Moskus announces vice president decision

At a special meeting of Instructional Services Council on April 27, President Moskus announced that the college is beginning the search for a vice president of instruction to succeed Jim Ellison when he retires in late summer. The application deadline is June 2. The vice president will oversee transfer programs; articulation with other educational institutions; and program planning, development and evaluation. The new vice president will work jointly as a team with Vice President for Instruction Larry Warford who will oversee professional-technical and non-credit instruction. Both vice presidents will work out of one Instructional Services Office.

Voters' pamphlet is state's, not county's

Several staff have questioned why the LCC bond, Measure 20-44, does not appear in the voter's pamphlet for the May 16 election. Since the college bond measure is a *county* issue, it does not appear in the *state* voter's pamphlet. Due to financial restrictions, Lane County does not produce a voters' pamphlet for special elections. Of the four counties represented in LCC's district, only Benton County produces a voters' pamphlet. LCC's bond measure does appear in the Benton County pamphlet. - Linda Waddell, Ext. 2313

Junction City board members observe 30 years of service

Junction City retirees Cliff Matson, John Barber and Jim Pitney received special thanks and recognition at a luncheon for Board of Education members on April 20. The trio are the only people ever to have held the Zone 2 post on the board. "Together they have 30 years of service to Lane," said President Jerry Moskus. "That's about 1,200 hours of volunteer service." Current board member Pitney added, "We're sort of a living history exhibit."

Matson served from 1964-71. He is a retired dentist and former teacher and principal of Junction City High School. Barber was on the board from 1971-75. He is a former Eugene Municipal Court judge. Pitney, a

retired farmer and dairyman, was elected in 1975 and begins his sixth term this July.

Reminiscing, Matson said that in the beginning, he and others traveled to California to study its 29 two-year colleges. "They told us to think big, build big, so we did. At the time it seemed a little too big, but now I can see it was the right thing to do."

Barber commented on the variety of opportunities available to students, from career training to transfer credits to basic education, and on the advance of technology into education. "I remember the first computer we ever got," he said. "It was as tall and wide as a door and just as deep. Only one guy knew how to run it." That was in 1973. Now computers play a role in nearly every occupation and are a common teaching aid and office tool.

Pitney was impressed by growth and change in numbers of people and programs, and also in management. He said Lane has moved from autocracy to shared governance. Pitney, whose 20 years of service exceed any other board member's in LCC's history, has seen changes in the news media as well. "It used to be that they came to every board meeting. We were pretty well attended. Now you rarely see the TV stations or the local paper here."

Pitney said he is glad to continue on the board, drawing on the past to help build the future. Barber, too, is proud of the role he played in shaping Lane. Matson declared, "If I were 30 years younger, I'd do it again."

KLCC fosters another winner



Lane student wins short story award



College Council news

Proposed tuition increases of \$2 for 1995/96 and \$2 for 1996/97 received reluctant consensus support at College Council's May 2 meeting, in preference to program cuts and with respect to the limits of state funding under the new community college equalization formula.

Instruction needs two vice presidents, President Jerry Moskus said, to administer its 28 departments. He reached that conclusion after months of study precipitated by Jim Ellison's retirement announcement. On April 27 he announced a hiring process including a June 2 application deadline. Faculty Council criticized the process as too fast and lacking faculty

involvement. Moskus said faculty will have a chance to participate in screening and selection. He will send a memo to Faculty Council.

Process redesign is being explored by Executive Cabinet as a way to reduce stress in an era of "doing more with less," Assistant to the President Linda Waddell told council. She and Vice President Marie Matsen are interviewing staff about processes that might benefit from redesign and will meet with governance councils. She added, "it is not our goal to eliminate staff" and "this project will be highly participatory.'


The roles of various technology committees were reviewed: Network Task Force, to research and recommend a collegewide network and guidelines for computer use; Computer Support Committee, to develop and maintain a list of supported hardware and software; and Technology Think Tank, concerned that the college systematize and coordinate its approach to technology. Linda Loft will proceed with refining and distributing the policy.



Board approves tuition increase

Tuition will increase from \$30 to \$32 effective summer term, following unanimous vote of the Board of Education at its May 10 meeting. Related tuition raises: out-of-state from \$105 to \$109 per credit hour, and non-credit from \$50 to \$53 per 30 hours.

In other action:

- ASLCC election results were approved: Adam Young, president; Noni Lundi, vice president; Thomas Lee, treasurer; Angela Kellner, cultural director; David Jost, Randy Dreiling, Zach Majors, Aisha Panas, Trev Mostella, Lisa Linnell, Christian Hill, and Max Reams, senators. The \$.50 Torch fee was defeated. Passed were ASLCC constitutional revisions, funding for the statewide student leaders association, and a cap on student fees at 78.5 percent of one credit hour of tuition.
- Computer user support associate of applied science degree program was approved.
- Avionics technician associate of applied science, two-year and one-year certificate programs were approved.
- Selection waiver for process redesign consultants was approved with Michael Dubick abstaining. The consultants are Ted Jeffcoat of Coopers & Lybrand and Susan Phillips of Phillips & Associates, for a combined total fee not to exceed \$128,000.
- Retirements were accepted from W. Donald Smith, Study Skills instructor; Dick Reid, Performing Arts chair; and Richard Fraga, biology instructor.

Major discussion focused on the **full-time part-time faculty ratio**. The board heard considerable testimony from a standing-room-only crowd arguing for a higher ratio of full-time to part-time faculty. The board pledged extensive review of the issue, including a work session.

In case you were wondering

The U.S. House and Senate are working to resolve large differences in the recissions each has proposed for federal spending for fiscal year 1995. Despite the recissions, overall funding for education in FY 1995 will still be greater than in FY 1994. Here's a run-down:

- Congress initially appropriated \$33.7 billion for the U.S. Department of Education for FY 1995. This is an increase of \$6.7 billion over FY 1994 or about 20 percent more.
- The President's proposed budget would rescind \$188 million or about 2.7 percent of the increase.
- The House of Representatives' bill would rescind \$1.7 billion or about 25 percent of the increase.

The Senate's bill would rescind \$405 million or about 6 percent of the increase.

Key programs at risk in the various bills are Carl Perkins funding as we know it, Title III grants, and numerous K-12 programs. Source: The Guide to Federal Assistance Newsletter, May 3, 1995. - Sarah LaMaster, Ext. 2312.



Voters support Lane

Strong voter support carried Lane's \$42.8 million bond request to victory on Tuesday. The final count showed a 52 percent yes vote vs. a 38 percent no vote (overvotes and undervotes comprised the remainder). "The voters understand how important we are to the community," said President Jerry Moskus. "They recognize the value of community college education."

The Board of Education held a phone meeting yesterday to authorize issuance of the bonds and hire

architects. Staff input to the design phase will begin with the identification of about 30 user groups, said Campus Services Director Paul Colvin. Many of the groups may not convene until fall when all staff are back from summer leave. The master planning phase will take six to nine months.

Lane to train Hyundai employees

Lane will train Hyundai Electronics America employees, Business and Industry Services Director Dave Oatman said Monday after the corporation's announcement that it will build a \$1.3 billion computer memory chip plant in Eugene. This is the third major employer Lane has helped attract to the community in recent years by delivering customized workforce training. Sony Disc Manufacturing selected Springfield in January 1994 as the site of a new plant and Symantec Corporation chose Eugene for its technical support division relocation in October 1993. Each company cited Lane's custom training services as a key factor in its location decision, as did Hyundai. training services as a key factor in its location decision, as did Hyundai.

Oatman said Lane and Hyundai officials are working out a specific training program. He anticipates training mostly operators and technicians. In the meantime, Bob Vogel in the Electronics Department is developing new courses applicable to the microelectronics industry such as wafer manufacturing, integrated circuits and clean room procedures. Oatman said prospective employees

could get a head start by studying electronics, math, and chemistry.

Hyndai officials expect to hire about 1,000 people beginning spring or summer 1996 and to begin production in January 1997. Lane would train employees after the hiring process.

ESL students get a boost

Spanish speaking students in the English as a Second Language are getting a boost. Heidi Baer, a University of Oregon student intern with the Counseling Department, and Julio Postigo, a university graduate from Bolivia now working on an associate degree at Lane, teamed up last winter to offer counseling and advising services in Spanish to ESL students. Such services have been provided mostly in English.

The duo conduct new student orientations and offer one-on-one counseling and advising. Postigo, who holds a teaching

credential in physical education, kicked in and formed an ESL intramural soccer team this spring as a bonus. Clients come from all educational and economic backgrounds, age groups, and countries. They want to know about financial aid, transferring international college credits, immigration, and other issues. Lead instructor Maxine Frauman says ESL is an open-entry program and typically serves 400 students at any given time. Winter term statistics show 122 students from Asia, 31 from Europe, 237 from Latin America, and 12 from the Middle East.

Baer and Postigo's services are funded through June. They are seeking additional funding and hope to add in-depth, single-topic orientations and to organize an ESL student government.

PTK chapter earns five-star status

Lane's Sigma Zeta Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, the honor society for two-year colleges, has been named a Five Star Chapter. PTK executive Director Rod Risley wrote in a congratulatory letter that Lane's chapter "has continually proved itself as an exemplary model of Phi Theta Kappa's four hallmarks: scholarship, leadership, fellowship, and service." He also thanked President Jerry Moskus for "allegiance to the Sigma Zeta Chapter which continues to draw regional and international attention to the academic superiority of Lane Community College." Moskus received the Most Supportive College President award at a recent regional convention and Dr. Velma Jesser won the Horizon Award for Advisors. Several Lane student officers also won awards at the convention (see May 9 Daily). Lane's chapter will be listed in the international PTK 1996 Awards Tabloid and in the Five-Star Chapter Program Guide, Seventh Edition."


