Instructor of the year shares tips

Classified Council report

Classified Council's Oct. 11 meeting covered several topics. Members expressed concerns about problems they and others have had with finding adequate meeting facilities on campus. Council briefly discussed hiring and promotional practices at Lane. The group gave kudos to Phyllis Geyer in Counseling for her work on a version of the mentoring program that she will implement using Phi Theta Kappa students. Council also considered suggestions made by members at the last meeting for improving campus building signs.

During its Oct. 25 meeting, Classified Council and other staff participated in a diversity training called "A Winning Balance" facilitated by Donna Albro, director of Affirmative Action. Those attending were encouraged to think about how people perceive, rate and react to others who are different from themselves; participants were asked to rate their own reactions to "guests" introduced on a video. Albro said that according to the training model, people react to one another based on a "tolerance scale" which consists of five ratings: appreciation, acceptance, tolerance, avoidance and repulsion. She said the model shows that in a respectful environment, appreciation and acceptance are the only acceptable ratings.

Board report

- appointed Robert Sposato as Adult Basic and Secondary Education instructor.

The board heard an update on the Cottage Grove center bond-funded expansion. The \$1.7 million project will quadruple services to local residents.

The next meeting will be Dec. 13 at 7 p.m., preceded by a 5:30 p.m. work session on the board's evaluation policy.

Faculty Council report

At Faculty Council's Oct. 16 meeting, members focused on a document that describes council's mission and goals. Council made revisions to the document and reaffirmed that the group is "a collective voice of the faculty" which "makes decisions on behalf of the faculty within the governance structure."
