### Second group of Hyundai technicians begin training

The second group of 50 manufacturing technicians from Hyundai Semiconductor America began training at Lane on Monday. Business and Industry Services Director Dave Oatman says the group will complete 400 contact hours over the next 10 weeks. Courses will include algebra, chemistry, photo lithography, clean room procedures, wafer handling, team building, and several other subjects.

The men and women are from logging, food service, retail, book distributing, finance, electronics, homemaking, and other backgrounds. Some have associate or bachelor's degrees. All of them are from Lane County, as were all but two of the first group. The first group completed training in early January. Half are now receiving advanced training in Korea, and half in Eugene. Lane will train a total of eight groups, or 400 manufacturing technicians.

The project budget is \$1.2 million. About 60 percent is from state and federal economic development grants and 40 percent is from Hyundai.

In related events, Bob Vogel in Applied Engineering is developing an associate degree in semiconductor manufacturing.

Hyundai is the third major employer Lane has helped attract to the community in recent years with its custom training program, following Sony Disc Manufacturing in 1994 for whom Lane trained 250 employees, and Symantec Corporation in 1993 for whom Lane trained 150 employees.

The summary describes the act as "a complex piece of legislation comprised of five major titles," writes center director Connie Mesquita. "In general, the legislation addresses issues from the broad increases in Immigration and Natural Service, personnel to deportation and increases in number/amount of application fees. 

# **Board report**

The three B's dominated the February 19 Board of Education meeting: bargaining, bond and budget. Faculty crammed the gallery and stated contract concerns regarding security, seniority and salary for part-timers, insurance, and intellectual property rights. Campus Services Director Paul Colvin reviewed bond planning and activity; watch *The Daily* for excerpts. President Jerry Moskus walked the board through a \$1.3 million budget reduction proposal. "This would not be happening except for Measure 47," he said. "There are no good cuts anymore." The proposal was distributed to staff and hearings for students, staff and the public will be scheduled.

Chair Cindy Cable announced the completion of the president's annual evaluation. "It was a constructive process," said Vice Chair Michael Dubick. "The president received good marks and constructive feedback to set goals." Member Pat Riggs-Henson added, "Jerry works hard to keep our image positive in the community and to keep us going forward."

In other business, the board unanimously approved a contract award to TBG Architects for KLCC preliminary design; a contract amendment for Cottage Grove center construction; appointment of Anne Monroe as Adult Basic Skills instructor and Mark Whitson as housekeeping manager; and appointment of Kenneth Kuhns & Company as college auditors.
