Board chair seeks senate seat

Lane Community College Board of Education Chair Peter Sorenson is seeking appointment to the state senate seat recently vacated by Grattan Kerans. Sorenson says serving in the Legislature would enable him to further advocate for community college education. He is comfortable about taking on an additional office and has interviewed others who have done the same, including Rep. Larry Sowa of Molalla, board member for Clackamas CC, and former senator and Mt. Hood board member Glenn Otto.

Lane County democratic precinct committee members from Senate District 20 will meet Sept. 11 to nominate three to five candidates for the appointment. Lane County commissioners then will interview the candidates and make the appointment by Sept. 30. The commissioners appointed

Sorenson to the redistricting task force in 1991.

Sorenson was elected Lane board chair on July 14. He first joined the board in 1989 to complete an unexpired term and retained the post through election to a four-year term in March 1990. He said he intends to run for re-election in March 1994. He represents Zone 5 which includes central and south Eugene. Kerans left the Legislature this summer to become the lobbyist for the State System of Higher Education.

#### College Council report

President Jerry Moskus described the state sales tax initiative to College Council at its Sept. 7 meeting. He said the tax would accelerate implementation of Measure 5 and the consequent shift in control from local to state. The initiative proposes no school property taxes for homes of principle residence and limits state spending. Revenues would be devoted to K-12 and community colleges.

Facing a list of more than a dozen issues it should act on in 1993-94, council appointed a committee to sort out the most pressing topics. Appointed were Sandy Ing, Ted Kotsakis, Marie Matsen and Jane Russell. They will report back at the next meeting. With money as one of the issues, council will ask college grants coordinator Sarah LaMaster to speak about grants funding at a future meeting.

Also at the meeting, Moskus suggested that council attendance include all the vice presidents, Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts of Research, Planning & Evaluation, and Diane Dann of Institutional Advancement, to provide staff support and to improve communications between governance and administrative groups. Council liked the idea and will talk about it some more.

In other business, council decided to ask the Science Department to maintain the nature trail established a year ago as an outdoor classroom and recreational facility. The trail is uphill from the south parking lot and has "gone back to nature" since its establishment. The action was a response to a recommendation from Classified Council.

The discussion on restructuring was postponed for lack of time. College Council will meet again Tuesday, Sept. 21, 3-5 p.m., Board Room.

#### **Board** report

The LCC Board of Education did not fill the Zone 1 vacancy at its Sept. 8 meeting but instead voted unanimously to conduct second interviews with the top two candidates, Cindy Cable of Florence and Francisca Johnson of Veneta. The interviews will be held before the next board meeting on Oct. 13. Candidate Cable attended the meeting.

The management employees working conditions agreement for 1993-94 was approved 6-0. The item had been inadvertently left off a revised agenda and was added back at the beginning of the meeting. Managers will get a 3 percent increase in base pay plus an additional \$350 per year. Eligible managers also will get a half-step increase. Management full-time equivalency has decreased 5 percent over the last six years from 1988-89 through 1993-94.

The consent agenda passed 6-0. Approved were the appointments of Kimberly DeMoss as fulltime instructor in Performing Arts, Anne Paschall as full-time instructor in Business, and Kathryn Reid as half-time nurse practitioner in Student Health Services. Also approved was a bid award to Omnitek Computers of Eugene for microcomputers for the avionics lab in the aviation maintenance program.

Appointed to represent the board on the LCC Foundation was Larry Mann. Appointed to represent the board on the Senior Companion Program were Peter Sorenson and Larry Mann as alternate. Pat Riggs was appointed alternate to Lane Council of Governments.

The board heard an update on an effort to learn more about collaborative bargaining. A group has been meeting since the last classified contract negotiations to learn more about the collaborative process. Participating have been board member Pat Riggs, President Jerry Moskus, members of the classified and college bargaining teams, and a consultant. Riggs asked the board whether she should continue meeting with the group now that it is ready to decide what process to use in the reclassification study wage negotiations. Members generally agreed that she should. Moskus said both he and Riggs will leave the group before bargaining commences.

In other business, the board acknowledged the 1992-93 Attainment Report and the 1993-94 College Plan and examined a new financial report that will show actual revenues received and expenditures made in addition to budgeted figures. Members discussed the state sales tax initiative and may adopt a formal position on the issue at a future meeting.

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

# President calls for leadership from all employees

Following are highlights from the president's address at the all-staff meeting on Sept. 20.

Reviewing past successes.

President Jerry Moskus led the way into the new year by reviewing some of the successes of '92-93:

- Community colleges fared well in the Legislature with only a 5 percent cut compared to K-12's and higher ed's 10 percent cuts. Also, Lane's tax base was funded for two more years.
- Lane balanced its budget.
- Two new profit-making programs received approval: a fitness education center and a Mexican fast food restaurant.
- Student Health Services acquired stable funding and its staff behaved professionally in the midst of controversy.
- Vice presidents saved more than \$350,000 out of salary reserves.
- The Joint Review Committee successfully guided a new classification system through its early stages.
- Community partnerships blossomed, such as working with South Lane School District to build a new facility in Cottage Grove, and helping Symantec Corp. train its new employees.
- The Eugene 1993 Airshow made over \$100,000 for the aviation maintenance program.
- The college conducted a computer conversion now resulting in better service to students and staff.
- Lane increased services to Native American students and students with disabilities.
- The board revised its policies while leading the college through many difficult decisions.
- Lane served 37,000 students in 1992-93, a 9.9 percent increase.

Looking to the future.

Change will characterize '93-94, said the president.
Changes facing Lane include external factors, technology, politics, leadership, and growth. External factors include Measure 5's impact on funding, a changing economy, education reform, workforce strategies, and new federal regulations. Staff must keep up with technology both as educators and as workers. Political control of Lane continues to shift from the local taxpayer to state and federal funding sources. Changes in Lane leadership include a complete turnover in vice presidents since 1990, six new board members since 1988, and a move toward shared leadership and decision

making by all employees. Enrollment growth is revealing an increase in part-time and older students, and is requiring accompanying growth in support staff and part-time faculty.

To survive change, we must minimize bureaucracy and be light on our feet, said Moskus. Later this fall the president will propose some administrative restructuring. But more important is focusing on caring, quality and shared leadership, said the president. The leadership behaviors he advocated included challenging the status quo, striving for continuous improvement, working in teams, keeping the whole system in mind, sharing a common vision, fixing the system--not the person, and others.

In summary, the president quoted Ghandi: "We must be the change we wish to see in the world."

"A caring environment is one where the well-being of each member, student or staff, is supported, and where service to others is encouraged. We have to create a sense of community...."

"We are in pretty good shape right now, but our environment is turbulent, and we have to be sure we can adjust successfully to all the changes around us."

"Lane faces increasing demands at the same time resources are declining."

"We have seen an electronics revolution in the automobile, heavy equipment, and aviation industries, and the advent of computer-assisted design and manufacturing. New technologies threaten to outstrip the college's ability to keep up in such fields as health, business, and communications."

"The state political climate is much more important to LCC now than it was even a few years ago. If the federal government is able to move funding away from defense into education, then the federal government's influence on education is likely also to increase."

"We need leadership from all of you."

"Remember our aim: to provide a quality learning experience in a caring environment."

"We must never forget that the most important thing we do is enable students to learn. We're here to provide quality learning experiences, and if we continue to meet that primary need, we'll continue to be a successful organization."

She has been with Lane eight years and is a member of the American Association of Women in Community Colleges and the Instructional Support Staff Association.

# Former board member passes away

Former LCC Board of Education member Catherine Lauris of Eugene, 75, died on Sept. 24. England's Eugene Memorial Chapel has set the funeral service for Saturday, Oct. 2, at 2 p.m., at Beall Hall, 961 E. 18th. Interment will be private.

Lauris served on the Lane board from 1970-82 representing Zone 5. She was the first woman to chair the board when elected to that post in 1971. She also served on the LCC Budget Committee from 1986-92 in an at-large post. On the occasion of her retirement from service to Lane, faculty union president Don Micken wrote about her in the union newsletter. To borrow a couple of quotes:

"Her resume is an embarrassment to anyone who presumes to public service. It begins where most would end--with three terms on the Eugene City Council, and ends 20 years ago, shortly after her contributions to LCC began. Before 1956 and after 1972 is more than a lifetime of service for most persons. ... At no place is there any evidence that from her activities, Catherine Lauris sought power, position, career, honors, or money for herself or for her friends. For this very private person/public citizen, service to her community has a definition which few understand, and virtually none emulate."

#### Mild enrollment increase reported

Overall enrollment is up about 4 percent as of the first day of classes, said Vice President for Student Services Linda Fossen on Monday. Last year produced Lane's greatest-ever enrollment increase with a 9.9 percent jump and a total headcount of 37,191 for the year. This fall, credit headcount is about the same as last fall at this same time with approximately 9,300 students registered. Non-credit enrollment is up about 14 percent with approximately 4,500 students registered. Don't add those numbers together: some students register for both credit and non-credit classes. Final reports become available later in the term.

Named at graduation, the Instructor of the Year is again acknowledged at the annual all-staff meeting. Jerri Adler and Gary McKenzie share the distinction for 1992-93.

Jerri Adler has taught medical office assisting at Lane for nearly 12 years. She credits Lane's supportive atmosphere with contributing to her success and the success of students. In a note to her department she wrote, "Many of our health records students have gone on to other institutions...and invariably say how much they miss the nurturing atmosphere of Lane....

We have watched wonderful videos, seen comical overheads and paid strict attention to her chalkboard notes and diagrams." Adler is respected for her personal experience earned in the field. One nominator described her as a lady and a leader, and another simply put it this way: "Jerri Adler is my hero."

Gary McKenzie has taught aviation maintenance at Lane for four years. He is known for his caring attitude, his devotion to students, and his encouragement. "He would always make the students feel as if they had just accomplished the impossible" when they finished a project, said one student. All nominators remarked on his easy-going manner and respect for diverse ideas. Many counted him as a friend as well as a teacher. Several told the story of how he invited students who had no place else to go to his home on Thanksgiving.

Nominators also were impressed with McKenzie's personal field experience and professional certifications and licenses including airframe and powerplant license, inspector authorization, and designated maintenance examiner's license. He is a graduate of Lane's aviation program and worked several years in the field before returning to teach. He uses real-life examples that help students understand difficult subject matter.
