David Shellabarger reported on the reasons for the Friday deadline for turning in students' term grades. Members noted that improved technology use could make data entry for grades more efficient. A council task force for student evaluations of faculty presented a draft of evaluation questions and asked members for feedback. College Council report

Nine recommendations regarding **full-time part-time faculty issues** will be parceled out to appropriate groups for feedback by a College Council subcommittee, the council at large decided at its May 7 meeting. Feedback will be used to form a council recommendation on who should act on each of the recommendations. The recommendations were made by a previous council subcommittee formed after the Future Faculty Task Force report came out. The recommendations, in brief:

- 1) Provide greater job security for part-time faculty.
- 2) Provide year-round health benefits for part-time faculty.
- 3) Better define part-time work descriptions and expectations.
- 4) Set a full-time/part-time ratio limit.
- 5) Plan to correct ratio imbalance in departments as needed.
- 6) Maximize FTE levels for individual part-time appointments.
- 7) Regularly review part-time faculty working conditions.
- 8) Hold annual Board of Education review of part-time faculty issues.
- 9) Establish department consistency in part-time orientations and practices.

Council also forwarded Bill Powell's recommendations on **diversity and racism** to another group, the Diversity Team. The team will be asked to review each point and solicit feedback from appropriate groups and then report back to council. Powell's recommendations, first made to the Board of Education on April 10, in brief:

- 1) Establish a racial harassment review board.
- 2) Require managers to set a diversity goal and be evaluated annually on that goal.
- 3) Subject part-time positions to equal opportunity guidelines.
- 4) Establish a part-time applicant pool representing underutilized groups for each department.
- 5) Establish a multicultural/interdisciplinary department staffed by full-time faculty.

Dedicated staff training time proposed by the Faculty Professional Development Team received support from council with a recommendation to the president and his leadership team to authorize and implement the proposal. The proposal is to keep open the second Wednesday of every month from 3-5 p.m. for training, and to keep open the other Wednesdays from 3-5 p.m. for meetings. Classes could still be held at that time, but that was the least scheduled time according to curriculum and scheduling records. Presenter Carmel DeCroos said her research showed strong support for dedicated staff training time from faculty and department heads, and that Instructional Services Council endorsed 1996/97 as a trial year.

Students and staff agree on needs

Students and staff agree on what needs to be done to improve service at Lane. That finding results from Students First! input sessions held May 6-13 for over 200 front-line staff and "process owners," and on May 14 for students. Sessions were devoted to financial transactions, enrollment, support services, and cross-functional processes. Two more drop-in

sessions are set for May 20 and May 30 from 3-4 p.m. in CEN 320/321. Some feedback:

- "As one very shy staff person, I felt like I could share and that I was heard."
- "I'm a new employee and am disturbed by the sense of, 'It will never get changed'."
- "This is the first time I truly felt a part of the 'Lane family'."

Evaluations from the sessions show that 97 percent of participants found the sessions effective, and 84 percent are satisfied with the Students First! project.

In addition to these sessions, the team is conducting a phone survey of current noncredit and credit students; piggy-backing onto an existing ACT student survey; conducting real time data gathering of students waiting in line for services; and benchmarking at outreach centers, private businesses, and other community colleges.

The team will draft recommendations for staff review by mid-July.

Students First! is the first process redesign project at Lane. The redesign team was recruited in March and charged with reviewing services to students and forming recommendations by July 25. Lead manager Linda Waddell says more projects will follow. Students First! is one of six administrative core processes identified by another team during summer 1995. The other core process areas are facilities/support, grants/contracts, personnel/payroll, planning/budget/financial transactions, and procurement.

Lane's track & field team gears up for final meet

The Lane track and field team is gearing up for the final meet of the season, the NWAACC Championships hosted by Mt. Hood Community college on Thursday and Friday, May 23 and 24. The team comes off of a great performance at the Southern Region Championships this past weekend. The Lane women won 10 events on their way to a 60 point margin over second place Mt. Hood; the Titan men were only 2.5 points shy of victory as Clark College just edged them out. Lane easily claimed the combined men's and women's title. At the NWAACC Championships the women will be seeking their third consecutive title, while the men look to move up from last year's second place finish.

She saw a poster advertising a job on the student literary magazine, *Denali*, in exchange for one free class, and went to apply. By mistake she walked into a *Torch* student newspaper editorial meeting. No one wanted to cover a funding story. Sohnrey thought, "Why not?" and volunteered. Her story made the front page and led to further assignments. When the editor quit before term's end, she got the job.

Sohnrey will continue her foray into journalism as 1996/97 associate editor of higher education for the Oregon Daily Emerald, the student newspaper at the University of Oregon. But she will major in anthropology, and minor in Russian, before committing any further to a journalistic future.

Gilbertson also has enrolled at the U of O where she will study business administration. She's been at Lane five years. In that time she's had two children. Daughter Holly is now four years old, and son Hunter is 15 months. Gilbertson is glad to be finishing her degree but says Lane was a great place to start. "I came from a little school and lacked confidence. I was nervous but found the teachers were really nice, and accommodating, and it was easy to get counseling and tutoring."

Dental assisting students achieve 100 percent pass rate

The 1995/96 dental assisting class was very successful on the national and state board exams. Dental assisting students take one national board and one state board before graduating from Lane's accredited program. The national board is divided into three parts and is administered in January, March and June. The state board is a practical, or "hands on" examination and is completed in June. The January and March examinations are written examinations that cover radiation health and safety (part one) and infection control (part two). Students have reported a 100 percent pass rate on these examinations. The next step for the students is to sit for part three of the national board which will cover clinical procedures in addition to submitting a full mouth set of radiographs for evaluation by representatives of the Dental Assisting National Board. Lane's dental assisting students traditionally do very well on these examinations. Dental assisting is a professional career which offers much flexibility and variety for anyone interested in a health career. The program is nine months in length and has an excellent reputation throughout the state. - Beth Webb
