College Council report

President Jerry Moskus advised College Council at its April 19 meeting that the community college presidents and the Office of Community College Services have hammered out six optional funding formulas. He said that while the funding formula presents a problem for colleges historically well-funded by local taxpayers like Lane, a bigger problem is no new revenue. "We could be levelfunded for years, as salaries and costs increase.

Lane may get less than a 10-year accreditation this year because accrediting agencies are themselves under intense scrutiny from the federal government and expected to be tough, said Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts, director of Research, Planning & Evaluation and coordinator of Lane's accreditation self-study. The agencies have been criticized for inconsistent standards, quality control, and operating as a closed network. She said to expect questions about general educational requirements, effectiveness assessment, faculty evaluation, and funding and resources. Lane received 10-year accreditation twice in the past.

The subcommittee on class and registration fees was not ready to report. The next regular meeting of College Council will be Tuesday, May 3, 1:30-3 p.m., Boardroom.

Classified Council hears about campus clean-up

Faculty Council reacts to substance abuse proposal

Substance Abuse Prevention Coordinator Mark Harris presented his recommendation for a revision of Lane's current substance abuse policy to Faculty Council at its April 28 meeting. Harris said he is recommending abstinence from illegal drugs, and no use of alcohol during work hours. In his report, Harris provided the council with suggested levels of alcohol to be consumed during nonwork hours when such use would affect work hours. He says the current policy meets federal standards but does not clearly define the word abuse. Harris says he would also recommend using a .04 blood alcohol level as a defined standard of abuse. Some council members felt the revised policy would be too strict and asked Harris to provide more evidence that Lane might have a problem that would warrant the revisions. Harris agreed to research the matter and return to the council at a later date.

In other business, the council discussed sending a memo outlining the council's position on the full time/part-time faculty issue to the Future Faculty Task Force and the Full Time/Part-time Committee of College Council. Joyce Fish, co-facilitator of the Faculty Council, prepared a rough draft summarizing the council's concerns. The council made some revisions, then asked Fish to send the memo. -by Arlene Hougland for The Daily

LaMaster chosen for national leadership program for women



Grants Manual and Grant Writer's Workbook available

If you are developing a grant proposal or thinking about seeking funding for a special project, be sure to get the Grants Manual and Grant Writer's Workbook from Institutional Advancement. These booklets contain helpful information about grant development, grant writing, and the college's grants procedures and timelines. Also, review the grants administrator responsibilities described in Section A-8c of the Business Operations Manual (BOM). Grant developers should keep these deadlines in mind:

When you first decide to seek funding—
Read the Grants Manual! Review Section A-8c of the BOM!

Complete and circulate Grant Review Form, Part A, Preliminary Approval.

As early as possible-

Develop draft of proposal. The Grant Writer's Workbook is a good guide.

No later than 10 working days prior to mailing—
Provide drafts to Financial Services and Institutional Advancement for review.

No later than 5 working days prior to mailing-

Circulate 1 copy of final proposal and 1 copy of funding source guidelines and Parts A and B of college form to people on list for sign-off.

No later than 3 working days prior to mailing-

See that final proposal has reached President's Office for signature.

The timeline is designed to allow key players in the grant development and review process time to consider your proposal carefully. By adhering to the timeline, your chances of developing a high quality proposal with strong institutional support are increased. Flight Tech offers summer option for pilot instruction

Flight Technology Department Chair Bob Farrand advises that professional pilot instruction will be available summer term beginning June 20. The summer option is designed for students with time-critical airline aspirations who will now be able to accelerate their primary training during the summer and be eligible for advanced commercial/instrument training by fall term. The summer option will offer regular classes in flight theory and cockpit procedure. In addition, students will be scheduled to fly at least four-andone-half hours per week.

Flight Technology students learn to fly in a fleet of more than a dozen late-model and fully-equipped Cessna and Piper aircraft owned by the college, supplemented by an AST300 flight simulator. All flights are dispatched from the LCC Flight Technology Center at Eugene Airport. The program is accredited by the Federal Aviation Administration, the Oregon State Board of Higher Education, and the Veterans Administration.





Restructuring highlights

Last week, President Jerry Moskus distributed a May 11 all-staff memo describing the vision for restructuring. If you didn't get one, call Ext. 2200 for a copy. The memo offers complete information, plus drawings of the new structure. As the college's newspaper of record, The Daily offers a few highlights.

The need for restructuring is to keep Lane strong and responsive to change. Change has occurred in the environment, technology, political climate, leadership, and increasing demand for service. Some examples: Measure 5, education reform, changes in technology, a turnover in leadership, and a shift to shared decision making.

Guidance was provided by the vision statement, mission statement, unifying principles, various planning documents and research, and by staff feedback from across campus.

Some characteristics:

- quality
- · dedication to the learner
- teamwork
- broad employee participation in decision making and problem solving
- management by coaching, advising, facilitating
- free exchange of information
- employee training
- · use of technology--in the classroom, in the office
- vision, not bureaucracy

The new structure replaces the traditional administrative branches with four groups: Instructional Services, College Operations, Executive Services, and Student Services. Within the four groups are clusters of similar departments. Departments have retained their identities.

Instructional Services combines what was formerly Instruction and Community and Economic Development. Because of its size, it will be led by two vice presidents. This group has 10 clusters, six of which are based on the Certificate of Advanced Mastery strands adopted by the State Board of Education as part of education reform.

Quotes from "Vision for Restructuring"

"The college must change to adapt to a new and highly dynamic environment."

"The vision outlined here requires changes in fundamental values, changes in the way we work and in our work relationships, and training for all employees."

"Success ... will depend on our combined commitment to ... staff training; examining our internal policies and procedures, changing those that hinder service to students; and changing our reward systems to encourage behaviors that support the values of teamwork, quality, and service."

"In place of bureaucratic rules we must establish guiding visions."

"We must examine each of our processes to ensure that they are meeting learners' needs. We must work as efficiently as possible."

"The most important activities at Lane are teaching and learning."

"Above all, we must care-- about quality instruction, about Lane, about learners, about each other."

College Operations replaces Administrative Services and will be led by a vice president for whom a search process is underway. The group exists to provide quality services to staff and learners.

Executive Services is based on the former President's Office branch. It will lead and facilitate the new structure.

Student Services, the same name as the former branch, exists to provide quality services to learners.

Board report

The Lane Community College Board of Education took prepatory steps towards a possible November bond election at its May 11 meeting. Approved by unanimous 6-0 votes were agreements to retain Seattle-Northwest Securities Corporation as bond investment banker and Ater Wynne Hewitt Dodson & Skerritt as bond legal counsel. Fee payment is contingent upon voters approving the bond issue. The board also approved a resolution allowing the college to reimburse itself for pre-election expenses from bond proceeds, in the event of election success. Chair Peter Sorenson emphasized that these actions did not constitute a decision to go for a bond election. "The discussion is open," he said. Board member Jim Pitney was absent.

Bid awards for parking lot repaving and purchase of annual paper supplies raised concerns. On the first issue, Chair Sorenson questioned spending money on parking lot repaving while having rejected a student bus pass. "We're getting a major transportation problem and we need to do something. Let's do more than pave a lot." Other board members agreed, but recalled rejecting only the price and terms of the last bus pass offer, and still seek an affordable pass. In the meantime, parking lots need to be maintained. The board awarded a repaving contract for \$317,000 to Wildish Construction Company with a 6-0 vote.

On the paper supplies bid, board member Roger Hall said the college should purchase only recycled paper. The recommended contract included a large quantity of virgin paper. The board postponed the contract award and directed staff to collect more information on recycled paper and its cost compared to the total college budget.

In other business:

- Florence property donated to the LCC Foundation was transferred to general college ownership for educational use, such as a science field lab.
- Jason Rackley was welcomed as the new president of ASLCC. Outgoing president Steve Cheeseman was commended for his service.
- LCCEA president Donald Micken introduced president-elect Dennis Gilbert.
- The final restructuring document was distributed, along with an announcement that the search for a vice president of college operations was drawing to a close.
- A report on education reform was given by Vice President for Instruction Jim Ellison. The next regular board meeting will be June 8.

Council learns more about network, bond

Requests for proposals for a collegewide computer network have been issued, Linda Loft reported to College Council at its May 17 meeting. A planning committee hopes for a December installation start date. All campuses are in line to be on-line. Surveys show people want all offices and classrooms wired. Loft predicted that the network would foster major use of E-Mail, sharing of software, and use of services like Internet. She said that school district 4J Internet usage went from 30,000 packets a day to 1 billion packets a day in nine months. A packet is a unit of information. Finally, Loft said, all-staff training on the network will be imperative.

Council discussed a possible bond election in November to finance facilities and equipment needs. President Jerry Moskus said the idea originated from the board and has been accelerated by two things. The accreditation self-study report points out many needs, and a statewide initiative headed for the November ballot called "Son of 5" would require voter approval of any fee increase by any state institution and also would prevent schools and colleges from asking for a bond for two years. Although the board has not yet actually voted to go out for a bond election, it has directed staff to get ready for that possibility. That means identifying facilities projects and equipment needs in a very short time, said Moskus. The board needs data and a dollar recommendation in order to take an informed vote. Board action is expected in August to meet a Sept. 5 deadline to get on the November ballot. Architects would need to be involved by mid-June. Facilities needs with an eye to the future must be documented by then. Although the accreditation self-study, construction priorities list from the Facilities Management Committee and other information already exists, staff should be asked for additional input, council members agreed. Kate Barry suggested taking input as well as giving information at an all-staff meeting on Monday, May 23, from 3-4 p.m., in Performing Arts main hall, called by Executive Cabinet. Council will review a list of project selection criteria from Executive Cabinet at a special meeting on Tuesday, May 31, from 3-5 p.m., in PE 205.

Building speaks for itself

As if in agreement with the idea of a bond election to finance facilities needs, the Center Building dropped a sheet of siding Monday, minutes after an all-staff meeting on the issue. President Jerry Moskus, board member Larry Mann, and others witnessed the panel fall from the west side upper level. "It was pretty shocking," said the president. "I'm grateful no one was hurt." Campus Services cordoned off the area and will be inspecting all the building panels.

Moskus had just told about 100 employees that available funding will not meet facilities needs identified in existing studies, the accreditation self-study, and other sources. Under Measure 5, the college can't ask for another tax base, but can ask for a bond to meet those needs. Bond funds may be spent on construction,

equipment, furniture, or land.

Also driving the question are board member Larry Mann's plan to improve outreach by building or equipping facilities throughout the district in cooperation with other public agencies, loss of funding under statewide equalization, and the so-called Son of 5 initiative which

would require voter approval on all state fee increases and prevent schools from asking for a bond for at least two years.

A board decision is expected in August to make the deadline for the Nov. 8 election. Projects must be identified now. A May 20 memo to department managers lists possible projects. Moskus asked staff to work through departments and clusters to make sure nothing important has been left off the list. Additions should be forwarded to Campus Services Director Paul Colvin by June 3. Executive Cabinet

is discussing project selection criteria and will ask College Council to do the same.

The president asked employees for their support. "There are three things you can do," he said. "Think of needs not already on the list, think of strategies for identifying the most important ones, and become informed." He cautioned that Oregon law prohibits public employees from advocating for or

against an issue while at work, but allows the dissemination of neutral information.
