College Council report

Three proposals recommended for investment opportunities fund

Three proposals were recommended by the Investment Opportunities Committee to College Council at its May 18 meeting. Committee spokesperson Sandy Cutler said a fitness education center, a brand name restaurant, and a student exchange appeared to meet the intent of the fund to start activities that would save the college money or generate new revenue. Recommendations will go to the Board of

The proposed fitness center would need \$75,000 to start up and would generate new revenue through fees and FTE reimbursement. After discussion, President Jerry Moskus directed Bob Creed of Health and Physical Education to revise the proposal budget and to speak with more local fitness businesses about their concerns of competitiveness.

The brand name restaurant would need \$60,000 to start up and would generate revenue through sales. It could be a franchise owned by the college or owned by an outside party paying a percentage to the college. After discussion, Moskus directed Vice President Linda Fossen to investigate how sales revenue would be channeled into the general fund.

The student exchange would be with the Republic of Georgia in the former Soviet Union and would need \$17,000 to start up. Revenue would be generated through FTE reimbursement and international tuition. Council queried whether the proposal should include more countries.

All three proposals will be brought back with clarifications to the June 1 council meeting before being referred to the board.

College restructuring being considered

Moskus said Executive Cabinet has held two all-day sessions so far to consider college restructuring. He said changes in our community, economy, technology, the state and other changes require us to "look at the system" at Lane. He foresees possible matrix responsibilities, such as Vice President Larry Warford overseeing staff development for the college as a whole as well as directing Community and Economic Development. The problem with this is work overload, said Moskus. He also foresees more leadership on the front lines and a move away from the old bureaucratic method of being told what to do. He cited Julie Baker's initiative in leading an effort to establish an emergency sick leave bank for employees as an example. "But to succeed in this, we all have to know the college vision," said Moskus. Job descriptions may change from a listing of tasks to a statement of purpose. Executive Cabinet will continue working on a restructuring plan.

Council meets again today, June 1, from 1:30-3 p.m. in the Board Room.

As of July 1, the fixed asset threshold will become \$500. This means that any item with an original value of \$499.99 or less should not be classified as a fixed asset. Some grants and contracts may have different fixed asset thresholds; administrators of grants and contracts are responsible for ascertaining and abiding by the appropriate fixed asset requirements. College Council report

Proposals recommended

At its June 1 meeting, College Council forwarded three investment opportunities proposals for board of education approval. This was council's second review of the proposals. Recommended for board review were a fitness education center, a bid request for a brand name restaurant franchise, and a student exchange program. Council questioned whether the fitness center would be seen as competitive by private health clubs but Health and Physical Education Chair Bob Creed said the educational approach of the center had satisfied the private clubs. Although some council members also were concerned that staffing costs might exceed projections, the proposal was supported. It requires \$75,000 in seed money. Council decided a proposal for a brand name restaurant be put out for bid as both a college-owned franchise and as an outside-owned franchise. The latter raises the question of whether employees be hired by the business at its own wages, or hired by the college at union wages. Council had no objections to a student exchange with the republic of Georgia in the former Soviet Union. The proposal asks for \$17,000 over three years. The exchange should generate new tuition revenue and enrich the multicultural diversity of Lane. Foreign students pay higher tuition than in-state students. The proposals were in response to a call from the president to find ways to save the college money or generate new revenue. Start-up money for approved projects will be loaned from board contingency funds.

Membership to change

In discussing its 1993-94 membership, council wondered whether Community and Economic Development and Student Services were adequately represented. Council decided to invite the branches to send a rep from any of its employee groups (classified, faculty or management). Council will hold a joint session with new members coming to office in July to lend continuity to ongoing discussions. Representative groups determine their own length of service and term dates on College Council. Most groups change representatives on July 1.

Board agenda reviewed

Council reviewed an incomplete agenda for the June 16 board meeting. The board will adopt and appropriate the 1993-94 budget and conduct other annual business at that time.

Legislative news

President Jerry Moskus said the Oregon Community College Association now expects the Oregon legislature to approve community college funding at the level recommended by the governor. "Its a comment on the quality of community colleges in Oregon," he said. The governor's budget cuts community college funding by about 5 percent. Earlier in the session, the house considered worse cuts. Moskus cautioned that nothing is certain until the legislature actually passes the state budget.

Next meeting

College Council meets again on Tuesday, June 15, from 3-5 p.m. in the Board Room.

At Faculty Council's May 27 meeting, Larry Brown of Research, Planning and Evaluation gave an update on the upward management evaluation process and asked members for feedback. He said that faculty will be given opportunities to suggest improvements for future revisions of the evaluation form.

Maxine Frauman told council of a Future Faculty Task Force that she and Jay Marston have been asked to lead. She presented a draft of the task force mission and objectives and asked for comments and suggestions.

In other business, council reviewed a revised draft of the "Student Evaluation of Instructor" in preparation for a trial run. Council also brainstormed topics for the fall in-service all-faculty meeting. Council's last 1992-93 meeting is today at 3 p.m. in the Board Room. - Kimberly Buchanan

College Council report

The 1994-95 budget criteria and process will mirror the prior year's, said Executive Cabinet member Marie Matsen at the June 15 College Council meeting. The principles remain unchanged but some criteria should be dropped since they proved to be of no benefit during the 1993-94 planning process. Three criteria were recommended to be dropped from evaluating FTE-producing areas. "Not available elsewhere in the community" and "actively seeks and maintains partnerships" were too universally true to serve as discriminatory tools. "Revenue neutral or positive" created too much work for staff and the results couldn't be fairly compared. Criteria recommended to be dropped from the service and support areas list were "revenue neutral or positive" and "actively seeks and maintains partnerships" for the same reasons. Council supported dropping those criteria. The recommendations will be forwarded to the board. Departments or other college units will be asked in September to resubmit updated function sheets. Council meets again on July 20.

One more term

One nomination was submitted for the management at-large position on College Council. Carol Beckley has agreed to serve a second year on the council as a management representative. Thanks to Carol for continuing her valuable service another year.

Budget approved

The 1993-94 budget passed with a unanimous board of education vote and no public comment on June 16. The general fund total of \$50,914,463 is a 4.87 percent increase over 1992-93. Revenue includes \$13.57 million from local property taxes, 13.8 percent less than last year due to Measure 5. At the same time, state support is up 14.9 percent. New tuition from the \$24 to \$26 per credit hour hike is expected to bring in \$600,000. Savings from not filling job vacancies should total about \$510,000.

The budget also assumes a .4 percent increase in full-time equivalent students and a 5 percent increase in materials and services. The revenue breakdown includes 35.4 percent state funding, 26.7 percent local property taxes, 20.3 percent tuition and fees, and 17.6 percent other. Expenses are estimated at 70.2 percent for personnel, 15.4 percent for materials and services, .9 percent or capital outlay, 4.9 percent in transfers out, and 8.6 percent other.

Board report

In addition to approving the 1993-94 budget (see above) at its June 16 meeting, the LCC Board of Education nailed down other business as well. **Personnel** items approved were the appointment of Kathleen Morrison-Graham as full-time science instructor and Richard Ricketts as part-time temporary computer information technology instructor; the retirements of Virginia DeChaine and Lucille Lamoreaux; and the resignation of Joan Ryan. **Bid awards** approved were \$31,000 in dental program supplies to a variety of vendors; \$97,811 to Central Valley Roofing Company of Salem for Campus Services reroofing; and Elderhostel accommodations on a requirements basis to Driftwood Shores.

Also approved were the **president's annual contractual authority, financial aid** appropriations, and year-end budget transfers for 1992-93, all with a 7-0 vote. The resolution to levy taxes for 1993-94 passed with a 6-1 vote. Larry Mann said he opposed the motion because the college doesn't collect out-of-district fees although out-of-district people use college services. New programs approved were one-year certificate programs in coaching and aerobics instruction. The board approved participation in a regional delivery system for job training, education and placement services coordinated by the Lane Regional Workforce Quality Committee with a 7-0 vote.

Three **investment opportunity proposals** received support. A 7-0 vote funded a fitness education center at \$75,000. Brand name restaurant information will be sought through bids for both college-owned and outside-owned operations. In addition, Foodservices Manager Jim Wychules will investigate a create-your-own restaurant package just now being offered by a national association of college food services. A student exchange program with the Republic of Georgia passed on a 6-1 vote. Larry Mann said he opposed the proposal because it is not an answer to our financial problems.

An Automotive Service Excellence plaque was given to the college by Dan Flanagan from the certifying institute, who made a special trip from Seattle for the presentation. Many educational institutions strive for ASE certification but few achieve it, he said. It is the first time Lane has earned the recognition. Accepting the plaque were President Jerry Moskus, Vice President for Instruction Jim Ellison, and automotive instructors Billy Jones, James Mathews and and Wayne Workman.

The board meets again July 14.

TRIO grant not funded

The college received notice this week from the U.S. Department of Education that its proposal to the TRIO/Student Support Services program was not successful. Lane's proposal was one of 1,100 competing for \$130 million. Program planners will obtain reviewer's comments and other feedback on the proposal to improve it and seek funding from other grant sources. Summer blockbuster: Enrollment

The theaters may have "Jurassic Park," but Lane has classes. Like the movie premiere, the first day of summer term attracted over-flow crowds. Credit and Adult High School students numbered 3,072 on June 21, 9.4 percent more than last year's 2,808. The college added 39 sections of classes to meet the demand. Last summer, only seven sections were added.

Eight sections were added in English, six in social science, five in art and applied design, three in

math, three in family and health careers, and one or two in several other areas.

Vice President for Student Services Linda Fossen said she believes students are enrolling now for the 1993-94 academic year so that they may be counted as "returning" students in the fall. Returning students get to register earlier than new students, so they have a better chance at getting the classes they want. The need for job training and retraining and the quality, accessibility and affordability of community colleges have made Lane more popular than ever this summer, she says.


