College Council report

Enrollment now drives funding for Lane, and that means we should consider expanding opportunities for students to take classes such as more **evening and weekend offerings**, said President Jerry Moskus at College Council on July 28. The idea provoked both support and objection.

- Research reveals that students want more evening classes.
- If students merely switched from day to evening, no enrollment gain would result.
- Student services also would have to be offered.

Moskus said the funding formula being written for the state's 16 community colleges uses FTE as the measurement. If the formula were applied today, Lane would be considered "overfunded" by \$2.4 million. It's likely that the formula, once final, will redline schools like Lane at their current level and give them two years to "catch up" to the formula. To avoid losing that \$2.4, FTE will have to increase, said Moskus. Other "overfunded" schools are Blue Mountain, Clackamas, Central Oregon, Clatsop, Treasure Valley, and Southwestern. Discussion will continue at the next meeting.

Council heard a **bond project update** from Paul Colvin. Possible projects have been ranked based on prior council feedback and other information. Topping the list were building or equipping "community learning centers" at district high schools. Projects will be packaged for presentation to the Board of Education on August 17 when a vote on whether to put a bond measure on the November ballot will be taken.

Council's next meeting is set for Tuesday, Aug. 16, from **1:30-3 p.m.** in the Boardroom.

Lane involved in school-to-work movement

As an expert in linking classroom and workplace, Lane will play a key role in developing local "school-to-work" programs for K-12, says Lane Regional Workforce Quality Committee Executive Director Joe Berney. The committee helped Oregon win a \$3 million block grant in July from the U.S. Dept. of Education for school-to-work programs. President Jerry Moskus serves on the committee. Vice President Larry Warford and Training and Development Director Patti Lake serve on subcommittees.

School-to-work programs are meant to expand where and how education is delivered, for example, by combining job training with classroom instruction at the high school level. It is similar to the cooperative education program at Lane for college students. High schools, colleges, government and employers must develop a common vocabulary, standards and expectations for these programs to ensure the "seamless education" intended by education reform, and to avoid duplication of effort. That's part of the committee's work, says Berney, and why Lane's expertise is crucial.

Oregon had asked for more funding than awarded. The state must now decide whether to underfund six local regions with school-to-work plans or select only three regions to fund in full. "We are extremely well positioned," Berney says of the Lane region. For more information, contact Berney at 744-3994.

South Lane School Board to put bond measure of ballot

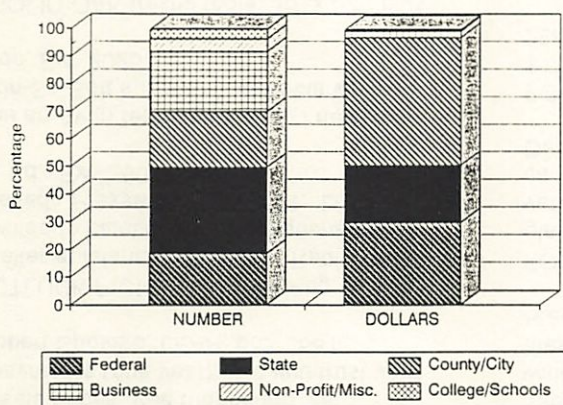
The South Lane School Board voted July 11 to put a \$43.9 million bond measure on the September ballot for a new complex which would include space for LCC at Cottage Grove. The 63-acre complex also would house a new high school and city library. South Lane first proposed the bond in May but voters defeated it.

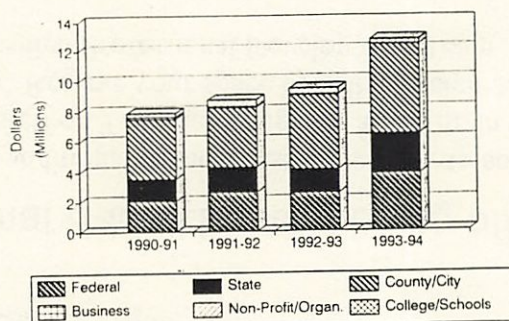

New look auction results

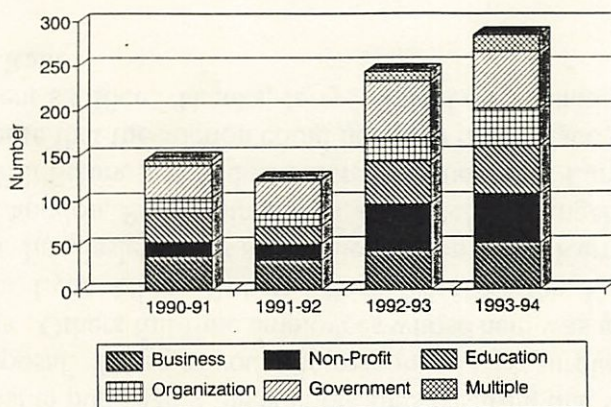

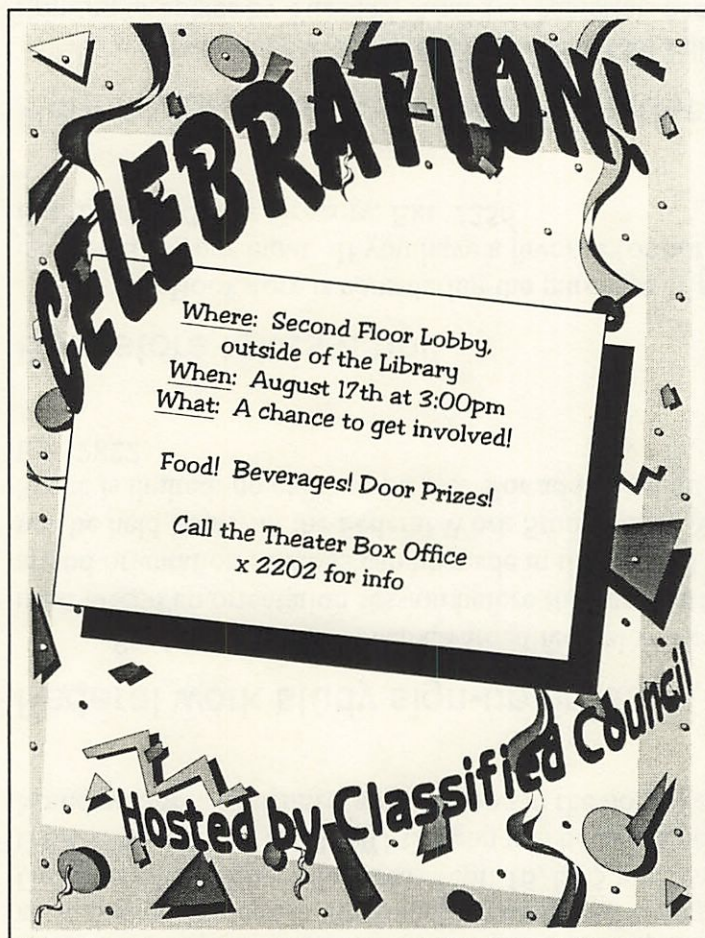

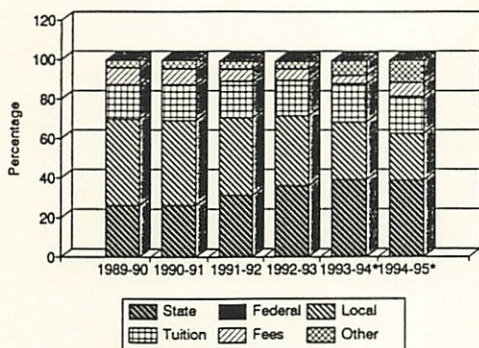
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LANE COMMUNITY COLLEGE General Fund Revenue Sources

Board to consult community group about bond

The \$64 million dollar question will be put to a group of community members before the Lane Community College Board of Education votes on a bond proposal, the board decided on Aug. 17 after reviewing a list of 19 possible projects totaling \$64,768,034. The board will vote on Aug. 31 whether to place a bond measure on the Nov. 8 ballot.

In other business:

The **classification system** passed on a 5-0 vote. Members Pat Riggs-Henson and Jim Pitney were absent. The classified union ratified the classification agreement on Aug. 4.

Collegewide information network contracts were awarded to Hewlett-Packard Company of Portland for \$548,036, and to Banyan Systems, Inc., of Seattle for \$75,000. Initial functions of the network should be operational by the end of 1994. President Jerry Moskus called the network a "significant technological development" for Lane.

The **budget criteria and process** for 1995-96 were approved and are generally the same as used over the last two years.

Michael Dubick of Creswell was sworn into office for a four-year term as an at-large member of the board.

General information included the fact that Lane's **student loan** default rate is at 9.8 percent. The rate had been as high as 17 percent. Moskus credited staff and an improved economy for the turnaround.

The **next meeting** will be a special meeting on Aug. 31 to vote on the bond proposal. The next regular meeting will be Sept. 14.

President issues all-staff memo on funding formula

President Jerry Moskus on Aug. 23 issued an all-staff memo on the community college funding formula. The proposed formula would cost Lane \$1.26 million over the next biennium if a \$17.7 million increase in state funds to community colleges materializes. "We could lose more if the increase doesn't materialize," writes Moskus. He notes that Lane's strategy of providing "a high level of student service without increasing continuing fiscal obligations" has succeeded and must continue. He invites ideas and will discuss the formula with anyone interested.

Moskus has defended Lane in months of debate at statewide Presidents' Council meetings. He serves on the council's funding formula subcommittee and will chair the 1996-97 council. For a copy of the Aug. 23 memo, contact the President's Office at Ext. 2200.

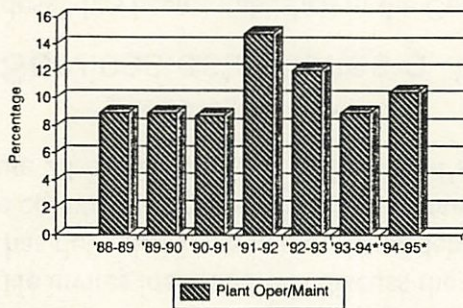

Lane to deliver grades by phone, not mail

Lane will deliver grades by phone instead of mail beginning Dec. 22. Students will be able to use any touch-tone telephone to dial a Student Information Line to hear grades instead of waiting for the mail or visiting campus. The same student identification numbers and access codes used for telephone registration will secure access to grades.

Grades also will be available at the computer touch screen information kiosks located in the Center Building on main campus and at the Downtown Center. Kiosks will be installed

Grades-by-phone will save about \$30,000 a year in postage, materials and labor.
