## Instructor of the year was a student here too

Ruth Bichsel (*pronounced bic'-sell*) started out at Lane Community College as a student in 1975. Twenty-one years later, she's Instructor of the Year for 1995/96.

Bichsel attended Lane for one year and then transferred to the University of Oregon. There she earned a bachelor's degree in psychology in 1980, a master's degree in counseling in 1990, and is now working on her doctoral dissertation. She teaches half-time in Lane's Chemical Dependency Counselor Training Program and previously taught parenting courses at Lane. In addition, Bichsel is a graduate teaching fellow in the UO's Counseling Psychology Program, and is a psychologist associate resident at the Chrysalis Drug-Free Treatment Program. She has

conducted extensive research and published several papers, including some on Warm Springs Indian Reservation culture.

Students make Instructor of the Year nominations and past award winners make the final selection. Students cheered when the award was announced last week in Bichsel's class. Here are a few quotes from the student nomination forms: "I wanted to give up on school but she encouraged me to stick it out and helped me understand my subjects; now I'm getting As." "She makes you want to learn..." "she makes sure everyone is validated, learning and excelling..." "She not only believes in what she is teaching but she lives it in her everyday life...she is an example to her students." "She makes learning fun."

Bichsel was pleased and surprised by the award. "I love working here. Lane has such a diversity of people. I like a challenge, and I like working with people who are trying to change their lives." She is an active foster parent and has cared for 29 children over the years.

## Network training: remote access update

Computer Services and the network training staff hope to offer training sessions in how to install remote access software sometime next week through the first week of summer term. A schedule will be published in the June 11 *Daily*. The plan is to offer a choice of one-hour or two-hour training sessions depending on your prior experience. After the class, you will need to spend several hours doing the actual installation at home.

Home computers must meet minimum hardware requirements and have a functional modem to obtain remote access. Earlier this spring a yellow survey form was circulated for those interested in remote access to the network. The form listed hardware requirements. If you haven't filled out the form, contact Computer Services at 4155 to obtain one. Staff also must have completed Basic Net I training before attending remote access training. Additional Basic Net I classes will be announced.

Those with Macintosh computers at home will need Apple Remote Access software (Version 2.0.1) to access LCC's network by modem. This software is available for \$30 from the LCC Bookstore. Before attending remote access training, you should make your purchase at the Bookstore and bring the voucher with you to class, where you will be given the disks.

## College Council report

"Legalese gone amok" describes the current **student conduct code**, Kate Barry told College Council at its June 4 meeting. A revised, user-friendly code book is now being routed for feedback. The Executive Leadership Team will approve the final revision.

The **Ashlane housing** settlement will be revisited at a June 18 Board of Education work session, said President Jerry Moskus. Lane was awarded \$1.9 million over five years in 1992 from a state lawsuit against developers who failed to meet their contractual obligations to Lane and four other colleges. A staff/community task force failed to reach consensus on how Lane should use its funds. The settlement requires that the money be spent on student housing.

**When contracts exceed** 33 percent of public bid awards or 20 percent of other types of contracts, the Board of Education should be notified, even though Oregon law doesn't require it, according to proposal from Purchasing Director Lloyd Rain. Council supported the proposal, which would amend board policy 4A.050 on contractual authority.

**Council won't meet again until fall**, unless an urgent issue arises.

## Block Grants Task Force update

The Block Grants Task Force has explored in detail how federal block grants and Oregon's planned response to them will affect programs and services at Lane. Some program areas, such as the JOBS program, are already changing dramatically. At the state level, a Workforce Quality Council subcommittee co-chaired by Vice President for Instruction Mary Spilde, has developed a recommendation to the governor on the administration and governance of block grants at the local level. The recommendation calls for local level workforce development boards which will coordinate the policy and planning for allocating block grants, set and review performance expectations, and select an administrative unit. The local board would oversee workforce block grant funds, and could also oversee other education, employment and training initiatives. The Block Grants Task Force is preparing a recommendation outlining critical issues and strategic opportunities and noting the accountability that will come with them. The issues and action recommendation will help Lane shape its role locally and identify areas for statewide influence and leadership. A draft of the recommendation will be presented at the task force's next meeting, Wednesday, June 26, from 9-10 a.m. in the Boardroom. Interested Lane staff are invited to attend to review the recommendation and provide input to a final draft. Task force represents areas and functions of the college that will be affected when many federal education and job training programs are consolidated into block grants to the states. - Sarah LaMaster, 2312

## Cottage Grove construction bid up for award at board meeting

The Board of Education meets Wednesday, June 12, to hold a work session on bond construction planning at 5:15 p.m. in the Renaissance Room, and a regular meeting at 6:30 p.m. in the Boardroom, including a public hearing at 7 p.m. to adopt the 1996/97 budget and to levy 1996/97 taxes. Action items include bid awards for Cottage Grove center construction, Bookstore fixtures, and Center Building elevator improvement; and approval of ASLCC election results. Consent agenda action items include the president's annual authorizations, year-end budget transfers, brand name exemption for US Robotics modems, computerized wheel alignment system purchase, seismic engineering studies, and Wildish Building heating/air conditioning upgrade. ## Board report

At its June 12 meeting, the Board of Education approved the \$1.5 million bid of John Hyland Construction of Eugene to build Lane's new facility in Cottage Grove. A lower bid was found to have a transposition error and was allowed to be withdrawn. Lane's estimate is \$1.6 million.

The board adopted the 1996/97 budget and a resolution to levy taxes; approved ASLCC election results; awarded bids for Bookstore fixtures and Center Building elevator improvements; approved the president's annual authorizations, year-end budget transfers, brand name exemption for modems, seismic engineering studies, and Wildish Building heating/air conditioning upgrade.

Appointed were Paula Chan Carpenter as KLCC director of development, Rick Lyons as Willamette Career Center associate director, Ellen Palmer as Training & Development associate director, Linda Ericksen and Patricia Hansen as Business Technology instructors, and Linda Hagen as acquisitions librarian. Jan Brandstrom's retirement was accepted.

The Diversity Team gave a report detailing a new structure of subcommittees to tackle staff training; curriculum; student recruitment, retention and promotion; community involvement; campus communications; racial harassment; and other goals. Funding will be necessary to realize these objectives, said presenters, who announced a new African American Rites of Passage Summer Academy to be held at Lane this year. ## Budget year-end closing dates for the week

### Thursday, June 20

## Don't miss out on medicare

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You apply for Medicare - automatically- when you apply for Social Security Benefits. You should apply for Medicare separately if you plan to retire after age 65. When you enroll in Part A (hospital insurance) of Medicare, you are also automatically enrolled in Part B (supplementary medical insurance), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B. If you enroll in Part B at the earliest opportunity, you pay monthly premiums. These premiums are usually deducted from your Social Security benefits. Late enrollment in Part B may mean you will pay higher premiums. Questions about Medicare should be directed to the Social Security Administration at 1-800-234-5772. To apply for Medicare, go to the Eugene office at 377 Pearl Street.

## Insurance in retirement

Management employees need to remember that changing insurance carriers and/or adding dependents must be done at the open enrollment prior to the date of retirement so that the insurance coverage may continue into retirement. Faculty employees must have two years of immediate prior coverage with OEA Choice or HMO Oregon before retirement to be eligible to carry that same company's insurance into retirement. Once you retire, you cannot add a dependent or change insurance carriers.
