#### Ethnic diversity project kicks off today

College Council will participate in an orientation to the Institute on Ethnic Diversity, an interactive, participatory, campus-based process to develop and build strategic diversity plans and initiatives. The orientation is today from 1:30-3:30 p.m. in the Board Room and will be presented by representatives from the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education. Council has been asked to serve as the core leadership group for the institute.

#### Commissioner's proposal hard on Lane

Oregon community college commissioner Roger Bassett submitted a funding equalization proposal to the colleges' presidents last month that would cost Lane \$8 million in state funding, said President Jerry Moskus on Monday. Lane had projected it would lose less than \$4 million due to equalization. Moskus believes the commissioner listened carefully to objections and will make a second proposal.

Moskus said, "Ironically, under an equalized state funding system, having had good support from local voters in the past is a handicap; having had weak support is an advantage. Lane had relatively good support." He added that the commissioner's proposal was a not-so-gentle reminder that we must stay on the track of providing quality learning experiences while reducing costs as much as possible. "Our goal is to meet the needs of learners even with reduced resources. Given the skill and resourcefulness of our staff, I think we can meet that goal. But people will have to be ready to accept some changes."

#### Informational picket staged

Plumbers and Steamfitters Local 290 staged an informational picket of Servco Inc., of Lebanon, on Monday morning near the Gonyea Road entrance to main campus. Servco is doing air handling upgrade work in the auto body paint shop. Servco was low bidder. The Board of Education awarded the bid after directing an investigation into complaints by union spokesperson Mike Carmickle at the Nov. 10 board meeting. Carmickle questioned Servco's qualifications and said that it was a non-union company and that his union might picket. The staff investigation showed no outstanding problems with the vendor. Oregon law requires public institutions to accept qualified low bids and prohibits exclusion of non-union bidders. Bidders must pay prevailing wages on public contracts.

An informational picket involves distributing information but does not signify a grievance. Lane's faculty and classified union contracts and Oregon statute all prohibit employees from interrupting work due to informational pickets.

Gregory is a civil rights activist and lectures at colleges throughout the United States. He was born in St. Louis in 1932 and was a star college track athlete. He began performing comedy while in the army. Later he became known for hard-hitting satire along with two others: "Mort Sahl handled the political revolution, Lenny Bruce challenged sexual and religious conventions, and Dick Gregory was the voice of the rising civil rights movement," according to Ronald L. Smith, editor of "Who's Who in Comedy." Gregory ran for president in 1968 on the Peace and Freedom Party ticket. He quit stand-up in the early 1970s. He also is an expert on nutrition and vegetarian diet.

Executive Cabinet answered questions and offered thoughts at the first open hearing on President Jerry Moskus' college restructuring proposal on Monday. Some random highlights:

The audience indicated consensus that the college must respond to the forces of change listed in the proposal, and that restructuring may be one way to do that.

This is really about changing the way we work, and work together.

Changing the way we work will pose challenges to existing employee contracts.

Include a team to constantly sort through the forces of change and prioritizing them according to

the best overall interests of the college.

Drop the term "learner" and stick with "student."

Name and include part-time faculty (and other part-time staff) in the plan. If changing the way we work, consider assigning part-timers to matrix or project teams when not busy with classloads or their regular jobs.

Don't necessarily eliminate rules, just make them simpler.

Develop a sense of group responsibility. The next open hearing is set for Monday, Jan. 10, 5:30-6:30 p.m., in the cafeteria



# College Council learns more about diversity institute

Of key importance is achieving a common definition of diversity, if not a change of attitude, behaviors and circumstances, shared by all members of the college community, on campus or off. Leadership and kinship in the process are critical, said facilitators. President Jerry Moskus said of all the issues facing Lane, this may be the most important.

Also attending the presentation were representatives from the University of Oregon, the City of Eugene, and Eugene Public Schools.

### Business Development Center works for continuous quality



Santa crashed a discussion on continuous quality improvement at the BDC last month to give Jerry Moskus a pair of scissors for cutting red tape and Marie Matsen some tea for the hot water she gets into.

President Jerry Moskus and his assistant Marie Matsen visited the Business Development Center last month to hear about its project in continuous quality improvement. Learning CQI is like learning a second language, said director Jane Scheidecker. "Assume you are a native English speaker and you need to learn Spanish to deal with an increasing Spanish-speaking population. All around you, only English is being spoken, but we are trying to become fluent in Spanish. Well, for the time being, we have to speak English because that is how we get 99% of our work done. But we want to use Spanish whenever possible so we can become fluent as soon as possible." This requires working in two systems simultaneously and expending extra effort, says Scheidecker.

Small business instructor-coordinator Bill Dotson has used CQI methods for years, but has added a whole

system philosophy now. "I was cynical at first because I had been through all the philosophical shifts at Lane over many years. But I am seeing real positive change here. And I'm doing some changing in the way I think."

#### Athletics Department founds a hall of fame



#### Lane and U of O partner on Talent Search grant proposal

Staff from the University of Oregon Upward Bound Math/Science program and staff from Lane Community College's Counseling and Adult Basic and Secondary Education departments have worked together over the past months to prepare a grant proposal for the federally-funded Talent Search program. The proposal was mailed Dec. 22. If funded, the program will encourage qualified youths ages 11 to 27 years to complete secondary school and undertake a program of postsecondary education. Lane will implement program services designed for individuals in alternative secondary education programs and those re-entering postsecondary education. Services will include career and educational counseling, assistance in filling out admissions and financial aid forms, tutoring, and specially designed career and life planning classes. Lane will serve 600 students in alternative secondary education or reentry programs. The U of O will serve 100 middle school students and 500 high school students.

The first year budget request totals \$496,113, with approximately \$207,000 for services provided by Lane. The initial grant cycle would be four or five years, with an opportunity for continued funding cycles after that. Lane will help train Sony employees and has been working with Sony since October 1993 to determine its start-up and ongoing workforce training needs. About \$300,000 in state lottery funds will support the cost of training. Up to 300 local people are expected to be hired for the start-up. Sony plans to build a 250,000 square foot facility in the McKenzie-Gateway Corporate Park, breaking ground in April. They hope to produce 3 million discs per month with manufacturing to begin in the fall of 1995.

The college will help provide training in quality improvement and statistical process control, statistical math review, trouble shooting and diagnosis, problem solving, team communication skills,

criteria defect training, computer software training, and plastic manufacturing.

Moskus shared the announcement at College Council. "This is quite a coup for Springfield and for Lane. Our partnership with Symantec gave us credibility. I understand the jobs will be fairly highpaying at \$30,000 and up. This will really help our area.

#### Board report

Commissioner Roger Bassett submitted a second proposal on community college funding equalization on Jan. 12, said President Jerry Moskus at the Board of Education meeting. The new proposal would cost Lane about \$3.5 million, rather than the \$8 million suggested in the first proposal.

The board granted permission to staff to participate in a statewide request for state approval of an emergency medical technician degree program. If approved by the state, internal college approval for a degree programwould be sought. Lane currently offers EMT courses through Continuing Education.

Board member Larry Mann outlined suggestions for pursuing bond funding for current and new capital projects. The board directed the president to submit a decision-making plan at the next board meeting including the budget calendar, long range planning, and shared decision-making process.

The board decided to keep its contract award authority after a second reading of a recommendation to delegate that authority to staff.

Moskus gave board members a chance to comment on the restructuring proposal distributed to them and all staff the week of Dec. 6. Chair Peter Sorenson said to make sure advisory committee members and other volunteers be given a chance to comment.

President Moskus continues to do an outstanding job, Sorenson said, announcing that the president's annual performance evaluation is complete. Board member Cindy Weeldreyer, participating via telephone, said, "People still come up to me and thank me for my role as a board member in having selected Jerry as our president."

The board instructed its attorney to write letters to the City of Eugene and Lane Transit District regarding its concern about loss of parking from the proposed LTD terminal. The terminal would be built across from the college Downtown Center and would cost 176 parking spaces currently favored by students and staff. Sorenson will write LTD and ask for a joint board meeting, and staff will determine sale value of the DTC and consider relocating its programs.

The board believed itself to be over its travel and outside services budgets and authorized a transfer from its contingency fund to cover the gap. However, the next morning a calculation error revealed that the board is still within its travel budget and Assistant to the President Marie Matsen said she will not make the transfer.

In other business, the board awarded a food supply contract to Sysco Food Services of Portland, approved the college year-end audit, approved routine transfer of funds for 1993-94, and postponed a discussion on grading standards. The next regularly scheduled meeting is Feb. 9.

#### \$600,000 gift will fund scholarships to Lane

An anonymous Eugene couple has pledged \$600,000 to Lane for student scholarships. The couple established a trust that will create an endowment upon their deaths. One student from each of the eight Eugene-Springfield area high schools will be selected annually to receive a two-year scholarship to Lane at \$3,500 per year. Additional two-year awards will be given to students who choose to continue their education at four-year institutions. Recipients will be selected based on financial need, a grade point average of 2.5 or better, and an inability to qualify for other scholarships or grants.

When you first decide to seek funding: Read the Grants Manual! Complete and circulate Grant Review Form, Part A, Preliminary Approval.

As early as possible: Develop draft of proposal. The Grant Writer's Workbook is a good guide. No later than 10 working days prior to mailing: Provide drafts to Financial Services and

Institutional Advancement for review.

No later than five working days prior to mailing: Circulate one copy of final proposal and one copy of funding source guidelines and Parts A and B of college form to people on list for sign-off.

No later than three working days prior to mailing: See that final proposal has reached President's

Office for signature.

The timeline allows key players in the grant development and review process time to consider your proposal carefully. By adhering to the timeline, your chances of developing a high quality project and proposal with strong institutional support are increased.
