

Board changes meeting time

The Board of Education will hold its next regular meeting on Wednesday, Dec. 8, at 5 p.m., in the Board Room, rather than the traditional 7:30 p.m. Agenda highlights:

- <u>Vending machine bid awards</u>. Food Services Manager Jim Wychules proposes contracting out stocking and servicing of Pepsi machines to Pepsi Cola Bottling Company and food vending machines to Superior Vending. The college owns 15 food machines, 16 canned beverage machines, and two dollar-changers, historically stocked and serviced by staff. Contracting out should save time, money and storage space. It won't cost any jobs, Wychules told The Daily on Friday. Vending services have been temporarily contracted out since a vending attendant left the staff last spring.
- Personnel. Up for action are appointment of Nadine Wilkes as part-time registered nurse in Student Health; and the retirements of woodworking instructor Ken Rhodes from Industrial Technology, and benefits assistant Marie Nelson from Personnel Services
- Budget calendar. Up for adoption is the budget development calendar for 1994-95 beginning with Dec. 9, 1993, project budget request forms to departments and ending with June 22, 1994, budget hearing and appropriations and July 1 certification of the levy to the county assessor..
- Delegation of contract award authority. Purchasing Services Director Lloyd Rain proposes that the board delegate its contract award authority to staff. This should prevent delays that sometimes result from the board's limited meeting schedule and time. The proposed board would consist of three managers appointed by the president, meet weekly when warranted, hold open meetings, and consider contracts of \$25,000 or more. The board would retain its statutory responsibility to make procurement policy, approve emergency awards, and rule on exemptions from public bidding.
- Discussion of academic standards and failure.

Bid awarded

The Lane Community College Board of Education held a telephone meeting on Nov. 23 and awarded a bid for air handling upgrade work in the auto body paint shop to the low bidder, Servco Inc. of Lebanon, for \$84,980. The award was postponed at the regular Nov. 10 board meeting when plumbers union spokesman Mike Carmickle questioned Servco's qualifications and complained that it was a non-union company. The board asked staff to investigate. The investigation showed no outstanding problems with any of several contracts completed in recent years. Oregon law states that public institutions must accept qualified low bids and cannot exclude non-union bidders. Bidders must pay prevailing wages on public contracts.

Carmickle advised staff that his union may conduct an informational picket of Servco. An informational picket involves distributing information but does not signify a grievance. Lane's faculty and classified union presidents agree with the bid award and cite no position on Carmickle's union other than pointing out that it is not affiliated with AFL-CIO. Lane employee contracts and Oregon statute

prohibit employees from observing pickets.

Classified Council calls for ideas and suggestions

President Moskus and Classified Council have discussed ways that classified staff can help Lane adapt successfully to changes facing the college due to the shift in funding from local control to state control, new trends in jobs and technology, and the fairly new college administration and board. Moskus felt that classified staff should play a greater role in planning in Lane's effort to move forward with shared decision making.

In response to this concern, Classified Council encourages all staff to make suggestions that will improve services and efficiency using existing resources. College Council report

Diversity project leadership may be delegated

College Council on Dec. 7 considered a proposal to serve as the core leadership team for a yearlong Institute on Ethnic Diversity project to develop and implement diversity at Lane. Affirmative Action Director Donna Albro presented the proposal. The institute was designed by the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education and requires a cross-campus leadership team. Targeted outcomes include the hiring, enrollment, and faculty development of underrepresented ethnic minorities, and strengthened multiculturalism on campus. Some council members questioned whether council should serve as the core group for the institute when so many other things crowd council's agenda. Members will attend the institute orientation meeting in January and then decide whether to designate a different core team.

Restructuring proposal introduced

Council took its first look at President Jerry Moskus' 12-page restructuring proposal. Among the major changes are reorganization of branches into "clusters" with more flexible processes and a strong emphasis on teamwork. Moskus hopes for a March 15 implementation date. The first revision will be distributed Feb. 9 and the final version published on Feb. 28.

Council heard a proposal that Lane provide credit to its students for courses taken in military science at the University of Oregon offered by the Reserve Officer Training Core. Scott Leckington, president of the Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Alliance student club at Lane, distributed information documenting his group's objection to the proposal. Council debated whether entering into the crossenrollment agreement would be perceived as support of the military, which discriminates against homosexuals when Lane does not, and whether the agreement would lead to similar proposals in other curricula. Discussion will be continued at the next meeting.

Next meeting will be Jan. 4 from 1:30-3 p.m. in the Board Room.


Customer service videos available

Board report

Even though a **bid award protest** occupied nearly an hour of the Lane Community College Board of Education's time Wednesday night, members later deadlocked on whether to delegate contract award authority to a staff group. Dave King of Valley Food and Vending Service protested a staff recommendation to award a contract for stocking and servicing food vending machines on campus to Superior Vending and for stocking and servicing beverage vending machines to Pepsi Cola Bottling Company. After hearing the protest, rebuttal from Purchasing Services Director Lloyd Rain, and advice from legal counsel Joe Trudeau, the board favored the staff recommendation with a unanimous 6-0 vote. Board member Cindy Weeldreyer was absent.

Later in the evening, the board split over whether to approve a staff recommendation to delegate its **contract award authority**. Board member Cindy Cable said she preferred to retain award authority. Board member Roger Hall questioned whether it was micromanagement. A motion to table was blocked by a 3-3 vote. After more discussion and the addition of a sunset clause suggested by Chair Peter Sorenson, the board voted 4-2 to recognize a first hearing of the proposal, which is a policy matter. Voting yes were Hall, Sorenson, Jim Pitney and Larry Mann. Voting no were Pat Riggs and Cindy Cable. Members may or may not approve the recommendation at the second hearing next month.

The board approved the **budget calendar** on a 5-1 vote with Riggs voting no. She wants to see the Budget Committee more involved earlier in the process. Hall said the Budget Committee has a legally-mandated review and approval role and warned against making it something it isn't. President Jerry Moskus said the review and approval role had produced significant changes in the past and should not necessarily be regarded as a rubber-stamp function. (See calendar, next page.)

Board member Larry Mann asked members to consider his proposal that Lane consider **bond funding** for establishing more outreach sites in the district, perhaps as early as the May election. With limited time left for discussion, the board agreed to continue the discussion at the next meeting.

Approved unanimously were **appointment** of Nadine Wilkes as part-time registered nurse in Student Health; and the **retirements** of woodworking instructor Ken Rhodes from Industrial Technology and benefits assistant Marie Nelson from Personnel Services. The next meeting will be Jan. 12.

Hear ye, hear ye: Open hearings on restructuring announced

Executive Cabinet wants your ideas on the college restructuring proposal. You may attend a hearing or ask a cabinet member to come to a meeting of your own, whether a staff meeting or an informal get-together of your colleagues. Needed are your questions, comments, concerns, and rationale

for suggested changes.

President Jerry Moskus intends restructuring to help Lane thrive in changing times. In case that sounds familiar, he talked about it at the all-staff meeting on Sept. 27. He first distributed his ideas to College Council on Sept. 7, and it has been the topic of weekly Executive Cabinet meetings for months. The president's Dec. 2 memo, "A Vision for Restructuring," was distributed to all staff and the Board of Education the week of Dec. 6.

Moskus relied on college unifying principles, mission and vision statements to guide his thinking. Those documents were created over the last few years by College Council and the board.

Written feedback should be sent to the President's Office. Your signature is requested; this is a participatory process.

The first round of hearings will be held through January. Based on feedback, a revised proposal will go out Feb. 9. February 28 is the target date for a final version.
