The graying of Lane County

From 1980-92 the total population of Lane County grew nearly 7 percent. The real story, however, is that the number of those under age 30 decreased in that period by 13 percent, while the number of those over age 30 increased by nearly 29 percent.

Three factors account for much of this: (1) The aging of the large baby-boom generation; (2)

wholesale departure of younger Lane citizens; and (3) an influx of many older folks.

The implications for all this for Lane seem clear. A continuing increase in the average student age; an increasing need to adjust programs, policies and services to address the needs of older students; and increasing competition among four-year institutions for a decreasing population of traditional 18-24-year-old college-entry students. 





Athletic fee determined

The Lane Community College Board of Education on June 8 voted unanimously to spend 75 percent of the new \$5 student activities fee on restoring four sports programs immediately for a twoyear period. The remaining 25 percent will fund recreation programs for other students and their families. To be reinstated are men's and women's cross county, men's baseball, and women's volleyball

Before voting, the board heard from President Jerry Moskus. He presented the College Council recommendation from its meeting the day before. Six councilors favored phasing in the four sports over time, eight voted to not restore the sports, and of these 14, five also said their first choice would be to delay the until better budget and program information was available. The board also heard from Athletic Director Harland Yriarte and Student Activities Director Barb Delansky. In addition, several students and community members in the audience spoke in favor of restoring the four sports.

The board recalled cutting the four sports in 1992. Said board member Larry Mann, "Two years ago we said we'd add them back if funding was found, and it's been found." While other board members supported keeping that commitment, board member Roger Hall pointed out that the student ballot did not specify that the fee would be used only on sports, but also on recreational programs for students and their families. Thus the board specified a split in its motion.

Other questions raised included what would happen to a fee-funded program if enrollment dropped, if the fee were repealed by a later vote, or if general fund sports were cut due to governor's budget mandates, state equalization of funding, or other factors outside of Lane's control.

The decision-making process itself came into question. Board member Roger Hall said program decisions should not be made by "department lobbying." Board member Pat Riggs-Henson said that this was really a board decision. Moskus said it was not customary for the board to take action at the same meeting an issue was first discussed, in order for more study to be made. Mann called for an immediate vote so that this year's high school athlete-graduates could be recruited.

More board news

From the June 8 Board of Education meeting (also see "Athletic" item, first page):

President Jerry Moskus' contract was renewed, effective March 1, 1994 through February 28, 1997. Chair Peter Sorenson said, "We are very fortunate to have a leader of Jerry's qualifications and expertise. He has guided us in countless ways." Moskus joined Lane in 1990.
