The Daily received a frantic call at 8 a.m. this morning from Athletics Director Harland Yriarte who said, "We have a break in the Dick and Jerry case!" Classified Council report

He said employees who know people working in similar positions at other institutions may provide wage comparison information to the classified negotiating team. Funds are available for that purpose if needed.

The college intended to have all classified employees placed and wages set by July 1, but

placement is now estimated for late summer or early fall.

Boyd Coffee newsletter features Lane staff and student

Jim Wychules, Foodservices manager, and Vincent Jones, Foodservices employee and student, are featured on the front page of the March 19 issue of "What's Brewing," a Boyd Coffee Company newsletter. Lane purchased its espresso machine and supplies from Boyd's. According to the newsletter, Lane is "already using 30-40 pounds a week of espresso." The espresso service is one of several changes Wychules has made in Foodservices since joining the college in December.

Network cited as best source of business assistance

Lane's Oregon Small Business Development Center Network reports that over 20,000 Oregonians received classroom training and business consulting from SBDCs in 1992. A recent study conducted for the State of Oregon by an independent firm measured customer satisfaction with SBDC services and the impact of those services on Oregon's economy. The study found that 92 percent of customers surveyed expressed satisfaction with SBDC services; 60 percent reported a positive impact on profits; and 45 percent reported a positive impact on sales. "The Small Business Development Center Program should be positioned as the centerpiece of the delivery system for general business management assistance and training," said the study.

> Fixing the Broken Circuit: My Lightbulb Experience with Learning by Arlene Hougland

In the early days of our marriage, my husband and I furnished our first home with the prevailing decor of our times--Early American Goodwill. Among our various bargains was a large glass lamp which we proudly displayed in our living room.

For the most part the lamp worked well except for one small problem. Within moments of turning it on, the light bulb would begin to flicker intermittently. This malfunction would continue until one of us rapped sharply on the socket or jiggled the little brown switch. For years my light bulb experience with learning was like that lamp.

Long before my marriage, as a freshman in high school, I wanted to go to college and become a journalist, but my home life was falling apart as my parents prepared to get a divorce. The light bulb dimmed as I realized that college was out of the question.

My first teenage marriage failed. As a single parent with three children to raise, the idea of returning to school seemed like an impossibility. Once in awhile someone would suggest that I return to school and finish my education. My craving to learn would flicker and brighten slightly, but when I thought of all the obstacles that stood in my way, once again the light darkened.

Eventually, I met my present husband and settled into the routine of raising children and being a homemaker. Through the years whenever a college pamphlet would come in the mail, I would pore over it like a child with the Sears Christmas catalog. I tried several times to go back to school, but each time I let other family needs take precedence over my plans.

Last summer something happened that changed my flickering hope to a crystal clear commitment. I enrolled in a course at Lane Community College titled, "Life Transitions." It lasted only a week, but it changed the direction of my life.

On the first day of the class I met others like myself, both men and women, who were stuck in transition. All of us were afraid to let go of the past and terrified to take the next step in our

The teacher gave the class a homework assignment. She asked us to draw our life line and mark the best and worst times. As I completed the assignment, I came to a remarkable conclusion. My life stretched out before me like a broken circuit. Each time I tried to go back to school fear interrupted the flow. Suddenly I saw why I had not been able to move forward with my dream.

One by one I faced the fears and decided to take the plunge. After all, failing at a dream would be better than not trying at all.

I enrolled this past fall at Lane and started working toward a transfer degree to the University of Oregon School of Journalism. My love of learning has come to life again. I now know I can't wait for anyone else to jiggle the switch. It is up to me to keep the lamp burning brightly by choosing to stay in school.

Education shines bright into the darkened corners of my mind. Its glow guides me to greater understanding of my world and myself. Whenever fear returns, I remember the advice of one of my mentors, "You're on the path. Ever onward."

Linda Waddell awarded fellowship



Linda Waddell, director of financial aid at Lane, will crown 20 years of service with an American Council on Education fellowship in 1993-94. The ACE Fellows Program trains leaders for senior positions in higher education administration. Waddell is one of 31 fellows named nationwide. She is only the 12th person from Oregon to receive the fellowship, and the first from an Oregon community college since the program's institution in 1966.

Waddell has directed the Financial Aid Department at Lane since 1984. She was director of financial aid at Central Oregon Community College in Bend from 1978-84 and assistant director of financial aid at Grossmont Community College in El Cajon, Calif., where she also served as a financial aid counselor from 1973-77. She has a master's degree in counseling from San Diego State University and a bachelor's degree in business administration and psychology from Linfield College. She serves on the College Board, the National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators, and other associations.

President Jerry Moskus nominated Waddell for the fellowship. He said, "She has been at the forefront of Lane's efforts to develop integrated management information systems, provide important student financial and demographic data, and streamline fund delivery systems. Many of the changes she spearheaded at Lane are now model systems for other colleges in the Northwest. She is nationally recognized as an expert in the field of financial aid.

Waddell says the fellowship will help her decide whether to advance her career to a vice presidential level. "Although my primary assignment has been in the area of financial aid for the past 20 years, my experiences have been multi-faceted. I approach my work with a college-wide perspective, always weighing the needs of students with those of the institution and greater public. The opportunity to be on another campus and to acquire increased knowledge in the areas of funding, planning, budgeting, and collective bargaining will be invaluable." She will assume her fellowship post in August of this year. She has not yet selected the host institution.

When you first decide to seek funding—

Read the Grants Manual! Complete and circulate Grant Review Form, Part A, Preliminary Approval.

As early as possible—

Develop draft of proposal.

No later than 10 working days prior to mailing—

Provide drafts to Financial Services and Institutional Advancement for review.

No later than five working days prior to mailing—

Circulate one copy of final proposal and 1 copy of funding source guidelines and Parts A and B of college form to people on list for sign-off.

No later than three working days prior to mailing—

See that final proposal has reached President's Office for signature

The timeline is designed to allow key players in the grant development and review process time to consider your proposal carefully. By adhering to the timeline, your chances of developing a high quality project and proposal with strong institutional support are increased. Following is the third essay winner in a contest for students to describe "My Light Bulb Experience With Learning" in commemoration of April is Community College Month. Today's essay is by the third-place student winner and is the last student essay to be published. Faculty winners will be published April 21 and 28.

"My Light Bulb Experience With Learning" by Joanne Young

The family I was born into was so strongly focused on getting through today that preparation for tomorrow wasn't considered possible, much less practical. Planning for a self-determined future was quite beyond our collective capability, and, after awhile, beyond my personal imagination. Not surprisingly, I came to believe that education had no place in my life.

So like the other four children in my family, I never completed high school. Instead I was married at 17 and a mom at 18. My husband was an unskilled laborer who spent most of his time sitting around waiting for the union hall to call. At union wages, he brought in good money; the problem was he wasn't working enough. So I went out to work: 42 hours a week in a ladies clothing store for minimum wage and no benefits.

But I was ambitious and didn't stay there long. I wanted something better and enrolled in a secretarial course at the local business college. My husband chose this time to leave us and I learned what it's like to be a single parent and full-time student. Somehow I hung on, got my certificate, and went to work as a secretary.

My shock and discouragement were immediate. I still couldn't earn enough to get above the poverty level. No matter how hard I tried, I couldn't break free of the need for food stamps and medical card. Bouncing from office to office didn't help, either. Whether I worked at a law firm, telecommunications company or commercial realty office, the "good life" seemed forever beyond my grasp.

So I took a big, accepting breath and began to watch the world around my desk in a different way. The question "Why?" became my constant, silent companion. Why was I on this side of the desk, taking orders, instead of on the other side, giving them? Besides pants (and the equipment underneath), what did "they" have that I didn't? Slowly, ever so slowly, the light began to break.

"They" had letters behind their names. Letters like "B.A.," "M.A.," and most impressive to each other, "Ph.D." Lines of letters they received in school. No matter how I tried to smother it, the light got brighter. If I was ever going to get anywhere, I would have to collect a few of those letters. I would have to go back to school.

But how? By now I was almost 30.
"They" had gone straight through school, with no one to think of but themselves, and daddy had picked up the tab. Could I afford it, would my daughter suffer too much if I did, and most importantly, was I smart enough to get through school?

I needed someone to answer my questions, to objectively evaluate my abilities, and to simply "be there" for me. What I needed sounded more and more like a fairy godmother. Then I found something better: a program for women like me, women struggling to free themselves and their children from the soul-stealing cycle of poverty I was caught in. I found the Transitions to Success Program at Lane Community College. The light got even brighter.

The program, a one-term, six-credit class, was nothing less than a revelation for me. In it, I learned that where I had been in life had more to do with circumstance than ability. I learned how to utilize my own talents, and after that, to take responsibility for the times I fled from those talents. Finally, I learned that my life is exactly what I make of it, nothing less and, certainly, nothing more. That's the day the light was on full force.

I'm currently working toward that little line of letters behind my name. My goal is clear, even on the days I put obstacles in my own way. And the light? It shines brightest when I live what I've learned at Lane Community College: I control the dimmer switch of my life. I always have, and I always will.

College Council report

Jerry Sirois is back to work half-time, reported Alen Bahret at Tuesday's College Council meeting. Sirois underwent heart surgery in early March.

Futurist William Boyer will address council at its April 20 meeting.

The impact of the state funding formula on staffing at Lane concerns President Jerry Moskus and he wants to discuss that and other issues at Faculty and Classified Council meetings soon.

Community college month plans were presented by Joan Aschim. The main event at Lane is the ceremony and barbecue surrounding the Monday, April 19, 12-noon arrival and send-off of a special Oregon community college flag on main campus. The flag is being relayed around the state by student teams to celebrate April as Community College Month.

The college vision as synthesized from work council has done so far was presented by Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts, Diane Dann and Marie Matsen. A sample vision statement was offered and met with mixed response. Council will continue working on the project.

A \$2 tuition increase recommendation from the Tuition Committee was presented by Vice President Linda Fossen. The committee considered \$1, \$2 and \$3 increases for 1993-94 to help meet anticipated funding cuts and favored the \$2 option. The majority of council members agreed with the recommendation. The Board of Education will be asked to vote on the increase at its April 19 meeting. The \$2 increase would put Lane right at the limit of board policy which states that tuition shall not account for more than 20 percent of total college general fund revenue. Nonetheless, it keeps Lane tuition among the lowest in the state's community colleges. Most of the other colleges have adopted Lane's policy of charging for every credit or are soon to do so, said Fossen and Moskus, and have increased their tuition rates as well.

The state legislature house republicans current proposal of cutting an additional \$15 million to community colleges would cost Lane about \$2 million, said Moskus.

A revision to board policy on alcohol use is too restrictive, said council guest Steve Barton of KLCC/KLCO. The revision proposal is part of the updating of all board policies that has been underway all year. Barton said it could be interpreted to prohibit serving of alcoholic beverages at non-LCC facilities, such as KLCC anniversary party fund-raisers at the Hult Center which normally serves wine and other beverages. It also could be interpreted to limit the use of alcohol to events catered only by Food Services. Council agreed the proposed policy should be revised.

The next meeting of College Council is set for Tuesday, April 20, from 3-5 p.m. in the Board Room.

Marketing funds available

April 29 is the last marketing grant deadline of the year. Money allocated at that time will be available beginning July 1. The grant fund helps departments fund new marketing activities. Contact Angela Miller, Institutional Advancement, ext. 2268, for guidelines and application.

Faculty Council report

At Faculty Council's April 8 meeting, Larry Brown, Community and Economic Development, attended and explained the **management evaluation system**. Brown said he wanted to acquaint council with the system because the upward evaluation process will require both faculty and classified staff to evaluate their managers. No faculty were on the Management Evaluation Committee, but Brown said the system is in a pilot stage and a feedback process is built in. Council agreed to support the management evaluation system.

Council also stated it was in support of the concept of a **sick leave bank**. This concept is in response to a request by Julie Baker, Community and Economic Development, that a special insurance fund be created to help staff who need financial assistance to pay their insurance premiums while on sick leave.

In other business, discussion continued on the **student evaluations of faculty**. Council also considered ideas to recruit new moderators and active representatives from departments that have not been in regular attendance. Faculty Council's next meeting is Thursday, April 22 at 3 p.m. in PE 205.

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

"Dreams Fulfilled" by Karen Irmsher

Twenty years ago, when I trained to teach reading, I expected to find satisfaction in the work. But I never expected joy. Recently I found it, looking into the teary eyes of a man in his sixties.

John had just finished reading the first page of a novel--enough to decide that he could read the rest of it.

read the rest of it.

"I can read a book!" he announced, almost giddy with trying to contain his tears and laughter.

"I've never been able to read a book before!"

John lived more than half a century of his life before he found time to tackle the complex task of learning to read. Born in Mississippi one year into the Depression, he lost both parents by the time he was six. From then on, the boy earned his keep by working for the families that took him in. He wanted to go to school but they never sent him.

Despite this handicap, John always found work, most of it as a welder, boiler-maker and metal fabricator. Employers were quick to see his capabilities, and appreciative of his can-do attitude. When poor health forced his retirement from Weyerhaeuser in 1986, he had worked there more than 25 years, and earned numerous bonuses for his innovations. He married, raised two sons, and acquired more property than most teachers ever own.

But John always felt bad about not being able to read. He felt cheated. Two years ago, he decided to do something about it and began

attending literacy classes at LCC's Downtown Center.

"I hardly knew my ABCs when I came in here," says John. Now, he boasts of knowing all of the vowel and consonant sounds. He delights in sounding out unfamiliar words and reads to anyone willing to listen.

John's joy was, and is, contagious and I feel fortunate to share it, though I can't claim much credit for his success. He was ready. All I did was put the book in his hands. I didn't take over instruction of the literacy class until last

September.

Nevertheless, his elation touched me deeply. John's first paralleled one of my own. I completed my master's degree in reading, more than 18 years ago. The field attracted me because reading has always been such a wellspring of enrichment for me. Reading offers me comfort and distraction when I can't find it elsewhere. Reading fuels my fantasies, and provides me with the information I need to deal with the myriad challenges of my life.

I had hoped to be able to share my enthusiasm with people who wanted to increase their access to this realm I so love. But the job market for teachers was tight wherever I went. I worked as a teacher's aide, a substitute teacher, a bookkeeper, and a reporter, but I have never, until now, taught a reading class of my own. John probably didn't notice, when he announced his new found skill, that the tears in my eyes

mirrored the tears his.

She teaches English at Lane.

Miracle on East 30th Avenue

Her name is Helen. Child of professionals she turned her back on college. She did so with such bravado it was only later her parents learned why. She thought she was dumb. In high school Helen was the student who downed her way through classes beguiling teachers and classmates with her ready wit and quality miming. Too often tests ended up in the waste basket and machine scored exams were answered with a series of random marks. Migraine headaches tortured Helen as she built her facade, but "the face that launched a thousand ships," style and ready laughter covered her pain.

Helen married her high school sweetheart. It seemed a good match: two handsome humans, good families and on the groom's side substantial money. Helen's honeymoon brought a bed covered with two hundred red roses and a gilt sign that read, "I'll love your forever". Forever," though, was only long enough for four children and an evening phone call announcing abandonment.

Helen was stoic and most of her tears were private--her unworthiness confirmed. What to do? No husband, little money, no job, no skills, no self-confidence.

Helen moved to Eugene and, literally fighting nausea, came to Lane, took placement tests and participated in orientation. She enrolled in Study Skills classes, taking Effective Learning. Her instructor taught Helen to be a student and a good one. She learned to read textbooks, understand and remember; she learned how to approach tests; she learned that lectures often impart valuable information and she learned how to take control of her time and herself. In the Social Science Department she encountered the delight of history brought by a teacher whose skills at story telling and music enhanced an avalanche of information. For the first time Helen got A's on her exams. In her literature classes teachers led her to the pleasure of critical reading,

gave her courage to challenge ideas and introduced her to the power of taking an unorthodox but substantiated position. Writing teachers, through their carefully crafted courses, revealed to Helen her own rich narrative, her intelligence, her ability to create, to say, to persuade.

Staying in school wasn't all that easy with four still-disoriented children to nurture, a car that broke down and little ones who became frighteningly ill. Early morning paper routes and in-home child care were necessary for income. Sometimes there was despair. Through all, instructors at LCC were caring, interested and supportive. Helen no longer had to laugh. She could tell the truth and in doing so find a hundred hands to help her make her way.

Helen left LCC with an AA degree and enrolled in an out-of-state university where she graduated at the top of her class. Today, she is an exceptional teacher; her children are no longer bewildered and frightened but high school and university students excelling in scholarship, athletics and service. By the standards of the world, and more importantly, by Helen's standards, Helen is a success. And she says, "Wherever I go, I tell people the best experience of my life happened at Lane Community College in Eugene, Oregon. I tell them of the absolutely superior instruction I received there, unmatched by any since."

I know about Helen because she is my sister and I know about the miracle on East 30th Avenue because Helen's teachers are my colleagues. Every time I learn of yet another of Helen's professional accolades, observe her children, sure and self-confident, and sense her serene strength, I rejoice and celebrate my colleagues at Lane: colleagues who brought forth hidden treasures for my sister, who daily challenge me to create miracles and who make me, simply and joyfully, glad to teach.

Board report

Tuition increased

An amended \$2 tuition increase received LCC Board of Education approval with a 5-1 vote at the April 19 meeting. Larry Mann opposed the measure, and Chuck Ivey was absent. The increase will be effective summer 1993. The amendment allows the board to change tuition again during 1993-94 if finances warrant it.

Credit in-state tuition will increase from \$24 to \$26 per credit hour; international and out-of state from \$89 to \$91 per credit hour; high school completion from \$40 to \$42 per credit hour; and non-credit from \$1.37 to \$1.44 per class hour, or \$41 to \$43 for a 30-hour class. The senior tuition discount remains at 50 percent for credit and non-credit classes.

Student ballot measures receive mixed response

A \$6 student fee to fund Student Health Services will appear on the May 3-5 student ballot. The board approved that student government sponsored referendum with a unanimous 6-0 vote but denied three others. Denied were a referendum to reduce the child care co-op fee from \$5 to \$3; a referendum to reduce the ASLCC fee from \$5 to \$3; and a referendum to make the OSPIRG \$2 fee optional. The board indicated it would reconsider the child care and ASLCC referendums if resubmitted with more objective language. OSPIRG presented its own and separate referendum asking whether its \$2 mandatory fee should be continued, in keeping with its original pledge to ask for student approval every three years. The board approved that referendum. The board is required to approve student ballot measures involving mandatory fees. Non-fee student measures do not require board consideration.

Consent agenda passed

Also at the meeting, the consent agenda passed with a 6-0 vote. On it were formal approval of Miriam Thompson as secretary to the vice president for Student Services; bid award for printing the college catalog to The Daily Journal of Commerce in Portland for \$32,261; bid award for annual office supplies to Boise Cascade Office Products Company of Portland and Boise on a requirements basis; and official acceptance of the March 23 election declaring Pat Riggs the winner of the Zone 3 board seat with 37,418 votes.

Airport vote expected in May

At 11:10 p.m., the board heard an update on the aviation maintenance program expansion proposal. Vice President for Instruction Jim Ellison gave the presentation concluding, "We're simply out of room." Members agreed to vote on phase one of the desired expansion at the next meeting. Phase one would include building a return-to-service hangar and an avionics lab at the Eugene airport. The facility would house the present operations at Creswell and main campus. Staff would continue pursing additional outside funding for further program expansion.

Use of housing lawsuit award still undecided

How the college should use a lawsuit award totaling \$1.9 million over five years was a question left unanswered at the meeting. A community-wide task force proposed several options. The board directed the group to meet again and reach consensus. The lawsuit award was won for five Oregon colleges including Lane by the state attorney general's office against two real estate developers. The developers built the Ashlane apartments in Springfield for Lane in the 1970s and then unlawfully transferred ownership to for-profit corporations that they controlled. The settlement mandates that the schools spend the money on student housing.

Wooten gives legislative overview

Representative Cynthia Wooten spoke at the meeting. She shared her view of what's happening in the Legislature and advised Lane to have a strong student presence at the capitol.

The meeting adjourned at 11:30 p.m. The next meeting is scheduled for May 12.
