# Hi-tech training program launched

A pre-employment training program for high-tech occupations was announced by officials from Lane, Sony Disc Manufacturing and Symantec Corporation on Tuesday. The program will prepare graduates for entry-level jobs with high-tech employers such as Sony and Symantec. In turn, employers will have a steady flow of qualified applicants. Eight-week training sessions of 20 participants each will begin monthly over the course of one year. The pilot session begins Oct. 30, preceded by an Oct. 2 orientation. Training will be conducted at Lane and on site at Sony and Symantec.

"This is a win for everyone," said Lane President Jerry Moskus, "but especially for students who will get quick, job-specific training for the local high-tech industry." Vice President Larry Warford said the program is unique because it focuses on pre-employment. Participants will gain qualifications for high-tech jobs and local employers will be assured of a steady flow of skilled applicants.

Half of the program's direct instructional costs will be covered by participant tuition of \$495. The other half will be paid by Sony and Symantec. Lane will absorb all indirect costs.

As with other business-education partnerships Lane has pioneered, teamwork was the key to success. Serving on Lane's core team were Patti Lake, Kay Lutz-Ritzheimer, Linda Loft, and Dave Oatman, with leadership from Larry Warford and support from Jerry Moskus. The U.S. teacher secures a leave of absence without pay and receives a maintenance allowance from the U.S. Information Agency or Fulbright Commission.

He was the only community college professional of the 12 inaugural inductees. The hall was established this year to recognize graduates for exemplary leadership in education, excellence in the profession, governmental service, scholarship and productivity in contributing to education, and educational innovation. Moskus earned three degrees from ISU: a doctorate in educational administration in 1983, a master's in English in 1968, and a bachelor's in English in 1965. He has been president at Lane since 1990.
