The President's Poem

President Jerry Moskus recited an original epic poem at the Sept. 19 all-staff meeting in honor of the college's 30th anniversary, complete with slides and a video. Guest Dale Parnell, Lane's founding president, called it "one of the best opening day presentations" he had ever seen. Here's the poem:

Heroic verse I shall today recite
In praise of you who raise up Learning's light,
Whose arms are tired from holding up the torch,
Who'd rather be at home upon your porch,
Than listen to another first day speech
Made by a president. And you who teach,
Will see my humble verse for what it is,
No better than a bucket of warm fizz.

I sing today of Lane, I sing her praise, I sing about the early, early days When giants roamed our halls and taught our classes,

When none of us were gray and none wore glasses. I sing of Dale Parnell and Marvin Stegner, Bert Dotson, Debbie Daggett, and Art Tegger. I use the strange conceit of river rafting To show my cleverness and skill in crafting A first day speech the like of which has never Been heard before in any such endeavor.

Oh come, Sweet Muse, and guide my teeming brain And help me tell the wondrous tale of Lane.

We launched our rafts in nineteen sixty five Upon a river smooth and blue and rive With buoyant hopes and care'fly thought out schemes

To help Lane County folk achieve their dreams. They held us up, these always noble visions, And guided all our day—to—day decisions. Our early rafts were sturdy, simple things, No seats or phones, no roofs, no mylar wings. Each raft was guided by a brave and bold Heroic figure. To the course we'd hold, That Parnell set, who, out in front each day Made rafting down the canyon seem like play.

Oh, Muse, can you bring forth those early years When most of us were wet behind the ears?

And then the middle years, the middle course.
The water riled a bit, we shouted, hoarse,
At Vietnam and drugs and Watergate.
Oh blind to truth! We learned to separate.
Like flotsam on the sea of discontent,
Like wayward youth their sep'rate ways they went,
But down the river swift we floated proud
(Though none of us would dare to think out loud).
And people lined the banks to praise our powers
As in our wakes they sprinkled gifts of flowers.

Our fame spread wide like thistles in the breeze, As innovations piled around our knees. And at this time we built upon our vessels, All sorts of things, like towers, bells, and whistles, Until they grew so high into the air That workers feared to climb them for repair.

The eighties riled the waters even more, Our rafts moved even faster than before. Enrollment fell. Our spirits flagged a bit, But still we fought the fight and would not quit.

The trees thinned out as down the stream we flew, Sometimes in water deep, sometimes in dew. At times we lost our hope, at times our hair, But always for the people we were there.

The nineties found us clinging to a rock
While Oregon voters blithely sold our stock.
The local voters, on the other hand,
Played quite a different tune. Strike up the band
For our Lane County friends who at the polls

Supported all our noble plans and goals! We gathered all our rafts in one big jam, Ignoring rumors of a downstream dam, And started once again upon our trip, But this time with a slightly different script.

Oh, Muse, will you help paint the wondrous scene That waits around the bend? Let down the screen! [video presentation] Where once our leaders, only, looked for rocks As down the stream we flew (none watched their clocks),

We'll <u>all</u> see rocks, and when we see them shout For all to hear, "A rock ahead! Look out!"

We'll help each other row, each other grapple, And after work we'll stop and have a Snapple, And say, "I hope your ride today was calm And never rocked your raft or caused you qualm."

We'll care about each other's working day So much that work will come to seem like play. The space between our rafts will grow so small That none of us can falter, none can fall. Alumni'll line the banks and cheer and clap At how, together, we avoid mishap.

And everyone will see that we pass muster As down the stream we go in our team and cluster.

Our precious cargo, students, we'll hold fast Until their destination's come and passed: And we will send them out into the world Secure that every one's a flag unfurled To fly above the crowd and tell our story, Examples for Lane's everlasting glory.

From time to time we'll stop awhile and rest. But always we'll arise, resume the quest For quality learning and perfect work And a light to lead us through the murk Of Measure 5. And when our journey's ended And all of us get PERS, having ascended On clouds of light to atop the salary schedule, We'll miss the cafeteria that always fed you well, The groundskeepers who made our days so bright, The electricians who daily chased away the night, The housekeepers who nightly spiffed up our day, The secretaries who helped us find our way, The people who carefully painted our sills, The managers who always approved our bills, The accounting folks who kept track of our money, The badminton player who called me "sonny," The librarians who were happy to look For that unique, important, and nameless book, The counselors who helped our students find direction, The security staff that prepared for insurrection, The teachers who gave their all to learners And quickly turned them into lifetime earners. And those of you whose job this verse omits Should know that without you this college sits And does not move. Your hard-learned craft Propels and steers and saves our priceless raft.

This raft, this wondrous thing, that Parnell launched To make sure learning's flame is never stanched, This place called Lane will outlive food and drink; This raft called Lane, in fact, will never sink.

A part of us is woven in her hides, It is our breath that fills her bulging sides; Our words will echo after we are gone And what we've given students will live on.

A high school diploma from LCC Adult High School is awarded upon completion. Average completion time is six months. Participants can begin at any time. Enrollment update

Monday's reports show credit headcount enrollment down 2 percent and noncredit up 4 percent over a year ago at the same time. Registering for credit classes were 9,453 students, compared to 1993's 9,652, and registering for Continuing Education classes were 5,371 people, compared to 5,162 last year. Some of these students registered for both credit and noncredit courses. Unduplicated headcounts will be available later in the term.

Lane awarded grant for substance abuse program

Lane has received a two-year \$162,870 grant from the U.S. Department of Education, Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE), to fund an institution-wide multicultural substance abuse prevention program for students. The grant is one of 75 awarded nationally this year to colleges and universities and one of only 15 awarded to a community college.

The program is unusual in that it will make substance abuse prevention an integral service of eight departments with unique user populations. Most colleges and universities depend upon a single prevention office. At Lane, prevention services will be available in Athletics, Adult Basic Education, Campus Ministry, Disability Services, the Dislocated Workers Program, the Multicultural Center, the Native American Program, and the Women's Program. The services will be

tailored to the unique population of each department.

"For example," says project coordinator Mark Harris, "in the past, say Athletics would call me in to give an hour presentation on substance abuse prevention. That would be it. How far do you think that really goes? Now, prevention will be an ongoing service in those departments that serve ethnic minorities, women, people with disabilities, underage youth, dislocated workers, and other culturally diverse populations."

Harris will form a network of staff knowledgeable about abuse problems and solutions to develop culturally appropriate strategies for each participating department. Grant funds will be used to design a curriculum and train staff in its use. The program is expected to be a national model, says Harris.

Board report

The Lane Community College Board of Education approved 10-year supplemental contracts with management, faculty and classified employees at its Oct. 12 meeting stating that Lane will pay 6 percent of salaries toward retirement. Individual employees will be responsible for reimbursement if the agreement is found unenforceable. Other issues such as grievance procedures are also addressed in the contracts.

The board opposed ballot measures 5, requiring voter approval of new or increased state or local taxes and fees; 8, requiring public employees to pay 6 percent of their salaries toward retirement; 12, repealing the prevailing wage requirement on public works projects; and 20, replacing all current taxes with a single 2 percent on all sales transactions.

Board Chair Roger Hall on Measure 20: "It's the vilest snake ever to be dragged down the Oregon Trail."

Approved were: a meeting with the local NAACP regarding diversity and affirmative action at Lane; purchase of a voice mail system with US West Communications for \$94,310; appointment of Lee Construction to build the aviation

maintenance hangar for \$1,334,700 and purchase of a building control and security system from Honeywell for \$100,875; purchase agreement with Liuski International for Electronics Department computer components; and a purchase agreement with Smith Brothers Office Environments for office partitions and furniture.

Personnel actions approved were a \$15 per hour pay rate for continuing education instructors; and appointments of Joe Berney as director of Lane Regional Workforce Quality Committee; David Rothgery as English instructor; Frank Marshall as associate director of Financial Aid; Janice Lyon as English as a Second Language instructor; Matthew Luke as Spanish instructor; Fredric Beisse as computer information technology instructor; Noble Goss as English instructor; and Philip Martinez as economics instructor.

All votes were unanimous at 7-0. Board vice chair Cindy Weeldreyer was absent. The next regularly scheduled meeting is Nov. 9.

- Women's Program produce recruitment materials/displays, hire recruitment specialist;

Lane news, 30 years ago

Lane's first staff newsletter was called the Roundup. It was a weekly. (Ah, those were the days!) Here are some excerpts from the first four issues. Spelling and punctuation have not been altered.

- Sept. 24, 1965. Governor Mark O. Hatfield will make a formal presentation of the Lane Community College charter to the school the evening of October 22nd at North Eugene High School. The program will begin at 7:30 in the NEHS auditorium. Students, Staff and the public are invited.
- Sept. 24, 1965. Another name was added to Oregon's growing list of community colleges when the 9th Area Education District was formed recently. Mt. Hood
 Community College will open in the fall of '66 to serve residents in East Portland, Gresham, Troutdale and vicinity.

Community news, 30 years ago

On Oct. 19, 1964, voters went to the polls. The only thing on the ballot was formation of a community college. The next day's headline and lead paragraph in the Register-Guard went like this:

Voters Okay College 5 to 1 New Board Already Faces Organizational Fund Lack by LARRY ROMINE

Of the Register-Guard

It has neither operating expense money, a name nor a president, and only the promise of a campus and student body. But a community college exists today in Lane County.

Voters overwhelmingly approved establishment of the college Monday by nearly a 5-to-1 margin. Preliminary tallies showed 5,944 votes for and 1,282 against the college.

- Oct. 1, 1965. LCC's Radio Station KRVM returned to the air on Monday, September 27th, with a varied schedule of music, news and public service programs. Of special interest is a daily news program beginning on Monday, October 4th, at 12:00 noon, which will be devoted exclusively to LCC staff and student news. Tell your friends and relatives to keep up with LCC events by tuning FM Channel 91.9.
- Oct. 1, 1965. Men students far outnumber women students at Lane Community College according to latest figures on registration. Oct. 1, 1965. As of Wednesday night 1031 men students had completed registration as compared to 287 women. Of the 1318 total registered students, 1170 live within 30 miles of the Campus; 26 live from 30 to 50 miles from the Campus; 19 live more than 50 miles away. To date we have 87 out of District students, 2 out of State students, and 1 foreign student registered. Registration ends October 8th.
- Oct. 1, 1965. Students and staff are asked to cooperate in keeping the parking area in front of the Springfield Campus building free for "mobile staff" and visitor parking. Adeq student parking is available in the fenced-in parking lot. entrance to this parking lot is located on Quarry Street one block above the faculty house. Student parking is also available in Mark's parking lot nearest the Springfield Campus.

More from the Roundup

• Oct. 8, 1965. LCC Board of Directors met Wednesday, October 6, on the Eugene Campus. Among many items of business considered were the following:

- Received a report of tentative approval of a National Defense Education Act grant of \$10,000 for increased guidance and

counseling services.

- Adopted a policy regarding staff travel as stated in the staff handbook provided it is withing budget limitations.

- Directed the Administration to pursue the possibilities of obtaining State and Federal grants for programs and buildings, and Federal loans for students.

- Authorized the Administration to make application for membership to the Northwest Accreditation Association. This will make transfer of credits less complicated.

• Oct. 15, 1965. A student is expected to be in attendance at all times in classes, laboratories, and assemblies unless there is a compelling reason for absence. "Cuts for recreational purposes are not permitted. Instructors will set an attendance policy for each class, and it is the student's responsibility to know and comply with each one....

Pat Langan, funded projects accountant in College Finance, has been named Outstanding Classified Employee of the Month for October.



Daniel Quinn to speak at Lane

Author, philosopher, futurist, and poet Daniel Quinn will speak to Jerome Garger's Peace and Conflict Studies class on Thursday, Nov. 10, from 11:30 a.m.-12:50 p.m., and to the public from 7-9 p.m., both in FOR 308. Larry Warford named Oregon liaison for workforce project

Vice President Larry Warford has been named Oregon liaison for the national Community College Workforce Development State Liaison Network formed by the American Association of Community Colleges in September with a one-year grant from the U.S. Department of Labor. The network will promote the workforce training services of community colleges, foster partnerships among community colleges and businesses, and improve information exchange among colleges and the AACC regarding workforce issues. Warford is among 57 people from 48 states named to the network.

Grant funds will help Lane link to Internet

Lane will soon have a direct link to the Internet with the help of two federal grants and the college's own \$1 million investment to develop an in-house network. A grant of \$25,300 from the National Science Foundation under the NSFNET Connections program will be used over a two-year period to pay for a portion of hardware and communication services.

Lane also is one of 15 partners in a \$525,000 grant from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) of the U.S. Department of Commerce for a project headquartered at the University of Oregon. The award is one of 100 made nationally this year. The project is to develop the Lane Education Network, a high-speed "network of networks" serving Lane County. At Lane, the NTIA project will develop two electronic classrooms and will provide Internet access to the community at large. Lane will use the network to enhance distance learning and to teach students and staff how to make full use of the Internet. Other partners in the project are local school districts, city and county government, Sacred Heart Hospital, communications and computer businesses, and community-based non-profit organizations.
