In my spare time I hope to ski, hike and cycle the Oregon countryside, and take in the culture of Eugene, which isn't much different from Madison, Wisconsin,

Miguel Harth-Bedoya, newly appointed music director/conductor of the Eugene Symphony Orchestra, will visit Lane on Friday, Nov. 8. A free, short concert in his honor will begin at noon in Performing Arts theater, followed by question and answer time from 12:20-1 p.m. for music students, faculty and community members. Born in Lima, Peru in 1968, Harth-Bedoya serves concurrently as artistic director of the New Opera Company of Peru and the Orquesta Filarmonica de Lima. ## Nursing program pronounced healthy

Lane's nursing program received a full eight-year accreditation from the National League for Nursing and the Oregon State Board of Nursing after a site visit that concluded November 7. That is the longest amount of time granted between visits. "One of the program characteristics both groups particularly noted," observed program coordinator Joyce Godels, "was that our pass rate for our graduates who take the registered nurse exam is 99.14 percent over the past 10 years."

Lane offers a two-year associate of applied science degree in associate degree nursing which prepares students for the National Council Licensure Examination to become an associate degree registered nurse. The college also offers a one-year certificate of completion in practical nursing which prepares students for the National Council Licensure Examination to become a licensed practical nurse.

A member of the Academic Forgiveness Committee will present proposals from other colleges on the notion of "academic forgiveness," Vice President for Instruction Mary Spilde will discuss options for changing the structure of department administration, and council will review faculty responses to Beisse's grading policy recommendations. - by Kimberly Buchanan

approved a fire alarm system for the Cottage Grove center from Honeywell Inc. for \$45,640; hired Hatten/Johnson Associates of Eugene for lighting retrofit services for \$113,000; approved a telephone systems upgrade from US West Communications for \$392,639; approved the academic calendar for 1997/98; and endorsed an academic achievement and discipline campaign sponsored by AFT and LCCEF. In personnel matter, the board approved Patrick Lanning as interim department chair of Health & Physical Education; approved Lawrence Scott as Cooperative Education instructor; accepted the retirement of aviation maintenance instructor German Ellsworth; accepted the retirement of social science instructor Joe Kremers; and accepted the retirement of adult basic education instructor Ida Templeton. All decisions were 7-0 unanimous.
