## College Council meets next week

## Two diversity trainings scheduled

Two sessions each of Synergy and Respectful Environment will be offered on Martin Luther King Day, Jan. 15. Synergy is a four-hour course on equal opportunity, discrimination and affirmative action laws and the responsibilities and potential liabilities for Lane staff in carrying out the law. Respectful Environment is a three-hour course on the myths and stereotypes we have regarding people whose race, ethnic background, gender, sexual orientation, age, and abilities are different from our own, and the negative impact that acting on these myths and stereotypes has on Lane staff and students.

## Tension surfaces at art gallery

"Surface Tension," a collection of new works by three Eugene artists, will be exhibited in the Art Department Gallery from Jan. 8-Feb. 2. Featured will be encaustic paintings by Natalie Shifrin Whitson, paintings by Susan Applegate, and sculptural paintings by Martha Snyder. ## Thirteen apply for board seat

Thirteen citizens have applied for the Zone 4 vacancy on the Board of Education. The board will meet Tuesday, Jan. 9 in the Boardroom to review applications and meet candidates. The board hopes to select three finalists for further interviews on Monday, January 29. The successful candidate will serve through June 30, 1997. The seat will be up for election in March 1997 for a four-year term beginning July 1, 1997.

## Oregon job outlook

The Oregon Employment Department's most recent occupational employment projections indicate that between 1995 and 2005 six out of every 10 new jobs will come in only three of the seven major occupational categories: the professional and technical group (nearly 80,000 new jobs); the service-related group (about 63,000 new jobs); and the production, construction-related group (about 55,000 new jobs). The professional and technical group offers excellent opportunities across a wide range of occupations; 20 occupations in this group are expected to add more than 1,000 new jobs each. Some of the fastest growing occupations in Oregon are related to the booming high technology and gaming industries.

Four of the top 10 fastest-growing occupations are high-skilled technology jobs as semiconductor processors, computer scientists, computer engineers, and electric/electronic engineering technicians.

## College Council invites comment on land exchange

## Government closure affects students

The current government closure is interrupting service for students who are recent applicants for financial aid, or who have recently completed their financial aid files. The federal processor is accepting the student's application, but is not providing output records to colleges. In addition, corrections made to student data by staff in the Financial Aid Office, or by students themselves, are also being accepted, but schools are not receiving updated output records. Lane has not received any output records since December 19. The Financial Aid Office is unable to process new applicants, or to award or pay students whose data required correction, until the output records are received. Once the flow of data resumes, staff may need several days to clear up the backlog of work. Based on last year's data, the office estimates that 100 new applications have been submitted by students but have not been received by the college. The office has sent corrections for approximately 25 students that have not been returned by the processor.

College Council on Jan. 9 advised President Jerry Moskus to gather more information on a proposed land exchange between Lane and McDougal Brothers before making his recommendation to the Board of Education. Council declined making its own recommendation. Council suggested considering water quality test results, a property owners' planning consortium, retaining a land planner, developing a long term property plan, and a Science Department educational use evaluation. Campus Services Director Paul Colvin said the greatest value of the land is in future development when the parcels eventually are included in the urban growth boundary. Current zoning for both parcels is forestry with one residence each. Moskus wants to make his recommendation to the board in February.

Council received more information on the legal issues surrounding courtesy appointments but deferred analysis to a project team proposed by the vice presidents. Tuition waivers were instituted to reward volunteerism but have since become an expected form of compensation. The vice presidents want a resolution in place for 1996/97.

A discussion on academic calendaring was postponed.

Discussing finances, President Moskus remarked, "I have more concern about the budget this year than in any of my six years at Lane." He referred to the impact of the equalization formula that has level-funded Lane even though expenses continue to increase.

Council will meet for a budget exercise on Tuesday, Jan. 16 at 1:30 p.m. in the Boardroom; all interested staff are invited to join in. The next regular meeting is Tuesday, Feb. 6, in the Boardroom.

## Board report

Michael Dubick was appointed vice chair of the Board of Education through June 30, 1996, at the board's Jan. 10 meeting.

The president's annual evaluation began with a revised form for board members to complete and return to the chair at the Jan. 20 work session. The board will hold an executive session on the topic on Jan. 29. Also, the chair and vice chair will hold contract talks with the president and report back to the other board members. The current contract expires Feb. 1997.

Concerns about hiring and promotional practices were kept before the board by Britt Powell, wife of English instructor Bill Powell, and student Harry Jacobs. Chair Cindy Cable said the board will next discuss the issue in a Jan. 16 executive session where legal opinion will be offered, and again in a Jan. 20 open work session.

In other news:

- The faculty union has given notice that it wishes to commence contract bargaining, said LCCEA president Dennis Gilbert.
- Joy M. Wells was approved as Adult High School instructor.
- Headcount enrollment for credit students dipped less than 1 percent and noncredit headcount rose 3.8 percent as of the third day of winter term, reflecting a statewide trend attributed to a better job market and more aggressive recruiting by state universities, said President Jerry Moskus.
- The classified union is feeling frustrated by a lack of cooperation from Personnel Services regarding various grievances, reported union chief Alen Bahret.
- Budget breakfasts for board and community members will be held Jan. 18 and 25.

## Air transportation tax expires

The air transportation tax on airline tickets expired on December 31, 1995 for travel beginning on or after January 1, 1996. Unless Congress reenacts the tax retroactively, a refund of the tax may be due to passengers who bought tickets prior to January 1, 1996, for travel during

the period when the tax is not in effect. Refund eligibility will not be completely determined until a decision is made by the federal government. We do know this: refunds will only be issued by the IRS or the airlines directly to the ticket purchaser (not by or to any travel agencies). The issues will not be resolved until the current round of budget negotiations is concluded and Congress takes action to re-authorize the tax. Only then will we know if the tax is to be applied in arrears, from a given date forward, or not at all. This decision could take days, weeks or months. Save all ticket receipts and look for more information on this topic. - Lloyd Rain, Purchasing Services, 2208

The last meeting of the Instructional Equipment Bond User Group (IEBUG) was Thursday, January 11 at 5 p.m. in Forum 308. During that meeting the group decided to conduct a collegewide assessment of instructional equipment needs so that the nature of these needs might be better understood. Assessment forms are being distributed by e-mail to all budget authorities for all college budget units. Those budget authorities without access to e-mail should contact Tom Wayne (2446) or Sarah LaMaster (2312) for a paper copy. The assessment form is designed to gather information regarding the top two instructional equipment priorities from each budget unit. These can include packaged requests to meet specific instructional needs (for example, 40 computers to equip two new rooms). The form also requests information describing how the equipment will be used and what instructional need will be satisfied with it. Responding departments are also requested to assist in recommending criteria to use for allocating instructional bond funds. The forms need to be returned to Tom Wayne by February 5.

The next meeting of the IEBUG is Thursday, February 8 at 5 p.m. in SCI 104. During this meeting the group will review and discuss the results of the assessment survey.

## Don't miss out on Medicare

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month of your 65th birthday, whether you are retired or still working. You apply for Medicare automatically when you apply for Social Security benefits. You should apply for Medicare separately if you plan to retire after age 65. When you enroll in Part A (hospital insurance) on Medicare, you also are automatically enrolled in Part B (supplementary medical insurance), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B. If you enroll in Part B at the earliest opportunity, you pay monthly premiums. These premiums are usually deducted from your Social Security benefits. Late enrollment in Part B may mean you will pay higher premiums. Questions about Medicare should be directed to the Social Security Administration at 1-800-234-5772. ## New search tool available on the Web

Alta Vista is a new Web search engine by Digital located at "www.altavista.digital.com". The engine accesses eight billion words found in over 16 million Web pages. Developers combined a fast Web crawler with scaleable indexing software to build a large index of the Web in fall 1995. After two months of internal testing, the site became public on Dec. 15. Within three weeks of launch, Alta Vista was handling over two million http requests per day.

Sarah LaMaster of Institutional Advancement tested Alta Vista by running a search for her maiden name, Ulerick. "After only a few seconds," she says, "the first item up on the list of 15 or more "matches" was me, cited as co-author of a research article published in 1991! I was also linked to the home page of a colleague at Florida State University. More amazingly, I found that an unknown third or fourth cousin had done well with his livestock entry at the 1995 Indiana State Fair and another was playing football for DePauw University. Both were from Twelve Mile, Indiana, the small farming community where my grandparents were newlyweds and my father was born!"
