College Council report

Tuition may be low, but what about fees?

Even if a \$4 tuition increase kept Lane tuition low compared to other two-year Oregon colleges, would it be such a bargain if fees were counted? President Jerry Moskus put that question to College Council on March 1. Last month the LCC Board of Education indicated a preference for a \$4 tuition hike to avoid program cuts in balancing the 1994-95 budget. The Tuition Committee has since recommended a \$5 increase.

A majority of council members favored the \$4 increase. They said most students say they'd rather pay higher tuition than lose a program. But Moskus warned that even while a \$4 or \$5 increase would keep Lane's tuition relatively low statewide, fees at Lane may be quite high. Administrators have been unable to find a reliable comparison of statewide fees because colleges define and account for fees differently. However, at least one study cited by Moskus figured the state average to be \$9, compared to Lane's \$45. Council members expressed a diversity of opinions as to why this is, how accurate it is, whether fees are needed, and how fair they are. Moskus said he will recommend to the board appointment of a committee to review all class fees. He also will recommend the \$4 increase plus program changes in manufacturing technology and conversion of cabinet and furniture making to noncredit; as well as a policy to set out-of-state/international tuition rates at 1/45 of the estimated average cost per FTE (one FTE equals 45 credit hours annually) to allow out-of-state/international tuition to rise or fall with changes in the total college budget.

A \$4 increase would bring 1994-95 tuition to \$30 per credit hour for in-state. Other tuitions would be \$105 per credit hour for out-of-state/international, \$48 per high school credit for Adult High School, and \$50 per 30-hour class for noncredit. The traditional 50 percent discount for in-state senior citizens would be maintained.

In other news and business:

Council selected meeting facilitation and management as its first training topic.

ASLCC is preparing ballot initiatives that would increase student fees. The initiatives would require board approval by April for a student vote in May.

Faculty Council still has no representative to College Council. The next regularly scheduled College Council meeting is set for March 15.

As of March 1, the Joint Review Committee had heard and STUDY decided by consensus 36 appeals of job class assignments, under provisions outlined in the classified union contract. 
KLCC gets best-ever ratings





Board report

Tuition increased by \$4

The Lane Community College Board of Education voted 6-0 in favor of a \$4 tuition increase at its March 9 meeting. Jim Pitney was absent. The increase fills a \$1.3 million projected deficit in the 1994-95 budget without eliminating programs.

The vote came after two failed motions and an off-track discussion of the cabinet making program. Failing first was a motion to adopt the Tuition Committee's recommendation of a \$5 per in-state credit hour increase. Failing next was a motion was to amend international/out-of-state tuition to \$95 to reflect a dollar-for-dollar increase rather than a percentage increase. International student counselor Mason Davis advocated a dollar-for-dollar increase as more humane than a percentage increase. Protests by three students invited discussion about a proposal to change the cabinet making program to noncredit. The proposal was not up for vote but included in documentation as one of many changes to be considered in further budget planning.

The complete tuition package approved:

- \$30 per in-state credit hour, up \$4 from \$26 in 1993-94.
- \$105 per out-of-state/international credit hour, up \$14 from \$91.
- \$48 per Adult High School credit, up \$6 from \$42.
- \$50 per 30-hour noncredit class, up \$7 from \$43.
- The 50 percent discount for in-state senior citizens remained unchanged, meaning they will pay \$15 per credit hour.

The new tuitions will be incorporated into the continuing budget process. The process includes college budget subcommittee meetings between March 28 and April 15, and Executive Cabinet decision making on staff project budget requests. The full Lane Community College Budget Committee will meet on May 11, 18 and 25. The committee will hold a public hearing and adopt the budget on June 22.

In other business:

- ASLCC President Steve Cheeseman distributed a draft of student referendums and initiatives which will be up for board approval in April in order to be put to student vote in May. ASLCC will ask students to approve a \$5 increase in student fees to reinstate or enhance existing athletics programs, plus another \$8.75 increase to subsidize a bus pass. Lane President Jerry Moskus warned against overburdening students through fees, and cautioned the board about allowing program decisions to be made by student vote rather than board decision making.
- Coopers & Lybrand won continuing appointment as the college auditor.
- Board policy revisions were adopted excluding a few still under review.

The next regularly scheduled meeting is April 13.

summers of Montana wasn't my idea of a great life. I wanted to go west and explore the Pacific Coast," he once wrote.

He earned a bachelor's degree in biology and served as student body president at Eastern Montana College in Billings. He taught high school for four years at Moses

Billings. He taught high school for four years at Moses Lake, Washington, and then received a National Science Foundation fellowship to complete a master's degree at the University of Oregon. Jay came to Lane in the fall of 1968, the first term that classes were held on the present campus. He called his new post a "plum of a job ... where I was allowed to pursue my interest in coastal and field biology."

Jay Marston, biology instructor at Lane since 1968,

died at home of cancer on March 19 at the age of 52. Jay

grew up on a ranch 60 miles from the nearest town in the "Big Sky Country" of Eastern Montana. "Feeding cows in the frigid winters and running fence in the blistering

Jay developed the core program for biology majors.

He became involved with other faculty developing the

Jay Marston

He became involved with other faculty developing the biology emphasis courses, a new concept for introductory biology in Oregon community colleges. Jay was well known for his innovative courses in Poisonous and Edible Plants, Medical Botany, and Plants and People which attracted attention far beyond Lane's campus. He developed a personal style of involved interactive teaching with a focus on practical, hands-on experience. Characteristic of this approach were his courses in the Biology of the San Juans, in which instructor and students bicycled through those islands learning the flora and fauna, and Coastal Field Biology, a course taught exclusively while backpacking with the students along the Oregon and Washington coast. At one time this program involved four different instructors integrating coursework on their trek along the Olympic national seashore, perhaps Lane's first coordinated studies program. Jay won Lane's Outstanding Instructor of the Year Award in 1979.

Jay played a role in numerous community activities, including the Mt. Pisgah Arboretum Society, and gave talks and wrote articles on ethnobotany. He helped establish the present council governance structure at Lane based on shared decision making. He served for two years as president of the Lane Community College Education Association. A favorite hobby was

exploring the beaches of the Gulf of Mexico.

When he learned he had terminal cancer in October 1993, he established the Jay Marston Endowment Fund to provide scholarships to science students who need financial help. College Council report

Proposed student ballot measures

Two ASLCC ballot measures for the 1994 student election were presented in draft form to Council at its March 15 meeting. ASLCC is proposing an additional \$5 fee per student per term be accessed to provide expanded sport and recreational programs that would include recreational offerings for all Lane students and their families. In addition, ASLCC is asking for an \$8.75 increase in student body fees for the first year followed by an approximate three percent increase the second year, allowing for inflation, to provide a universal bus pass through LTD to all ASLCC members. After language revisions, both ballot measures will be presented to the Board. Harland Yriarte, Athletic director, was available to address questions and concerns about the enhanced recreational program. Council expressed concerns about the availability of space for the sport and recreation program and potentially negative effects on enrollment due to increased fees.

Other business

A framing committee was appointed to develop objectives for an expanded committee that will deal with income credit program (ICP) fees.
