

Board agenda highlights

The Board of Education will hold a work session with Roger Basset on Wednesday, July 13, at 5:30 p.m. in the Renaissance Room. At 6:30 p.m. Basset will hold a public meeting on state government in the Boardroom. An executive session will be held following the regular meeting. The regular meeting begins at 7:30 p.m. in the Boardroom. Agenda highlights:

Council agrees to package construction bond projects

College Council on July 5 agreed that construction bond projects should be packaged. Packaging accounts for the domino effect of how moving new space opens up old space, etc. Construction details would be determined later. The vice presidents and Paul Colvin will package projects working from a compilation of ongoing facilities lists, feedback from various meetings, and feedback to an all-department memo issued last month. They will present the packages to council and the Board of Education. The board is expected to decide in August whether to place a bond on the November ballot. Colvin said he expects the total price to be between \$25-50 million.

Council concerns included:

- Being responsive to community needs;
- Identifying projects of local value to outreach campuses;
- Emphasizing quality education;
- Informing staff;
- Forming an outside advocacy group.

President Jerry Moskus said the tax base approved by voters in 1990 spared Lane from deep cuts during the first half of Measure 5, and a construction bond could help the college weather the second half. He said other agencies may wish the bond to include space they could rent, but this could inflate the total price tag.

Some tidbits that surfaced in discussion:

- Bond funds must be spent on construction and equipment.
- Lane has not asked for a construction bond since the late 1960s.
- Training & Development's buildings originally served as a temporary, portable construction headquarters for the building of main campus in the 1960s.
 - The current campus was built for 6,500 FTE. Lane now serves 9,500 FTE.

In other business, Maxine Frauman said the full-time part-time faculty ratio

subcommittee has discussed how part-timers are treated, the need to unify part-timers, and the impact of part-time faculty on support staff workloads.

The next council meeting is set for July 19 from 3-4 p.m. in the Boardroom.

Marie Matsen named interim vice president



Marie Matsen

Marie Matsen has been named interim vice president of college operations. The post was vacated in April 1993. A national search ended unsuccessfully last month. President Jerry Moskus said Matsen has the skills he needs in that position now. "She has intimate knowledge of the direction the college needs to go, especially in team leadership and in technology." The appointment will last indefinitely.

Matsen has served as assistant to the president since July 1991. She was research analyst and computer specialist from 1988-91, computer programmer from 1982-88, and computer lab coordinator from 1981-82. Before joining Lane, she taught and coached volleyball at Washington State University in Pullman, Carleton College in Northfield, Minnesota, and the University of Iowa in Iowa city.

She has a Ph.D. in educational policy and management and a master's degree from the University of Oregon, and a bachelor's degree from Carleton College.



In a related move, Linda Waddell has been named interim assistant to the president. She returned to Lane in June after a year as an American Council on Education fellow at Cuyahoga Community College in Cleveland, Ohio. The ACE Fellows Program trains leaders for senior positions in higher education administration. Waddell was one of 29 fellows named nationwide last year and only the 12th person from Oregon to receive the fellowship, and the first from an Oregon Community college since the program began in 1966.

Waddell has directed the Financial Aid Department at Lane since 1984. She was financial aid director at Central Oregon Community

Linda Waddell College in Bend from 1978-84. From 1973-78 she was financial aid counselor and then associate director at Grossmont Community College in El Cajon, California.

She has a master's degree in counseling from San Diego State University and a bachelor's degree in business administration and psychology from Linfield College.

Board Report

The Lane Community College Board of Education met July 13. Appointed were:

The managers' working conditions agreement for 1994-95 was approved. Moskus said the agreement will cost the college 3.776 percent more in salaries than last year. The agreement will be available in Personnel Services. The agreement was added to the agenda at the beginning of the meeting since the matter arose too late for prior agenda notice. The board recessed for executive session before taking action on the agreement.

Marie Matsen was appointed interim vice president of College Operations. This topic also arose too late for prior agenda notice. (See related story).

Sworn in to office were Cindy Cable, elected to her first four-year term this spring; and Peter Sorenson, re-elected to his second four-year term.

Among other news in his monthly report, the president said South Lane School District will again go out for a bond to build a new facility that would include space for Lane. He also said Evergreen Aviation has proposed partnering with Lane to train foreign pilots.

Student evaluations of faculty implemented last year included 9,000 participating students and 600 courses, reported Vice President Jim Ellison. The evaluations will be mandatory for faculty effective fall 1994.

The accreditation self-study final draft was approved for publication. The accreditation team will visit Lane from October 12-14.

Board member Michael Dubick was absent. Board member Jim Pitney particiapted via speaker phone from Connecticut for most of the meeting. The next regular meeting is set for Wednesday, August 17.

Board policy on use of intoxicants and controlled substances revised

The board policy on the use of intoxicants and controlled substances was revised on March 9. It reads as follows:

No person may bring onto college property or into any college-owned facility or to any college-sponsored class or activity any intoxicating beverage, dangerous drug, narcotic, marijuana, glue, or thinner for the purpose of ingesting the same, except in the situations specified in this policy. No person may appear on college property or in any college-owned facility or in any college-sponsored class or activity under the influence of any of the above mentioned items substances.

Exceptions to this policy are as follows:

- 1. Alcoholic beverages may be used/served
 - (a) for cooking and/or instructional purposes in food preparation labs or classes related to the science and/or service of alcoholic beverages or
 - (b) at college-sponsored activities using procedures specified in administrative rules or
 - (c) at college activities catered by legally licensed and insured businesses or agencies, using procedures specified in administrative rules.

Under no circumstances shall alcohol be served at college-sponsored activities to underage minors as defined by state law.

- Dangerous drugs and narcotics may be used as legally prescribed by a licensed practitioner.
- 3. Glue and thinners may be used in class-related lab environments and in facilities construction and maintenance.

'95 airshow taking off with a bang


The show will be held Aug. 5 & 6 at Eugene Airport. Proceeds will be donated to further expansion of the college's aviation maintenance program.


