

Prescription drug benefit available with Managed Care Network

The Managed Care Network HMO plan contains a prescription drug benefit. This benefit is subject to a \$100 deductible after which 80 percent of the next \$2,500 of prescription drug expense is covered. Prescription drug expenses in excess of that amount will be reimbursed 100 percent. You may receive the benefit in one of two ways:

If you have your prescription filled at one of the Managed Care Network participating pharmacies (see pages 85-87 of the provider directory), the pharmacy will track your experience, monitor the satisfaction of your deductible and collect from you, at the time of service, only the 20 percent of the cost of the prescription which is your responsibility

after your deductible is met.

2. If you have your prescription filled at a pharmacy which is not a participant in the Managed Care Network, it will be your responsibility to pay the full price of the prescription at the time of service and seek any reimbursement for any benefit due you. In order to receive this reimbursement it will be necessary that the PCS Prescription Drug Claim Form be completed in conjunction with the pharmacist at the same time the prescription is filled. This is the only method by which reimbursement will be made. You will need one of these forms for each member of your family.

**Classified Council report** 

Classified Council heard a union update from representative Alen Bahret at its Jan. 27 meeting. Business discussed at the last two LCCEF meetings included nominations for election of delegates, information about medical premium co-payment and job classifications. Regarding progress of the joint classification study, he stated 366 positions and 93 classes have been reviewed, and another 40 positions and ten classes remain. The union plans to open the contract for wage negotiations in March, but bargaining is contingent upon completion and final approval of the class system by President Moskus and LCCEF. Alen urged employees who wish to voice opinions regarding classifications to do so as soon as possible.

In other business, Council discussed a proposal from Julie Baker to create a **special insurance premium fund** to help employees who may be in the position of needing to pay their insurance premiums out of disability leave. After lengthy discussion, council, although in full support, decided the proposal was not within its power to undertake and planned to forward the matter to College Council. Classified Council will continue to be a forum and will revisit the issue at future meetings.

Other topics contemplated for future discussion include the **impact of additional part-time instructors** and of students on classified staff. In departments such as Financial Aid and the Bookstore, staff are especially affected by the increase of students as it often necessitates extra hours.

• The consent agenda includes the next bid award in the college's energy conservation program, this one to Honeywell of Beaverton for purchase of a building management and control system in the amount of \$199,248; a request by KLCC to apply for a \$6,952 grant from the Meyer Memorial Trust to fund a new radio program called "Improve Your Work Life" (the trust requires board approval); and the resignation of Vice President Richard Hillier effective April 2.

Staff reports will be given on the Energy Management Program and the Americans with

Disabilities Act.

• Business affairs will include action on the president's annual authorizations of various contracts and purchases, and a review of the administration's response to the annual audit report.

New business will include action on the elimination of the old board policy on student health services, action on the 1993-94 academic calendar, discussion on the role of the Budget Committee, discussion of an interagency proposal to develop a high school football site at Lane, and discussion on establishing contract provisions for the president.

The next regularly scheduled board meeting will be March 10.

**College Council reports**

Council meetings.)

College Council began work on an institutional vision statement at its Jan. 26 meeting. Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts, Diane Dann and Marie Matsen presented some food for thought on the issue. They said two steps need to be taken: develop a statement and identify issues and trends. They pointed out that components of the college vision already exist, including the unifying principles, budget principles and criteria, President Moskus' in-service speech, and others. They advised bringing in a futurist speaker to help inform the college about trends, and perhaps forming trend groups to track the issues and how they impact Lane. After discussion, council members agreed to sketch out their own definition of a vision for the college and bring it to the Feb. 16 meeting.

Also at the Jan. 26 meeting, council reviewed a revision of the surplus property procedures in the Business Operations Manual. Some difference of opinion remained as to whether revenue from the sale of surplus property should go the general fund or to departments. President Moskus directed the committee previously assigned by council to study the issue to meet again and reach consensus.

At the Feb. 2 meeting, College Council reviewed the board agenda for Feb. 10. They also discussed three ASLCC referendum proposals that would reallocate fees currently collected for the child care co-op, ASLCC, and OSPIRG to Student Health Services. Other items on the council agendas were not discussed due to lack of time. The next College Council meeting is set for Tuesday, Feb. 16, from 3-5 p.m. in the Board Room.

An example of an inappropriate use of letterhead would be a letter endorsing an individual or company soliciting business (such as selling insurance or offering financial or retirement planning services). - Marie Matsen, President's Office

**Board** report

The LCC Board of Education met Feb. 10 and voted 5-2 to declare its intent to eliminate general fund support for Student Health Services primary care in 1993-94. Opposing the intention were Chuck Ivey and Larry Mann. The declaration of intent is not a final decision. Final decisions will be made in the annual budgeting process. The declaration enables the college to notify employees who might get laid off, in accordance with employee contracts.

Several board members said they hoped an alternative way to fund primary health care services is found, such as through a student fee. A \$6.50 per student per term fee would work, said Student Health Services Director Sandy Ing. Board member Cindy Weeldreyer noted that primary health care services originally were student-funded. She also said that one student-

supported program should not be pitted against another, as had been proposed by three recently withdrawn ASLCC referendums.

The board accepted the resignation of Vice President for Administrative Services Richard Hillier who is leaving to become dean of finance and administration for Hudson County Community College in Jersey City, New Jersey, effective April 2. He has been with Lane since 1987. President Jerry Moskus said, "His leaving is a real loss. He has played tough roles here on our financial roller coaster, Measure 5, and breaking in a new president." Hillier said Lane is a truly great place to work and study, but we often forget that, and we forget to give praise. "Some of your best people are the ones you never see," he told the board.

In his report, President Jerry Moskus said administration is looking at restructuring as the next step in the budget reduction planning. He also said total quality management, or continuous quality improvement, will begin in the President's Office with some changes to office procedures. He noted that Lloyd Rain and Ed Case in Purchasing are producing a new statewide purchasing newsletter.

In other business, the board:

• Awarded a contract in the amount of \$199,248 to Honeywell, Inc., of Beaverton, for purchase

of a building management and control system, as an energy conservation measure;

• Approved a grant application by KLCC to the Meyer Memorial Trust for \$6,952 to fund a radio program called "Improve Your Work Life," as required by the grant application;

• Heard a staff report on the **energy management technician program** from Science Department Chair Tom Wayne and program instructor-coordinator Roger Ebbage;

Acknowledged information on the American with Disabilities Act;

Authorized the president to pay miscellaneous recurring budget expenses;

Acknowledged administration's response to the annual audit management letter;
Adopted the academic calendar for 1993-94;
Discussed the role of the Budget Committee and agreed to hold an orientation meeting on March 2 at 6:30 p.m. in the Board Room;

• Asked for more information on a proposal from School District 4-J and the City of Eugene to build a high school football stadium at Lane;

Authorized members Pat Riggs and Peter Sorenson to negotiate the president's contract;

• Endorsed the concept of a light rail transit proposal for Eugene-Springfield.

The board next meets on March 10.

# Betty Anne Holden of Florence wins award



Betty Anne Holden, LCC at Florence's senior programs coordinator, won an Award for Cooperation by a Community Member by the Oregon Community Education Association at its annual convention on Feb. 4 at Salishan Lodge on the beautiful (naturally) Oregon coast.

Holden coordinates the Elderhostel program at Florence. Elderhostel provides educational opportunities at locations around the world for people 60 and over. The success of the Florence program "is greatly attributed to Betty Holden's enthusiasm, dedication, and joy of life," says LCC at Florence Director Bill Porter. "She is such a dynamo of energy, dedication and performance that she serves as a marvelous role model not only to her peers but also for younger persons."

Elderhostel is not supported by college funds. Holden has developed partnerships with local coastal communities, businesses and government agencies to acquire resources, expert lecturers and discounts on food, lodging and services which have allowed LCC to

offer the program. This has boosted the local economy as well.

Holden also has developed the Coastal Elderclass program, a senior studies educational format that uses peers as volunteer instructors, and Outward Ventures, a program utilizing college buses and vans to transport local senior residents on field adventures. This is the only program of this nature in the area.

FTE explained

What is student FTE? It's a way of measuring student attendance for purposes of obtaining state funding. At Lane, it generally takes between 3.5 and 4 individual students to create one FTE (full-time

equivalency) student.

How is student FTE computed? There are two ways to calculate FTE: (1) For transfer courses, multiply the number of students times the number of credit hours, per term, divided by 45; (2) for all other types of courses including professional-technical, developmental education and continuing education, multiply the number of students times the number of clock hours per week times the number of weeks in the term, divided by 680. Note that fall term has 12 weeks and winter and spring terms have 11 weeks each.

In 1991-92, Lane served 9,097 FTE. This year, we will provide courses to about 9,100 FTE. During the 1980s "FTE depression", Lane served a low of 7541 FTE in 1987-88. Any more student FTE questions? 
Students to rally in Salem



# Tracking former students

Each year the office of Research, Planning and Evaluation surveys former Lane students. Some results from the 1990-91 survey:

• Over 70% of all self-declared transfer students were attending a university or college.

• About 80% of the transfer respondents attending a college or university reported Lane

prepared them "well" or "very well" for classes at their transfer institution.

• Over 75% of professional-technical graduates overall reported their jobs were in a field related to their Lane studies and training.

· Conversely, a majority of professional-technical students who left early or without graduating

indicated their job was not related to their studies.

• Graduates (especially professional-technical majors) earn higher incomes immediately after leaving Lane than do those who do not graduate. Employment data indicate graduating provides an advantage in terms of finding a job, finding a job related to interests, and immediate earning power.

• Students who left Lane early did so because they experienced financial problems, lost financial aid, or transferred. Professional-technical leavers were more likely to have suffered financial problems or to have lost financial aid than lower division transfer leavers.

Manager's Forum report

Criteria for restructuring the college was the main agenda item at the Feb. 12 Manager's Forum. To introduce the subject, President Moskus said he was looking at restructuring as a way to contain costs and to address changes in the college's external and internal environments. Some of these changes include: statewide educational reform, the new Americans with Disabilities Act, new financial aid regulations, the continuing flow of dislocated workers and increasing numbers of older, part-time students interested in evening and weekend classes, distance learning, lifelong learning, and increasing reliance on state funding as Measure 5 is phased in. He would like the college to develop an organizational structure that has a customer or student focus, supports clear direction and goals, and makes sense in a participative, high performance work environment. He shared a draft of criteria and asked for comments. The next step will be to broaden the discussion to the larger college community.

**Faculty Council report** 

Faculty Council meets today from 3-4:30 p.m. in the Board Room. At their last meeting on Feb. 11, council agreed to provide support for student instructor and course evaluations. A task force was created to help council establish guidelines. 
