Keynote presenter will be Joe Madison, a highly acclaimed award winning talk radio personality from Washington DC. A full day of workshop sessions will be available for all staff. Eugene artist Bill Brewer to show, lecture

Eugene artist Bill Brewer will show selected paintings at the Art Department Gallery today through January 27. He will lecture on Tuesday, Jan. 17, at 10 a.m. in the gallery, sponsored by ASLCC. Everyone's invited.

Brewer says he tries "to convey something of the mystery our life is" in his work. His paintings feature colorful, abstract figures of humans, animals and trees, and mythic symbols. He uses acrylics on a variety of surfaces such as corrugated metal, board, Plexiglas and Mylar, as well as canvas. The 39-year-old artist has exhibited since 1987 throughout the Northwest and his works are in several collections including those at the Portland Art Museum, Washington State Arts Commission, and Nordstroms. He studied with Bill Cummings at the Art Institute of Seattle.

First Aid kit reminder

Every department or isolated work station is required to have a current first aid kit. The kit should be stored in a readily accessible location (a locked cabinet doesn't count) and all employees should know its location. Check the kit periodically to make sure it's properly stocked. Required contents are:

- gauze pads 3"x3" or larger
- gauze pads 8"x10" or larger
- adhesive bandages
- gauze roller bandage 2" wide
- triangular bandage
- wound cleansing agent (soap and water nearby is sufficient)
- emergency blanket
- latex gloves
- CPR shield

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New wood products program seeking students

The new "Basic Wood Products Technology Program" available through the Training & Development Department is seeking students. The program will be held Tuesday evenings, January 30-March 24, 6-9 p.m., on main campus, with several Saturday field trips to visit secondary wood manufacturers in the area. Class size is limited to only 40 students. Tuition will be \$100 which is refundable on graduation. Special scholarships and payment plans are available on a need basis with job placement services available to program graduates.

Applications for entry into this program will be made at an orientation meeting scheduled for Tuesday, Jan. 10, at 6 p.m., in FOR 309. Several secondary wood manufacturers and training staff will be available to discuss the future role of this growing industry in the Oregon economy. Information and details for future employment will be provided as well as details on the classes. According to Ray Daffner, executive director of Wood Products Competitiveness Corporation, "The unique aspect of this course is that it is industry driven...and the demand is here. More than 3,000 people are hired into this growth industry annually."

"The college shall maintain a list of supported computer hardware and software. Purchases of products on the college's list will be supported by Computer Services and Electronic Services in terms of compatibility, installation, training, maintenance, troubleshooting, and upgrades. Computer Services and/or Electronic Services may decline to provide support for products not on the list. Staff who wish to purchase products not on the college list may submit those products for review and possible inclusion to those persons charged with maintaining the list."

Titans rated fifth

Lane's men's and women's basketball teams both won their Saturday conference games against visiting Clackamas. The Lady Titans (7-4, 1-1 conf.) defeated the Cougars 64-57 as Jenny Sink and Jenny Kammer combined for 46 points to lead Lane. The men's team overwhelmed Clackamas with 61 second-half points en route to an impressive 91-74 victory. John Kromer (20 points, 5 assists) paced Lane's balanced attack. The Titans remain undefeated in conference play (2-0) and boast an 8-4 overall record. They are ranked fifth in the NWAACC coaches' poll. College Council report

A standard list of college computers and software will be determined by a Computer Support Committee now being appointed by Executive Cabinet, Interim Vice President Marie Matsen told College Council at its Jan. 10 meeting. Listed products will receive support from Computer Services and Electronic Services; unlisted products may not. The committee and a support policy (see Jan. 5 *Daily*) were recommended by a now-concluded task force appointed by Executive Cabinet this fall.

Lane's accreditation has been renewed and the next full site visit will be in 10 years, President Moskus told council. The accrediting agency listed 20 commendations and four concerns in its report which was announced in a Jan. 3 memo to all staff from President Moskus. Lane will submit a progress report in 1997, and a routine interim report in 1999. The four concerns call for improved faculty involvement in institutional assessment, better documentation of related instruction (English, math, human resources, etc.) embedded in professional-technical curricula, consistent and continual faculty evaluation and expanded part-time faculty orientations, and improved communication and participation in restructuring.

A construction bond update was given by Assistant to the President Linda Waddel. Her key points:

- The Board of Education voted on November 9 to proceed with a bond measure in May 1995, after months of preliminary discussion.
- The project list is under board review and is conceptual, not detailed, and subject to revision. Projects were compiled from the accreditation self-study to which many staff contributed, Facilities Management Committee lists, and feedback from College Council and Managers' Forum.
- The president and vice presidents will be making presentations to departments to share information and collect more feedback.
- The Board of Education will establish the general projects and the bond amount on March 8. Many project details will not be worked out until after voter approval.
- The election will be by mail-in ballot on May 16.

Lane's affirmative action plan was presented by program director Donna Albro. The plan includes policy, staff responsibilities, analyses of past performance, and goals and timetables. The plan is up for board approval on February 8. For a copy of the summary, contact Albro at Ext. 2040. Board report

Although buildings may be set in concrete, the **construction bond** project proposal list is not, Campus Services Director Paul Colvin assured the Board of Education at its Jan. 11 meeting. The current list serves only to identify kinds of needs and possible solutions. Details will be settled after the bond is passed. Other staff and students reported the need for separate cultural activity and study space, more conference space, and outreach centers at area high schools to improve community access. The board must file a ballot statement by March 16 for the mail-in election on May 16.

President Jerry Moskus said Lane's **accreditation** has been reaffirmed. The next self-study will be in 2004. The evaluation team cited 20 commendations and four areas of concern. The concerns regard improved assessment at the department level, better documentation of related instruction in professional-technical curricula, more consistent faculty evaluations, and better communication around restructuring. Lane will submit a progress report on the concerns in 1997. Moskus said, "It's a very helpful report. It's very thorough and will help us focus."

Lane Council of Governments board member Bill Morrisette and director George Kloepel explained the benefits of LCOG membership and a proposed fee change. The proposal is to assess Lane as a school district, not a special district, which would raise Lane's dues. Lane board members expressed support for LCOG and encouraged an equitable membership fee policy.

In action, the board:

- passed a resolution calling for Oregon's federal legislators to sustain funding for the **Corporation for Public Broadcasting**, which contributes 20 percent of KLCC's budget
- Approved the retirements of **Jim Ellison, Ron Mitchell** and **Carole Painter**.
- Extended the **Coopers & Lybrand** contract for one year.
- Approved appointment of **advisory committee members**.

Highlights from the president's report:

- Lane raised \$19,800 for **United Way**, thanks in part to the leadership of Lloyd Rain.
- Lane has one less grant but \$7.5 million more in **grant funds** than last year, meeting a goal of less grants but more money, thanks in part to "fine coordination" by Grants Coordinator Sarah LaMaster.
- Credit **enrollment** is down but noncredit enrollment is up, bringing winter term totals about even with last year.
- **Lane's hiring practices** will be a major discussion item on the February board agenda.

In other information:

- **Jim Pitney** filed for his sixth term as a board member (see story below).
- **Cindy Weeldreyer** was elected vice chair of the Lane County Board of Commissioners.
- Students from Oregon's two-year and four-year colleges will hold a **student lobby day** in Salem on Feb. 23.

The next regularly scheduled meeting will be Feb. 8 at 6 p.m.

Jim Pitney to run for reelection for the sixth time

Jim Pitney announced at the Lane Community College Board of Education meeting on January 11 that he will run for reelection. The election will be March 28. If he wins, it will be his sixth term of service. He has represented Junction City and other Zone 2 residents for 20 years. He said, "It's obvious to many of you that I've enjoyed this job. I'm going to try it again." He added that he was inspired by retiring employees Jim Ellison and Ron Mitchell. "If they can go for 29 years, so can I."




ESL teacher's resourcefulness puts students first
