Kudos

When Labor Secretary Robert Reich couldn't make the "California's Gold: Celebrating Community College Partnerships" conference to address changes in education, organizers called on LCC President Jerry Moskus. Moskus presented to about 500 California community college instructional leaders at the March 15-17 gathering in Sacramento. He emphasized that education must move away from a factory approach to one that is learner-centered, involves employees in decisionmaking, and supports teamwork. He said the key to change is to treat people with "extraordinary respect." The conference was organized by California community college librarians, instructional administrators, and community and continuing education administrators.

Public employees can wear political buttons

A glance at Oregon Revised Statute 260.432(2):

- public employees may wear political buttons while on the job as a personal political expression
- public employees may not advocate while on the job
- public employees may provide information if it is impartial and does not advocate

Be sensitive. For example, students may regard instructors as persons of authority, not just public employees, and may be made uncomfortable by campaign buttons worn in the classroom.

Airlines cap commissions-travel fees disrupted

Most airlines have placed a cap of \$25 (one way) and \$50 (round trip) on commissions to travel agencies for selling airline tickets. This may reduce travel agency income by as much as 50 percent. The industry is in turmoil because many smaller agencies are expected to go out of business, the larger ones are trying to find additional revenue sources, and at least one class action, anti-trust suit has been filed. Moreover, Bob Dole and Strom Thurmond have asked the US Attorney General to review the legality of the airline position. The prospects are, first, it's going to be a long time before the industry restabilizes, and second, if services are to continue, many agency fee structures must change. Locally, Adventure in Travel is planning to maintain all current services with the institution of a \$5 transaction fee for every ticket sold; Ambassador, also maintaining services, has established a variety of fees for services which used to be free (ticket exchanges, refunds, courier services, research, etcetera). When planning your travel, be sure to ask for the current fee structure, ascertain whether or not fees are included within the price of the ticket, and calculate the additional agency fees into your travel budget. I have considerable information on this subject; if you want copies, call me at Ext. 2572. Thanks. - Lloyd Rain [Editor's note: This news has placed the question of whether the college should consider having a travel agency of record on an upcoming College Council agenda.]

WICHE vs. Diversity Team

Lane is one of five community colleges in Oregon participating in the Western Interstate Commission on Higher Education Institute on Diversity. This national program helps colleges to develop a plan for improving diversity. Over the past year, a group of 30 Lane students, staff and community representatives worked with WICHE staff to assess the situation at Lane and to develop specific activities and benchmarks. This group has developed and adopted a diversity vision statement and drafted and submitted a plan to WICHE staff. The committee will work to incorporate WICHE staff suggestions and then adopt the plan this spring. The plan addresses staff recruitment, training and retention; curriculum; student recruitment, retention and campus life; and community involvement. WICHE focuses on four specific ethnic minorities_American Indians/Alaska Natives, AsianAmericans, African Americans, and Hispanic/Latinos_and primarily addresses the needs of credit students.

Lane's Diversity Team is composed of students, community members and staff from various departments. The purpose of the Diversity Team is to support Lane in its effort to embrace diversity, one of the college's three main areas of focus. While WICHE focuses on four specific ethnic groups, the Diversity Team is concerned with a broader definition of diversity to include age, gender, ability/disability, ethnicity, cultural origin, national origin, source and level of income, familial status, marital status, religion, and sexual orientation. The Diversity Team will be responsible for implementing the plan developed by WICHE and believes there are viewpoints and skills to be gained that will serve Lane's students and community better.

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You apply for Medicare–automatically–when you apply for Social Security benefits. If you plan to retire after age 65, you should apply for Medicare separately. When you enroll in Part A (Hospital Insurance) of Medicare, you also automatically enroll in Part B (Supplementary Medical Insurance), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want it. If you enroll in Part B at the earliest opportunity, you pay monthly premiums, which are normally deducted from your Social Security benefits, if you get them. If you enroll late, you may have to pay higher premiums. Medicare questions may be asked of the Social Security Administration at 1-800-234-5772. If you want to enroll, you need to go to the Eugene office at 377 Pearl Street.
