In memory

Ramon F. LaGrandeur, dean of instruction at Lane from 1967-72, has died at age 68 in Mill Creek, Washington. His wife Patricia wrote that he had been in excellent health but collapsed suddenly on December 31 and died on January 8. She said they had done lots of traveling, including tours to China, Japan, Hong Kong, Hawaii, Poland, and Russia. LaGrandeur was instrumental in the establishment and growth of the community college system. His 35-year educational career included presidencies at community colleges in Spokane and Olympia, Washington, and Valencia, California. He also served on state and national community college associations.

Equalization proposal could leave Lane level-funded

Lane would most likely be level-funded for two to three years under the current statewide community college funding equalization proposal, President Jerry Moskus reported to the Legislative Action Team on Feb. 2. Since costs are rising at a rate of 4 percent a year, it's like being cut, he said.

The equalization formula for distribution of funds was adopted by the State Board of Education. The level of community college funding will be settled by legislators and the governor sometime during the current legislative session. If the level of state funding is higher than in the governor's proposed budget, Lane could benefit by escaping from level-funding.

College Council report

The appropriate use of **incidental student fees** and how to account for them challenged College Council at its Feb. 7 meeting. Fees are created when budget funds fall short of providing equipment, supplies or faculty development expenses such as professional licensing. Council agreed that it would be better for the budget, and not fees, to cover these needs and that in any case, a policy is needed. President Jerry Moskus agreed to list the questions and suggestions in a memo to guide the task force in continuing research and drafting a policy recommendation.

In other business, Moskus took suggestions for topics for upcoming **all-staff meetings**. He said the meetings were to provide information on collegewide issues including accreditation, affirmative action, the bond, the budget, and restructuring. The meetings will be held on Wednesday, Feb. 15, and Tuesday, Feb. 21, each from 3:30-4:30 p.m. in Forum 308/309. Subsequent cluster meetings will be held to gather feedback.

In other discussion, the president confirmed that **bond projects** are conceptual for now and design decisions will not be made until after voter approval. He added that a citizen's group has formed to run a bond campaign. Sue Prichard and Ed King will co-chair, Scott Carpenter will manage, and Baden & Company will donate marketing services.

Board report

A \$42.8 million conceptual package for the bond issue received the unanimous approval of The Lane Community College Board of Education at its Feb. 8 meeting. The price is up from an earlier \$39.9 package due to the additions of student services space, Performing Arts labs, and Wildish Building renovations. The additions were based on recent student and staff input. Board member Cindy Weeldreyer said she wants the bond to solve the mixed-use problem in the Center Building. From the audience, three students advocated for student services space, and former board member Larry Mann and two guests advocated for a technology center in the Gateway area of Springfield. Chair Roger Hall advised that while kinds of needs have been identified, design decisions will begin only after and if the bond passes in the May 16 election.

The affirmative action plan was unanimously approved. Director Donna Albro emphasized that the one-year plan is a "living document" to be continually updated, such as incorporating pending recommendations from the diversity committee. Part-time athletics instructor Wes Chamberlain and faculty union president Dennis Gilbert raised concerns that the plan not overlook long-term part-time instructors in the hiring for full-time positions.

Also unanimously approved were:

- · retirement of Roy Summers from Study Skills
- appointment of Marcia Chala-O'Dea as full-time Spanish instructor
- 1995-96 academic calendar
- purchase of new fire detection and alarm systems for Center Building from Honeywell, Inc., for \$65,498
- hiring of Glaser & Associates as organizational development consultants for \$75,000 for one year and \$50,000 for consecutive years

The president's annual evaluation is complete, said chair Roger Hall, and resulted in "superior to excellent" ratings in all evaluation areas. "We have the finest president in Oregon's community colleges," Cindy Weeldreyer said. Moskus credited his staff for their support. Routine contract negotiations will commence soon.

No program reductions are expected in 1995/96 due to the new statewide funding formula for community colleges, the president reported. Lane is level-funded under the formula and will receive the same amount of state support next year as this year. This is still a loss in the sense that expenses continue to increase, said the president, but things could be worse.

Seventy-five percent of evening and weekend students seek to improve their job skills, Vice President Jim Ellison reported. He is forming a student/staff advisory committee to help revitalize Lane's evening and weekend offerings.

In other discussion:

- Roger Hall announced that he is running unopposed for a second four-year term as an at-large member of the board. The election will be March 28 by mail.
- Cindy Weeldreyer is resigning as vice president of the Oregon Community College Association board to better keep up with her new duties as Lane County commissioner.

The next regular board meeting will be Wednesday, March 8.

Betty Woods of Springfield volunteers for the Senior Companion Program at Lane. When asked if she would be willing to work with students with head injuries, she was apprehensive. Her experience was with elderly people at Sacred Heart Hospital. Nonetheless, she decided to give it a try. She now spends five days a week helping three students with class notetaking. "These young men are teaching me so much about how to cope with difficulties," said Woods. "I have the greatest respect and admiration for them and am very pleased to be part of this very worthwhile program.'

Woods is one of three seniors helping students with disabilities thanks to a new partnership launched by Sandra Jones of the Senior Companion Program and Nancy Hart-Fishwick of Lane's Disability Services. Hart-Fishwick said it is difficult to find people to provide critical support services for disabled students. When Jones proposed using the Senior Companions as service providers, Hart-Fishwick saw it as an opportunity to fill an important need in a creative, mutually supportive way.

The Senior Companion Program places low income seniors age 60 or older in part-time positions assisting frail, elderly or disabled adults in exchange for a non-taxable stipend and benefit package. The federally funded program serves 36 community agencies throughout Lane. Senior Companion Program sites contribute matching funds. - by Therese Picado for *The Daily*

Videos, displays commemorate Black History Month




