### Trial access extended for on-line grants database

Staff and faculty can try out the Illinois Researcher Information Service (IRIS) on the World Wide Web via Netscape through October 20. IRIS is a unit of the University of Illinois Library at Urbana-Champaign. The IRIS database has been compiled since 1979 and currently contains over 7,000 federal and non-federal funding opportunities in the sciences, social sciences, arts, and humanities. It is compiled on the basis of information provided by the sponsors themselves and is updated daily. The database supports full Boolean searching on a dozen fields, including keywords in program descriptions. To access IRIS via the World Wide Web open this location: http://www.grainger.uiuc.edu/iris/. From the IRIS home page, click on "IRIS (www version)" for the funding database or "OPS (www version)" for access to selected items from the Federal Register and Commerce Business Daily. Please send feedback on your search experience to Sarah LaMaster, Institutional Advancement, at 2312 or via e-mail. If enough users find the service valuable, the grants office will acquire a collegewide subscription.




### Neuroscientist to lecture

## Clinic offers low-cost dental hygiene care

Low cost dental hygiene care is available to the public at Lane's Dental Clinic. Services provided include teeth cleaning and gum disease therapy, including check-up x-rays and screening exams, for \$15 to \$25 for adults and \$10 for children. Sealants are available for adults and children for \$2 per tooth. Other services include nutritional counseling, polishing and recontouring of fillings, and bacterial microscopic evaluations, all at no cost. Students perform the services under professional supervision. Graduates of the college's two-year degree program in dental hygiene consistently enjoy a 100 percent employment rate. Lane offers one of only five such programs in Oregon. Call 2206 for an appointment.



### Classified Council to participate in diversity training

At Classified Council's Sept. meeting, Donna Albro, director of Affirmative Action, reviewed Lane's Affirmative Action Plan. 

### Mutant sculpture show opens today

Wall-mounted faux Dalmatian parts and a 30-foot long Mickey Mouse rug are part of the installation sculpture by Portland artist Bruce Conkle showing in the Art Department Gallery today through Nov. 9. Described by some as a postmodern prankster, Conkle will lecture on his work today at noon sponsored by ASLCC. A reception will follow.

Conkle's bizarre sculptures have been called mutant, distorted, funny, lascivious, frightening and weird. The 31-year-old artist uses a startling variety of objects from toys to fake fur to tiny television screens running actual videos. Comments from his writings include "There is no normalcy, only a thinly veiled facade...." and "Consumerism has virtually replaced spirituality throughout the first world nations ... every object can be considered evidence and we are all implicated."

Conkle has shown in Oregon, New York and Iceland in solo and group shows. He was one of only 60 artists selected

from 700 contenders for the provocative Portland Art Museum exhibit, "Crosscut," in 1993. He received his undergraduate degree from the University of Oregon and his master's from the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston.

### OSBDCN cited as exemplary program

The Association of Small Business Development Centers renewed certification for the Oregon Small Business Development Center Network based on its outstanding business assistance program. The president of the ASBDC awarded the certificate to Sandy Cutler, state director of the OSBDCN, at the national conference in New Orleans earlier this month. The certification process involved evaluations of various program areas including counseling, training, geographic coverage of services, and research resources. The final report prepared by the review committee commends the OSBDCN as an "... exemplary program that has made a significant national contribution in the form of products and program innovations."

### Donations sought for Virginia DeChaine scholarship fund

The Virginia Howard DeChaine Memorial Endowed Scholarship Fund lives as a dream in the hearts of one anonymous donor and the LCC Foundation. The donor has pledged \$1,500 and hopes staff will donate the additional \$8,500 necessary to establish a \$10,000 endowment. The \$10,000 minimum is necessary because endowments draw awards from interest, not principal, explains Foundation Director Joe Farmer. Additional eligibility criteria includes first-year status with plans to continue; cumulative GPA of 3.0 or better; financial need; and enrollment or past enrollment in Listening and Critical Thinking.

DeChaine taught listening, critical thinking and speech at Lane from 1967-95. In addition to teaching, she chaired the Mass Communications Department from 1968-73. She was a national expert in listening skills and built a renowned listening skills programs at Lane. She passed away Aug. 2 at age 65 due to unknown causes.
