For his vital role in making the American Dream come true for low-income families, construction technology instructor Hal Davis was named Innovator of the Year at the all-staff meeting on Sept. 20. The award is sponsored by the League for Innovation.

Davis and his students build the houses in the St. Vincent de Paul Society's American Dream Program. The program makes housing available to low-income families on a lease-to-own plan. Society director Terry McDonald said that even after local government and banks pledged support for the program four years ago, "What was needed was greater equity than we could achieve even with out fund raisers, and it is at this point that Hal's department and he both came through. Hal suggested using his students to frame our projects." Since then, several low-income families have realized the American dream of home ownership, and Lane students have acquired valuable hands-on experience while performing quality workmanship under Davis' supervision.

Davis also has been active with the Eugene Carpentry Apprenticeship Joint Training Committee for many years.

Diesel tech program receives \$50,000 grant

Staff cautioned to review Measure 1 activity

The Oregon School Boards Association says publications paid for with tax funds must contain only neutral information that does not advocate a position on an election issue. Parent groups may print advocacy material and board members may campaign for or against an issue as long as they do not use public resources. Boards may also take action at a board meeting to support or oppose an election issue. If you have questions, call the Secretary of State Elections Division at 378-4144.

Last year, legal counsel advised the college that employees may wear campaign buttons on

campus and/or in the classroom. Employees may also post signs in public areas according to regulations in the Student Services procedures manual. Signs posted in individual offices are not subject to those regulations. In the classroom, instructors may hold discussions as long as the discussions have some relevancy to the subject of the class. However, instructors should not ask students to vote in a particular way on any measure or candidate.






