The family of the late Daniel Joseph "Joe" Murphy has given \$10,675 to Lane to establish a memorial scholarship fund for helicopter flight training students. LCC Foundation Director Joe Farmer says the gift will provide an annual award of \$500 to a full-time, second-year helicopter flight student with a minimum 3.0 grade point average who has financial need. recipient will be selected by a faculty committee. The first scholarship will be awarded in 1995.

Murphy was the "pilot of choice" among emergency medical technicians charged with rescues in remote logging areas. He completed 117 rescue missions in 21 years as corporate pilot for Bohemia, Inc. He left the company president stranded four times to fly a rescue mission, his first priority. He received the Helicopter

Pilot Safety Award in 1978, the Trimble Memorial Award in 1979, and the Golden Hour Award in 1983. He died on August 28, 1991, during a rescue mission in the Coast Range near Walton, at age 55. A paramedic and an injured logger also died in that accident. The cause of the accident remains undetermined.



DTC 005, once a basic classroom, now shines as a first-rate computer lab. Eighteen IBM-type computers bought with lottery funds for the Symantec training contract now are available to other students. Some of the software is from Sony training and other contracted trainings coordinated by Business and Industry Services. # Surplus property to be auctioned off





### Board report

### Board plows partway through proposed bond project list

The Lane Community College Board of Education began reviewing a tentative list of construction bond projects in a Dec. 14 work session. Chair Roger Hall said, "This is the most important thing we as a board will do because it will set the tone for what the college does, or may not do," and invited comment from anyone interested over the next couple of months so that the board gets all the information it needs to shape a final list for voter approval.

Proposed projects including major maintenance, energy improvements, health tech building remodel, instructional equipment and ADA access improvements met with general conceptual approval. Most discussion centered on whether to build a shop for welding classes. Currently, welding classes occur in the lower level of the Apprenticeship Building and have been associated with creating air quality problems in offices and classrooms on the upper level. The board prefers moving welding to the Air Tech building by moving remaining aviation maintenance to the airport, but that plan is dependent upon federal funding and is more expensive. Vice President Larry Warford said federal funds are easier to get if matching funds can be offered. The board decided to offer the new shop funds as matching for federal money to move the aviation lab, but agreed to build a welding shop if federal funding proves unlikely.

The board also expressed concern about whether the proposed list included enough or too much classroom space. Campus Services Director Paul Colvin said the proposal included 30 new classrooms and 132 new offices, a 10 percent increase, not including offset space. Staff pointed out that future needs will be met through distance learning and using buildings more in the evenings and on weekends, as well as through new space.

Yet to be discussed are a technology center, workforce quality center, child care facilities, student services facilities, and community learning centers. Hall and President Jerry Moskus repeated that the list is conceptual and all suggestions are welcome.

### Board acts to tax shelter employees' PERS payments

Employees who must make their own PERS payments under Measure 8 will not have to pay taxes on the contribution, thanks to a resolution unanimously approved by the Lane Community College Board of Education at its Dec. 14 meeting. The tax-sheltering move was authorized by a state attorney general's opinion issued within the last two weeks, said legal counsel. On another related matter, current part-time employees who are eligible for PERS but are not represented by a bargaining unit or contract will also continue to have the college provide their PERS contribution as long as they are continuously employed.

In other business, the board unanimously:

- accepted the resignations of Delpha Daggett and Richard Eno
- appointed Addie Lou Willis as executive secretary in Instructional Services
- appointed Marilou Good as computer information technology instructor
- appointed Bill Morrisette, Shirley Valentine, Jean Reeder and Alan Stavitsky to the KLCC Advisory Commission for three-year terms
- approved purchase of an operating system to continue installation of a collegewide network to the local Banyan Systems distributor, A-Net of Eugene, a division of Alpha Exchange
- approved the 1995-96 budget calendar
- approved the student records policy
- accepted the auditor's report

The Lane Council of Governments wants to raise Lane's membership fee from \$500 to \$2,500 a year to put it on a par with member school districts, said board vice chair Cindy Weeldreyer. She represents the college on the agency board. Lane has received full services under a discounted membership fee. However, there was some question if the new fee was truly equitable. The board advised Weeldreyer to oppose the increase if it was inequitable but otherwise to support it.

A school-to-work consulting contract was withdrawn from the agenda, and a discussion on board development was postponed. The next meeting will be January 11 at 6:30 p.m., preceded by an executive session on the classified contract at 5:30 p.m.

# Wildish Building donated to Lane

Earlier this month, Lane accepted the donation of a 12,500 square foot, two-story building at 1445 Willamette in Eugene from Norm and Evelyn Wildish. The Wildish Building is valued at \$787,200 and its donation is part of an annuity agreement. According to Joe Farmer, the LCC Foundation will lease the building back to the college and affiliated tenants for \$5,000 per month for five years. The cost will have negligible effect on the college general fund, which already accounts for the cost of floor space, and will alleviate crowding at other college sites.

"We're very grateful for this generous contribution to the college," said President Jerry Moskus. "It addresses one of our greatest needs, which is space." The Wildish family has made generous gifts of cash, materials and supplies,

and volunteered labor to Lane for many years, said Farmer.

The building offers a convenient downtown location, good parking, and the Eugene Chamber of Commerce next door. Current tenants include Lane's Senior Companion Program and the Workforce Quality Council, of which Lane is a member.
