I simply went through the staff directory and checked off who I thought would return their survey and added up the department totals. In my predictions on the wellness programs available in the wellness survey, I utilized a combination of my favorite years working here at LCC and my fellow co-workers phone extensions." Here are the survey results:

- 532 surveys returned (56.4% return rate)
- 67 Volunteers responded to offer assistance with the programs

Needs:

- 81% report the need to include more exercise in their life
- 79% want to reduce their weight to achieve a healthier lifestyle

He is associate professor of African Studies at the State University of New York at Stony Brook and also teaches a course in Afro-American Literature at Columbia University. He has taught at the University of Buffalo, San Francisco State University, Yale University, and George Washington University.

She has a doctorate in curriculum and instruction from the University of Oregon, where she also earned her bachelor's degree, and a master's degree in educational administration from the University of Southern California.

She has participated in numerous civic organizations and is current president of the McKenzie Community Dollars for Scholars and a fundraiser for Habitat for Humanity.

Council has not reached consensus on the swap but a show of hands revealed majority opposition. President Jerry Moskus said he would write a recommendation and present it to council for reaction.

The future of courtesy appointments must be settled by March 15 for the 1996/97 budget planning process, Vice President Marie Matsen told council. Union and legal concerns have risen around courtesy appointments. Council has received confidential legal opinion and agreed that a task force which has been tackling the issue should continue its work.

Faculty will be squeezed between in-service and orientation this fall, Counseling Department staff warned council. The 1996/97 academic calendar allows only one week between summer and fall terms, a week less than previous years. Council will search for a solution at a future meeting and also advised that the issue should be discussed by Faculty Council.

Barb Delansky has replaced Carl Horstrup on council, representing the Management Steering Committee.

The next regularly scheduled College Council meeting is Tuesday, March 5. Meetings are open to all interested staff and students.

Library adds 77 year-old film to its collection

To help commemorate African American History Month the Library has available an annotated list of over sixty videotapes which examine the history and celebrate the achievements of African Americans. Griffith's *Birth of a Nation*, a pro-Klan film which ignited controversy and broke box office records across the country, *Within Our Gates* confronted racism head-on and is said to remain a powerful work.

Faculty Council supports collegewide tutoring program

At Faculty Council's Feb. 8 meeting, Mason Davis, Counseling, presented a proposal to develop a coordinated tutoring program at Lane. Council supported the general concept but added that the tutoring program should be designed to meet the needs of all at-risk students; should be coordinated with other student retention, advising, and study skill efforts at Lane; should be proactive and preventative rather than reactive and crisis oriented; and should be coordinated, monitored and evaluated by faculty.

Council discussed the reasons for the Friday deadline of exam week for turning in grades and brainstormed ideas for improving the efficiency of the data entry process used for grades. Suggestions included having faculty use scantrons or spreadsheet software to record grades. Council considered a proposal by Jill McKenney, Mathematics, to incorporate math across the curriculum as a way to help students who are at risk of not completing math requirements for graduation. Council agreed to support the proposal for math across the curriculum. On-line grants database available on college network

Faculty and staff can access the Illinois Researcher Information Service (IRIS) on the World Wide Web via Netscape. The IRIS database currently contains over 7,000 federal and nonfederal funding opportunities in the sciences, social sciences, arts, and humanities. In addition to grants for program development, IRIS contains numerous sources for faculty fellowships, research awards, travel stipends, and other opportunities for professional development. To access the IRIS home page via the World Wide Web open "www.grainger.uiuc.edu/iris/". From there chose "Search IRIS and OPS (subscribers only)". To go directly to the WWW search interface for subscribers, open "carousel.lis.uiuc.edu/~iris/search.html". For best results, start with a quick search using only one or two key words. Later, narrow the search if you get a large number of "hits." Airline ticketing tax refund

The federal excise tax of 10 percent on all domestic air fares expired on December 31, 1995. People who bought tickets in 1995 for travel in 1996 can get the tax refunded by filing Internal Revenue Service Form 8849. Some additional twists: Although most airlines don't want to deal with the refunds, a few will. American Airlines will credit the refund to customers who charged their tickets. Those who paid cash can send a claim form through American or through their travel agents. Delta has its own claim form and will process refunds for cash or credit internally. Note: the tax is likely to be reinstated but is not likely to be made retroactive. If you're planning a trip for later in the year, you might want to consider purchasing your tickets now. - Lloyd Rain, Purchasing Services, 2208
