled to continue past 10 a.m.

Lane employee brought Anne Frank exhibit to Eugene

Norm Campbell, an instructor in the Dislocated Worker Program at Lane, is the dedicated volunteer who brought the internationally renowned Anne Frank exhibit to Eugene. Titled "Anne Frank in the World, 1929-1945" the exhibit opened Jan. 4 at the First United Methodist Church at 1376 Olive Street in Eugene and will run through Feb. 1. Hours are 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Mondays, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesdays through Fridays, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturdays, and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Sundays. Admission is free.

Campbell visited Anne Frank's hiding place in Amsterdam 20 years ago. The visit had a lasting impression. When he discovered that the Anne Frank exhibit was booked for Portland last November,

he decided to see if he could get it to Eugene.

After two attempts at trips to visit exhibit's owner, the Anne Frank Center in Amsterdam, he finally made it last spring. The only opening for 1992 or 1993 was this January. Normally requiring 18 months of preparation time, Campbell had only seven months to do it. In that time he recruited three major sponsors, a steering committee of 10, and 200 volunteers.



"Nobody knew who I was," he said of his fundraising challenges. He had no specific political or religious agenda to fill; he simply wanted Anne Frank's message to reach more people. For that, he won support.

Fundraising publicity this summer caught the attention of Jerry Seifert and Patrick Torelle of Performing Arts. They thought it would be a good time to do "The Diary of Anne Frank." Only later on did the men discover that they all worked at LCC. The play is sold out but efforts are underway to book additional performances (see next page).

Campbell joined Lane in July as a part-time training specialist in Training & Development at LCC in Cottage Grove. He went full-time in October when he moved to main campus to teach career

and life planning in the Dislocated Worker Program.

Women and part-time students show gains in college enrollment

The National Center for Education Statistics of the U. S. Department of Education Office of Educational Research and Improvement reports that enrollments in two-year colleges increased an estimated 5.3 percent from fall 1990 to fall 1991. This number compares with an increase of only one-half percent in total enrollment in four-year colleges and universities. At two-year colleges, the increase in enrollment by women was 5.9 percent and by men was 4.5 percent. The statistics also indicate that the largest enrollment increases at two-year colleges are for part-time students -- an increase of 7.8 percent--compared to the enrollment increase for full-time students of only 1.7 percent. For nearly all levels of degrees conferred, women show greater gains than men. These numbers reflect national trends toward more women pursuing and completing college education and more part-time students enrolling. A copy of the full report is on file in the Grants Library. Community-wide committee will propose use of housing funds

Last October, Lane learned that it would receive \$1.9 million over five years in a lawsuit settlement against two developers of student housing. The developers built the Ashlane Apartments in Springfield in the 1970s. The lawsuit was filed by the state attorney general and mandates that the funds be spent on student housing. Vice President for Student Services Linda Fossen recruited a 19-member community-wide committee called the Ashlane Housing Task Force to establish a plan for Lane. They began meeting in November and are looking at the options of building low-cost housing or providing stipends to students.



BOARD REPORT

Three ballot measures regarding student fees proposed by ASLCC were submitted too late for the Jan. 25 LCC Board of Education meeting agenda and the board deferred them to February. Nonetheless, several students present at the meeting went ahead and stated opposition to the measures. The measures would put to student vote whether to reallocate to student health services portions of the student fees currently going to the ASLCC general budget and to the child care co-op, and whether the OSPIRG fee should be made optional.

The annual evaluation of LCC President Jerry Moskus conducted prior to the 7:30 p.m. meeting won him high praise. Chair Pat Riggs said, "We evaluated him in eight areas including personnel management, president-board relations, community relations, fiscal management, planning, academic leadership, service to students and facilities management." She said they were especially pleased with "his open door policy, his walk-around management style, and his efforts to network with the community." Contract and salary negotiations were not part of the evaluation.

Moskus updated the board on a variety of matters: Roger Basset was named community college commissioner following Dale Parnell who left to teach at OSU. A house built by construction technology students for St. Vincent de Paul is located at Fifth and M Streets in Springfield and is open for tours from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. weekdays. The college has exceeded it's goal to reduce the use of herbicides on campus. A study into cooperative agreements with the U of O revealed at least 75 arrangements.

The board devoted about an hour to a walk-through of the 1991-92 audit report. Staff will issue its routine response to the audit management letter by the next meeting. The board unanimously approved the audit report.

The board unanimously approved advisory committee appointments for KLCC and Flight Technology. Reappointed to the Budget Committee were Trish Rosewood and Sally Weston. The college safety policy was approved.

The discussion on budget recommendations began at 10 p.m. and went about an hour. Chuck Ivey and Larry Mann left before the discussion concluded. The remaining board members gave consensus support to the college that it was on the right track with the recommendations under the painful circumstances of financial uncertainty. Moskus said that the recommendations represented at least 1,000 hours of staff time and included numerous opportunities for staff involvement campuswide. Roger Hall said, "These cuts are responsible" and follow the criteria and principles drafted by and agreed to by board and staff at the beginning of the budget reduction process.

The meeting adjourned at 10:55 p.m. The next meeting will be Feb. 10.
