Winter term credit enrollment up slightly

Enrollment figures for the first day of winter term show 8,456 credit students, up .33 percent from 1996, and 3,701 Continuing Education students, down 17.04% from 1996. Final enrollment figures are calculated after the fourth week of the term. Until then, first-day figures include duplication between credit and noncredit students, as some individuals enroll for both. First-day figures also traditionally show Continuing Education enrollment down, since so many CE classes begin throughout the term and people tend to enroll just before the class, not by the first day of the term.

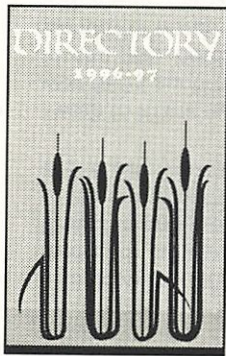

College Council report

A master calendar of events is a good idea but poses upkeep challenges, College Council agreed at its January 7 meeting in response to a proposal from Assistant to the President Tracy Simms. Councilors advised Simms that a master calendar should be on the network and perhaps limited in scope. They directed Simms to consult with the Instructional Support Staff Association and the Executive Leadership Team and report back.

President Jerry Moskus reviewed the statewide community college funding formula and distributed a simplified fact sheet. It was noted that a copy of the governor's budget is available on reserve in the library.

Moskus also led a discussion on policy governance and how board problem solving differs from internal problem solving. Lane's board has adopted a policy governance model and currently is reviewing its policies.

Council next meets on February 4.

Student pilots home safe

A Lane airplane piloted by two advanced students in the flight technology program landed in the snow about 20 miles southwest of Sunriver in Central Oregon about 8 p.m. Saturday while on a routine training flight. They spent the night in the plane and were rescued at about 9 a.m. Sunday morning. They were treated for mild hypothermia at a Bend hospital and released.

Flight Technology Department Chair Bob Farrand said Monday that the pilots are doing fine. "They did a fantastic job of landing safely and following proper survival procedures," he said. Lane is working with the Federal Aviation Administration in a standard follow-up investigation.

Lane's flight program has a perfect safety record with no accidents or injuries since 1967 when the program began. The program has earned two safety awards, the most recent in 1993 when the program was recognized by the FAA for having completed more than 20 million miles of flight training with a perfect safety record.

African-American group to honor Jerry Moskus and Lane

The African American Community Coalition will present its first-ever Certificate of Appreciation to Jerry Moskus and Lane at the Martin Luther King Jr. Day celebration this evening at the Hult Center Silva Hall in Eugene. The event begins at 7 p.m.

The award recognizes Moskus and Lane for co-sponsoring the African American Rites of Passage Summer Academy. The Rites of Passage Academy began in 1996 and provides scholastic and leadership courses in a college setting for at-risk African American ninth- and tenth-graders. Fifteen students attended the first academy at Lane from July 21 to August 9.

The award also recognizes the relationship that President Moskus and Lane have had with MLK Day activities. Lane students organized the first community celebration of MLK Day in 1987 and the college has co-sponsored the annual event ever since.

Moskus has led Lane since 1990. In addition to supporting MLK events and the Rites of Passage Academy, Moskus was the first Lane president in 14 years to hire a full-time affirmative action director in 1992 and to direct that the college's affirmative action plan be updated. He is a member of the Metro Area Leaders Task Force on Human Rights and Affirmative Action.

He has performed in many professional chamber groups and orchestras and has consulted for several groups. He was executive director of the Eugene Symphony Orchestra from 1989-92 and succeeded in getting it heard on NPR's Performance Today. He helped develop a nationally-copied model for orchestra/management relations.

"I'm very pleased to be able to serve the college and the Performing Arts Department," said Johnson. "Working with our talented faculty and student artists in all three disciplines, helping to shape the future of the arts and artists in Lane County, and producing high quality performances for the public to see at Lane makes this job both challenging and fulfilling. Even within our current fiscal restraints this department is brimming with energy and enthusiasm. Innovation and creativity are the passwords here, and I know everyone will be impressed by the continuing growth and artistic achievements of the Performing Arts Department."

Education reform update

The 1997 round of education reform activities at Lane will center on developing standards for PREP, Proficiencies for Entry into Programs. PREP is the community college piece of the seamless system envisioned for education in Oregon. During winter term, faculty and chairs from departments and disciplines in the eight PREP content areas will hone last year's first draft list of proficiencies. The process involves aligning the list with the lists from the Oregon State Board of Education for the CAM (Certificate of Advanced Mastery) and from the Oregon State Board of Higher Education for PASS, the Proficiency-based Admission Standards System. In the spring, faculty and chairs from all programs will be asked to indicate how the new list of PREP standards applies to their students.

IRIS has just added an "alert service" which will enable staff to create individual IRIS search profiles and receive periodic updates from the database automatically via e-mail. Board report

The Board of Education agreed at its January 15 meeting to complete the president's annual review by its February 12 meeting. Some board members called for more consistent information gathering for future evaluations.

In action the board unanimously approved Amy Riggins as Health & PE interim program coordinator, and Lawrence Scott as Cooperative Education instructor; approved an intergovernmental purchasing agreement with the State of Oregon; approved advisory committee appointments for over 450 citizens; and accepted the annual financial report from auditors Coopers & Lybrand.

The board also approved contract amendments for the collegewide master plan; Cottage Grove facility; process redesign consultants; and reroofing Auto, Air and Machine Technology Buildings.

In a long discussion of fiscal matters, President Jerry Moskus said tuition paybacks under Measure 47 now appear unlikely, but rolling back tuition is still a possibility.

The board next meets on Saturday, Feb. 1 in the Boardroom with executive session at 10 a.m., public comment on the budget at 11:30 a.m.; and a work session at noon.

Academic Council is appointed by the president to advise him about rules and regulations affecting academic areas of the college. Special attention is given to the maintenance of high academic standards. The council acts on student petitions covering extensions of deadlines, program waivers and college graduation requirements. The group has representation from faculty, Instructional Services Council, ASLCC, Office of Instruction, Admissions/Student Records, and classified staff.
