Feedback wanted on proposed tuition increase

Due to Ballot Measure 5 and changes in funding, Lane is facing a budget deficit of approximately \$2 million next year. To partially off set this deficit, the college is considering a \$2 per credit increase (from \$32/credit to \$34/credit). This increase will generate approximately \$680,000. This leaves an approximate deficit of \$1.3 million to be made up by budget adjustments and/or program reductions. The proposed \$2 tuition increase would still leave Lane at about the average tuition rate of other Oregon community colleges. Want to check e-mail and the Net from home?

During spring term, Computer Services hopes to begin making remote access to the LCC network available to all staff who have a home computer with the minimally required hardware and software configuration. Remote access will also allow staff whose offices are located in locations not directly wired to the network to connect as well.

Staff is advised that the college can make available free remote access to e-mail using a text-based mail system, not the full-blown BeyondMail interface. It will be the same mail in the same mailbox, but through a text interface. Remote access with the usual BeyondMail graphic interface will be available for departmental purchase at \$42 per installation. Netscape-based Internet access will be available to all remote users, at no cost.

Staff is advised that to access the system from off-campus will require approximately 20 MB of hard disk space on your remote system. Classes on the installation and use of remote access will be offered later in the spring through the network training program. Participation in these classes will be required before the installation disks will be made available. The only training and support for installation will take place through these classes; computer support staff does not have the capability of making home visits. Anyone wishing remote access who has not yet taken their Basic Net I class and established their network account will be required to do so before attending the remote access class.

Attached to today's Daily is a survey which everyone wishing to gain remote access is asked to complete and return by campus mail to Computer Services by Wednesday, April 10. Departments are asked to make a special effort to ensure that this survey is made available to part-time employees.

However, this section does not restrict the right of a public employee to express political views." The wearing of political buttons is an acceptable expression of views, even while on the job, Secretary of State Phil Keisling told the Legislative Action Team last week.

In addition to a better selection of classes, students will learn more about available programs, choose the right courses, and make appropriate plans for meeting their educational goals. "When students plan in advance," counselor Rich Freund says, "they know more about requirements and feel far more in control of their academic careers. They also can plan ahead for child care, finances and the like."

Counselor and co-developer of the program, Jan Brandstrom, adds "We've arranged early advising sessions so that students can connect with their advisors and programs. We also have sessions for undeclared majors so they can explore their options at Lane." She adds, "We want students to feel at home at Lane and use their dollars for education wisely."

Change of marital status on insurance

When you have a change in your marital status due to death, divorce or legal separation, you will need to delete your spouse from medical, vision and dental insurance coverage since they no longer qualify as a dependent under these plans. Change of status forms can be completed in Personnel Services. Remember, when you delete a spouse from insurance coverage because he/she is no longer a dependent, the college will offer them the option to self-pay for coverage for a period of 36 months or longer. Updated computer support standards issued today

The Computer Support Committee has completed its review of the collegewide standards for supported hardware and software and is issuing an updated list attached to today's Daily. The committee has changed the process for submitting revisions in the future. Requests for revisions to the list may be made at any time and will be reviewed once each term by the committee. Changes to the supported hardware and software list will be issued as needed.

The Computer Support Committee received several requests to add Windows 95 to the list of supported software. The committee issued a memorandum to PC computer users on August 24, 1995 explaining that Windows 95 could not be supported at that time due to incompatibilities with Lane's wide area network. Since then, staff of Computer Services have been testing Windows 95 using the latest version of the Banyan network operating system. There are still significant problems using Windows 95 with the Banyan network drivers. Until all problems can be resolved, Windows 95 cannot be supported for computers linked to the college network. To maximize resources available for technical support, the committee has elected at this time to support only Windows 3.x and Mac 7.x. Migration to any new operating system will need to be a planned "phase-in" while the older operating system is phased-out. In the meantime, staff may use Windows 95 on stand-alone computers or for instructional purposes on computers not linked to the wide area network. To avoid adversely affecting the wide area network, please call the Help Desk at 4155 prior to installing Windows 95.

The list of supported hardware and software, the format for requesting revisions, and other pertinent information about the college's computer standards may be found on the Computer Support Committee's web page via the college business link on Lane's home page.
