Dr. Mary F.T. Spilde, vice president of Instructional Services at Lane, has been reappointed to a four-year term on the Workforce Quality Council. Gov. John Kitzhaber made the appointment and the Oregon Senate confirmed it.

College Council report

The proposed academic calendar for 1996/97 posed two issues at the Dec. 5 College Council meeting. One dilemma was whether to begin fall term on Monday, Sept. 23, which is Yom Kippur, or to delay classes until Tuesday in respect for the religious holiday. The other problem was that no break occurs between summer session and fall in-service. Council did not reach consensus. Members will share their opinions with Vice President Linda Fossen for forwarding to the president and Board of Education. The board is set to approve the calendar on Dec. 13.

A land exchange between Lane and McDougal Brothers Investments would improve main campus boundaries for future expansion, Campus Services Director Paul Colvin told council. Lane would receive 100 acres to the southwest and give up 100 acres to the southeast. The value of the exchange would be \$515,900, the appraised value of Lane's parcel, which McDougal would match with 53 acres it purchased from Northwest Christian College for \$176,670, 47 acres it acquired for \$53,440, and a cash payment of \$285,790.

In other business:

- Council noted a **management agreement** will go to the board for approval next week allowing managers frozen at the top of the salary scale to earn advancement to a tenth step.
- Some members expressed concern that council will not have a chance to review the president's **report on hiring and promotional practices** going to the board next week.
- A discussion of courtesy appointments was postponed.
- A report on technology committees at Lane was presented by Bob Barber.

Board report

Discussion of hiring and promotional practices consumed more than an hour of the Board of Education's time at its Dec. 13 meeting, with about 50 people in attendance. President Jerry Moskus responded to concerns and recommendations raised by English instructor William Powell at prior board meetings. He reiterated his and Lane's commitment to affirmative action and recounted progress made in that direction while acknowledging that there is much work still to do. In a written report he concluded, "Our essential challenge, as I see it, is to remain flexible and responsive to community needs while accelerating our progress in addressing the need for affirmative action." That report and a "recommendations/response" report are available from the President's Office. Powell and others in the audience stated concerns and views. Powell challenged certain details in the president's statement and said, "If this board is serious about dealing with hiring and promotional practices, as well as other discrepancies, it will recommend that a committee be created to look into these and other allegations...." The board will continue discussion next month in executive session.

In other business, the board:

- tabled action on the proposed exchange 100 acres of land with McDougal Brothers;
- approved the academic calendar for 1996/97 with a 4-2 vote, Cable and Hall opposing;
- unanimously approved a management agreement allowing managers frozen at the top of the salary scale to earn advancement to a tenth step;
- unanimously approved the appointment of Sally Weston to the Budget Committee;
- unanimously approved the budget calendar for 1996/97;
- unanimously authorized routine budget transfers;
- unanimously approved a pool of trainers for Zenger Miller leadership training;
- unanimously endorsed the Metro Sports Commission' area sports plan;
- unanimously approved advisory committee appointments;
- and unanimously approved TBG Architects for Mechanical Technologies reroofing design. In personnel action, the board unanimously:
- accepted the resignation of Mechanical Technologies instructor James Mathews;
- accepted the resignation of Mechanical Technologies instructor Wayne Workman;
- appointed Habte Woldu as instructor in the Fast Forward program;
- and appointed Cheryl Kempner as instructor in Study Skills.
 - The board's next regularly scheduled meeting is set for Jan. 10.

Bond update

A new bond projects user group to identify outdoor physical education facility needs will be established, the Facilities Management Committee decided at its Dec. 14 meeting. The other 29 groups have been meeting with college architects to identify specific facilities needs. Their work should be done by late January. Then, if the cost of meeting all needs exceeds funds, campuswide discussion will be held to prioritize and scale back projects. The goal is to have an updated master facilities plan by spring 1996 and to begin the design of new facilities in the fall. Paul Colvin, chair of the facilities committee, agreed to requests to write up the basic steps and timelines of the planning and decision process for the user groups.

In other bond news:

- Parking lot paving is substantially complete.
- Cottage Grove Center construction documents are being completed.
- Florence Center architect is still collecting data for a center master plan.
- Instructional equipment purchase plans are being developed by the Office of Instructional Services. To date, only a flight simulator has been purchased.
- Area high schools are jazzed about becoming outreach centers of the college, Vice President Larry Warford reports.
- Wildish Building remodel plans have been formulated.
- Energy conservation upgrades have begun with initial lighting system upgrades.
- Disability accessibility improvements have begun with upgrade of the fire alarm system at the Downtown Center. The ADA Review Committee will set overall priorities in January.
- Auto and Mechanical Technology Buildings reroof design work has received board approval and the job should be bid in early spring.
