#### Board postpones bond election

The Lane Board of Education will seek voter approval of a bond, but not in November. Cindy Cable, Michael Dubick and Roger Hall favored going ahead with a \$31 million proposal on Nov. 8 but Peter Sorenson and Cindy Weeldreyer did not. Pat Riggs-Henson and Jim Pitney were absent. Four votes were required to put the measure on the ballot. The next earliest date the college could go out for a bond is March.

The board agreed that the college has significant facilities needs. A crowded November ballot, an anti-tax public sentiment, and only two months to campaign were among the dissenting arguments given. The rejected proposal was scaled down from an original \$64 million list of possible projects.

The board will resume bond discussions in December, and review the outcome of ballot measures 5 and 20-both of which could alter when and if schools could pursue bond funding.

The next regularly scheduled meeting is Sept. 14.







#### Instructor of the Year back from whale study



Science instructor Terri Herbert is back from a three-week study of blue and humpback whales at a research station on the Farallon Islands, a sanctuary about 35 miles west of San Francisco. Herbert was named Instructor of the Year for 1993-94 in June.

Herbert worked with a team from Oregon State University. "The really exciting news is that the blue whales are making a comeback. Their populations are increasing." Research will continue for three more weeks but Herbert's back to teach marine ecology, marine biology, and seabirds and mammals at Lane.

She teaches part-time at Hatfield Marine Science Center in Newport.

#### Board to resume bond discussion in November

The Lane Community College Board of Education met Sept. 14 and decided to continue discussion of a construction bond at its November meeting, after the Nov. 8 election.

Approved unanimously were:

- \$20 million cap on funds in the local government investment pool, up from \$10 million, to maximize interest income
- appointment of Linda DeWitt as temporary director of financial aid
- renewal of a helicopter lease

The board discussed the institutional effectiveness measurement plan annual report, the accreditation visit scheduled for Oct. 12-14, and the statewide community college funding formula. President Jerry Moskus said a formula would soon be adopted by the colleges' presidents. The first formula proposed in December would have cost Lane \$8 million. A second proposal made in June would have cost the college \$2.3 million. The latest proposal would cost Lane \$1.2 million. The final proposal likely will include a "hold harmless" clause to keep schools that would lose money level-funded until their funding matches their FTE. Funding will be based on FTE, said Moskus.

The next regular meeting is set for Oct. 12.
