Second Place, April is Community College Month Student Essay Contest

I attended Lane Community College from the fall of 1985 to the spring of 1987. When first entering the school, I was 30 years old and nervous about going to college. I was also eager to learn. Thankfully, the teachers and staff at LCC gave me everything I needed to go for success. Caring people provided me with assistance and opportunities, and a quality education prepared me for transfer to the University of Oregon. I recently returned to sample a few courses for my professional growth and personal enrichment. To my delight, I discovered the caring and quality that I experienced nine years ago still exists at LCC today.

My first experiences at LCC were with admissions counselors, testing staff and the people in the financial aid office, all of whom eased me into my first year of college. I soon discovered that I had a fantastic and confusing choice of classes to take. Academic advisors helped me pick courses that fulfilled my transfer requirements. The staff's concern for my academic future made an immediate and positive impression on me.

I was also impressed with my instructors, and I remember a few of them with special fondness. Milt Madden taught U.S. history with such flair that I often found myself traveling back in times as he described important events that shaped our country. Bill Burrows made a year of economics interesting and understandable with his unique wit and unconventional teaching aids. English instructors sparked my interest in literature and nurtured my writing. In physics, I had hands-on experience with every class experiment. My science teacher's enthusiasm helped me to appreciate the infinite creation of our universe. My classes were often inspiring and challenging. LCC prepared me well for my transfer to the University of Oregon. During my two years at Lane, I was never disappointed in the quality of my education.

Available and caring instructors greatly enhanced my experience at Lane. Teachers usually had the time to see me and to answer questions about assignments. Instructors provided answers, or the guidance to finding the answers, and encouragement. As an older student, I first felt a little out of place in college. That feeling soon disappeared. Teachers gave me advice on

how to achieve my academic best and challenged me with wonderful opportunities to learn. Cooperative Education coordinator Peggy Marston exemplifies the caring attitude of the teachers at Lane. She opened many doors that led to my personal and professional growth. My writing instructors also provided guidance. They encouraged me to tutor other students and to apply my craft professionally. As a result, I have found work and a greater understanding of myself through my writing.

When I returned to LCC a few months ago, I saw many of my past instructors. After all these years, they still care. Teachers greeted me enthusiastically and asked about my life with genuine interest. I felt as if I had returned home. With a sense of nostalgia, I visited Milt Madden's U.S. history class and found he still can transport students to a different time and place. In the middle of his lecture, he began to sing a Civil War song and continued by reading an eyewitness report of the times. His students were rapt with attention, and so was I.

Those students reflect the quality and caring atmosphere at LCC. I see them smile and acknowledge their fellow human beings. I hear them share about challenging classes and express their satisfaction with their education. I look at them and see myself and my fellow students of nine years ago. Clothes and hairstyles have changed some, but the desire to learn remains the same. In my travels around campus, I see that the staff and teachers at LCC still feed the mind and the spirit.

LCC is again providing me with sustenance. The college offers a tremendous choice of appealing classes, particularly in continuing education. An admissions advisor helped me pick a suitable course, and my teacher, who is well qualified, has imparted valuable information. Having tasted the menu, I will return for another helping. Lifelong education is important to me for my personal growth and professional advancement. The instructors and staff at LCC are also important to me, for they gave me what I needed nine years ago. I am pleased they are still here for me today.

Faculty Council report

At its April 14 meeting, Faculty Council heard the results of a **grading policy** survey conducted among faculty and some students by counselor Betty Vail and math instructor Jill McKenney. The survey listed four options: Replace the Y grade with a NC for no credit, add no credit with Y, retain Y and limit the conditions under which it can be used, and eliminate the Y and don't add NC. Most faculty favored the first option. Council will ask The Torch to print council's recommendation that the first option be implemented. Council also will hold an open forum on the issue at its April 28 meeting. Vice President Jim Ellison said a change could be implemented as soon as fall term. He asked Vail to check with admissions, financial aid, and veteran services to see if the grading policy would meet federal standards.

After a brief discussion of the part-time full time faculty issue, math instructor Joyce Fish suggested the council write a draft of its concerns and forward it to the Future Faculty Task Force. Fish said this would allow the council to bring some closure to the matter and to move onto to other issues. Fish will draft the document for council and bring it to the next meeting for review.

Dr. Larry Warford, vice president for Community and Economic Development, has received the 1994 National Leadership Award for professionals in the field from the National Council on Community Services and Continuing Education. When I first came to LCC I was experiencing changes in my life which made functioning normally quite difficult. I was separating from my husband, and it was necessary for me to abandon all my belongings and my home. I had no income, no address and no phone, but at least for the present we had transportation. I knew that to support my four children I would have to update my computer skills. With this in mind I approached LCC.

Everyone I spoke to was helpful, informative, and sincerely caring. I was even loaned the money to pay the processing fee then required by financial aid. I was assisted in selecting a major based on my work experience and interests.

I began my first term feeling like a child again. I visited the school before the term started to locate all my classrooms so I wouldn't look lost or be late for any classes. When the term began, all my instructors were enthusiastic about their subjects and imparted in me what someone described to me once as an insatiable thirst for knowledge.

I remember the first two weeks of school, I would sit in front of the computer and not know if I wanted to communicate in BASIC, get into WordPerfect, or goodness, maybe I should be over at a Mac! Needless to say there were some very calm and knowledgeable lab employees that helped me every step of the way.

My problems were far from over, though. Without a reliable address, communications to me were delayed resulting in a delay in my financial aid. As I couldn't pay for the term just completed, I couldn't enroll in the next term. Unfortunately, I needed the second part of a class that term which would allow me to sit for a state licensing exam. A wonderful instructor allowed me to attend the class event though I wasn't officially enrolled and even switched me to another class when my car decided to stop running and transportation became a problem. Approximately two weeks before the end of the class, my financial aid for the previous term came through clearing up that term and allowing me to enroll in the class I had been attending in the current term.

I now had the problem of paying for this course. Once again some really helpful people assisted me in obtaining a courtesy appointment and another problem was solved. I also passed the State Licensing test, my first accomplishment at LCC.

In every class I have attended there have been students with a drive to learn and to do their best. There have also been instructors willing to impart not only knowledge but enthusiasm. Subjects were presented in a way that transcended the classroom to the "real world." With these people around me it wasn't hard to do my best. I would have been content with that, but an instructor encouraged me to investigate and apply for scholarships. I have now obtained some scholarships and met some very interesting people because of it.

The caring and kindness of the staff has even extended to my family. Staff at the campus have located me when my children have become sick or needed me. Instructors have allowed my children to sit in class with me when they had no school, and child care was not an option. When one of my children was hospitalized last year, I was able to keep in touch with all of my instructors by phone and keep on top of all my work.

I have also been able to work at one of Lane's outreach campuses because of the work study program. One of the greatest rewards of that job is to be able to help students and even to assist instructors. There's a sense of family there. I sense the same feeling at the business department on main campus where I've spent most of my time at Lane.

Every class I have attended has given me more knowledge, more enthusiasm, and more confidence. My only regret is that my time left at Lane is growing short. I will miss being here. I can only hope that, wherever I go, I will meet people with the same caring, enthusiasm, pride and professionalism as I have during my time here at Lane. I take with me pride and confidence that has been bestowed on me through the quality and caring of my experience with LCC.

Continuing Education's strategy to take classes into the community continues to enjoy success:

Emerald Job Center - 7 noncredit classes, 91 students

Survey rates business center services

Independent researchers in the U.S. and Canada have found small business development centers to be highly effective. Some highlights from the 1990-91 economic impact survey:

Established SBDC clients had 7.78% sales growth rates vs. the average U.S. business rate of 1.13%.

Pre-venture clients benefiting from counseling averaged \$161,185 in sales in 1991.

Established clients employment growth was 6.49% vs. the average U.S. business rate of 0.58%.

3.19 new jobs were created by each pre-venture SBDC client.

SBDC services led to over \$85 million in new tax contributions from established clients and \$203 million from pre-venture clients due to sales and employment increases.

Tax revenues generated by established businesses were over three times as large as the portion of the budget devoted to them.

Tax revenues generated by the pre-venture clients returned \$1.84 for every dollar expended by all SBDCs in the U.S.

In addition, Oregon surveys from last year also show that sales increased by 19 percent, net profits increased by 35 percent, payroll increased by 19 percent, part-time employment rose by 21 percent, and full-time employment rose by 16 percent.

The first SBDC program was established at Lane in 1984 and became a nationwide model. Lane is home to the Oregon Small Business Development Centers Network, headquarters for the state's 20 SBDCs. Edward (Sandy) Cutler directs OSBDCN.
