Greg Fishwick named director of Education Reform

A growing need to define the role of community colleges in education reform prompted Vice Presidents of Instruction Jim Ellison and Larry Warford to assign Greg Fishwick administrative responsibility for education reform. In spite of efforts to tinker with the Oregon Educational Act for the 21st Century (HB 3565) in this year's legislature, significant changes are in the offing for community college education. Those changes are driven by accreditation agencies, federal funding opportunities, the Oregon State System of Higher Education, business and industry, parents, and educators themselves.



Think Tank facilitator Bob Barber highlights six forces driving the need for technology planning in a memo to council: the bond and its technology components, grants with technology emphases, the campuswide network coming on-line, professional development spending on technology training, demand from faculty and staff, and the willingness of faculty and staff to take responsibility for planning.

Eight priorities outlined in the memo call for a technology coordinator or council, a planning procedure, a study and database of resources, smoothly bringing the colleegwide network on-line and providing training, a computer users' handbook, a well-staffed and well-equipped instructional technology center, a series of discussion meetings, and a collegewide dialogue to deal with the challenges of technology.

LCC students join AmeriCorps ranks

Twelve of 16 students selected for an AmeriCorps project in Oregon and Washington are from Lane. Ten of the 12 are energy management technician program majors and the other two are program graduates. The graduates are the state directors for the project. Called the AmeriCorps Green Lights Project, the students are auditing lighting in public schools and other public buildings and making recommendations on how to improve lighting efficiency and save taxpayer dollars. They are receiving a living allowance plus education awards payable toward student loans or tuition. Current students also are earning credit toward their degrees. Schools could cut their lighting bills as much as 50 to 75 percent, says project manager Marc Ross of the Bonneville Power Administration.

The project is a national pilot. It is sponsored by BPA and the Environmental Protection Agency and is the first AmeriCorps project to use students as lighting auditors. AmeriCorps was created by President Clinton in 1993 to help students earn an education by performing community service work.

The energy management training program at Lane is the only one in Oregon, and one of only two in the Northwest. The program receives funding from BPA. Rober Ebbage of Science coordinates the energy management program at Lane. Dixie Maurer-Clemons of Cooperative Education placed the Lane students with AmeriCorps.

Council applauded Think Tank efforts and agreed with its concerns. The vice presidents will meet with the Think Tank to begin exploring a planning process.

In other information, Paul Colvin of Campus Services said student input on how to use funds from the **Ashlane student housing settlement** will be solicited at photo ID and through ASLCC; and Cynde Leathers of Telecourses said PBS has contacted Lane about becoming a site to make the associate of arts **transfer degree available via telecourses**.



Computer Support Committee begins work

Based on the recommendations of the Computer Standards Task Force, the Computer Support Committee has initiated work to develop a list of supported computer hardware and software. Supported products will be supported by Computer Services and Electronic Services in terms of compatibility, installation, training, maintenance, troubleshooting and upgrades. Committee members represent a wide spectrum of the college community and include key staff members of units currently providing technical support. The mission and charge of the committee include the following:

a. Maintain a list of supported hardware and software and develop effective ways of communicating

the list and changes to the list to college users;

b. Consider and act on requests or inclusion of new products to the list in a timely way;

c. Develop a framework for adopting technological advances and innovations, and therefore inevitable changes to the list, insofar as they affect the technical support capabilities of the college;

d. Consider ways to improve service to users within the resources of the college and its technical support units;

e. Communicate with users about new developments in software and hardware; and

f. Actively seek student input regarding software/hardware being considered.

The committee is reviewing existing surveys of software and hardware use on campus and expects to create a tentative list of supported products by the end of April. Members of the campus community can contact any committee member to provide input to the preliminary list. In May, the committee will announce a more formal process to ensure that all members of the campus community, including students, have an opportunity to voice their views on the proposed supported products.

To expedite creating the tentative list, the committee has formed subcommittees for hardware and software. The team of faculty guides pictured has been hard at work with Lane's staff development grant for education reform. Their goal is to align improvements in Lane's instructional delivery system with both state and federal school reform initiatives. The guides are responsible for presentations and exchanges with departments and clusters, working with high schools and other community colleges to articulate our programs with Certificate of Advanced Mastery (CAM) programs, and participating in a pilot partnership with the Oregon State System of Higher Education's Proficiency-based Admission Standards System (PASS) project.
