Finding funding sources on the web


The Resource Development Group will host a training workshop, "Finding funding sources on the web," on Wednesday,

Retirees endow scholarships

Two retired administrators have pledged \$30,000 each to endow scholarships at Lane. The James E. Ellison Endowed Scholarship Fund will aid students of color and the Julie Aspinwall-Lamberts Endowed Scholarship Fund will aid survivors of domestic violence who have used Womenspace services.

Each fund will award a \$1,500 annual scholarship for tuition, books, fees, and other educational needs. Recipients must be enrolled half-time or more with a GPA of 2.5 or better and demonstrate financial need. A faculty-staff committee from the college Diversity Team will select the student of color recipient, and a committee from the college Women's Program will select the Womenspace recipient.

Ellison and Aspinwall-Lamberts, a married couple, each retired from Lane in 1995. Ellison worked at Lane for 29 years including the last five as vice president for instruction.

Asprinwall-Lamberts served the college for 21 years, including the last 11 as director of research and planning. The endowments will be established upon their deaths.

The donors wrote, "We recognize the tremendous impact that Lane has upon people's lives. We want to ensure that students will continue to have the opportunity to secure an education and to improve their lives. To that end, we've elected to sponsor these scholarships."

Overall, 60 percent of Lane students require some form of financial assistance, says LCC Foundation Director Joe Farmer. "This type of gift is being used by more friends of Lane. I believe people are concerned about increased costs for education and want to help our community." For more information, contact Farmer at 2803.

Academic forgiveness policy proposal update

Faculty Council received a number of responses from faculty and staff on the academic forgiveness policy proposal and determined that "Option 1" will be eliminated, leaving "Option 2" and "Option 3" for further consideration (see below). Departments that have not discussed the proposed policy are urged to do so within the next couple of weeks and report back to Margaret Bayless at 2162. Faculty Council will make a final recommendation on the policy at its March 13 meeting and will forward the recommendation to Academic Council.

- Option 2: All course and grade information will remain on the transcript along with a notation about being granted academic forgiveness/fresh start; no credits earned will be applied toward graduation requirements; no grades will be calculated in the GPA. This option accurately represents the student's academic history on the transcript. The student is not penalized or rewarded for previous performance at Lane.
- Option 3: All course and grade information will remain on the transcript along with a notation about being granted academic forgiveness/fresh start; credits for courses in which the student earned an A, B or C will be applied toward graduation requirements; no grades will be calculated in the GPA. This option treats the student's credits and grades much like a student transferring to Lane. Courses which were successfully completed can be applied toward graduation requirements and the transcript accurately reflects the student's academic history.

Faculty Council has reviewed Lane's grade policy and based on input from faculty and staff, plans to implement the following changes where possible this academic year. For more information contact Margaret Bayless at 2162 or Fred Beisse at 2294.

* Change the description of the meaning of the letter grades A - F:

Grade	New description
A	Excellent performance
В	Good performance
C	Satisfactory performance
D	Less than satisfactory performance
. F	Unsatisfactory performance (no credit)

* Permit instructors who can distinguish performance among students within a letter grade to attach plus (+) or minus (-) to the letter grades A, B, C, and D and change the computation of grade point averages, both within a term and cumulative, so that (+) adds .3 and (-) subtracts

.3 from the numeric value of a letter grade. The grade point average would be "capped" at 4.0 so it would not be possible for a student to earn a 4.3 GPA.

- * Replace the current Y grade ("no basis for grade") with the more universally recognized NC grade. NC will be described as "Not completed; no credit."
- * Clarify the guidelines in the LCC Catalog for use of an I (Incomplete) grade.
- * Support the development of procedures which will permit faculty who maintain student grades on a spreadsheet or other electronic medium to submit their grades on a disk, or electronically, to reduce the reliance on manual key entry of grades.

As most of you know, the college is looking at \$1.3 million in cuts as a result of Measure 47. The details of proposed reductions were distributed to the college staff in a February 19 memo. Following that, hearings were held in the community and on campus. As a result of the hearings and other developments there will be some changes in the proposal that goes to the board tonight. The list will be completed mid-day today, Wednesday, and we want staff to be informed in advance of the board meeting. Consequently, by 3 p.m. this afternoon, we will send an e-mail to the campus detailing any changes in the original recommendations. - President Moskus

College Council report

A bond presentation was postponed at College Council on March 4. Tuition waiver process for employees

Classified, management and contracted faculty bargaining unit employees do not need to complete a tuition waiver form. Simply register for the class and you will be charged only for fees and not charged for tuition. If you are eligible for a tuition waiver, here are some hints to make the processing go smoothly. The employee completes the top portion of the form (lines 1-4) and signs on line 5. The department supervisor checks line 6 and signs on line 7. At this point the tuition waiver should be sent to Personnel Services for eligibility approval. Once Personnel has verified level of eligibility and authorized the waiver, it is returned to the employee's department as listed on line 3. The employee can then take the waiver directly to College Finance to complete the processing and pay for any fees attached to the class. Remember, the waiver only pays for tuition and does not cover fees.

Board report

The Board of Education approved approximately \$1.3 million in budget reductions for 1997/98 with a 5-2 vote on March 12. Pat Riggs-Henson and Marshall Sauceda voted no. The board unanimoulsy directed administration to prepare a prioritized add-back list if additional funds become available. Prior to voting, the board heard from 10 speakers, shared feedback from the town hall meetings, and questioned administration. "We have been placed in this position by the misinformed citizens of this state," said board member Roger Hall.

In other action, the board unanimoulsy approved Berry Architects for additions and renovations to the Florence campus for up to \$80,250 in fees and \$10,000 in expenses. Berry has been the Florence center architect of record since 1976. Immigration traveling exhibit on display in Library

Through the end of April, the Mezzanine Gallery at the Library will be home to an exhibit entitled "We Are Neighbors." This traveling exhibit, sponsored by Clergy and Laity Concerned (CALC) and the Network For Immigrant Justice, is composed of thirty-two photographic portraits of immigrants who now live in the Eugene area.

A multi-ethnic group of photographers--some amateurs and some professionals, like Gary Tepfer, Susan Detroy and Kent Peterson--donated their talents to create the "We Are Neighbors" exhibit.

The immigrants included in the exhibit come from England, Wales, Ireland, Yugoslavia, Mexico, El Salvador, Sweden, Denmark, the Netherlands, Germany, Belgium, Vietnam, India, South Korea, Chile, Argentina, Palestine, the Philippines, China, Liberia, France, and Portugal. Each photograph is accompanied by a brief introduction to each immigrant.

According to exhibit sponsors, this is photography with a purpose: "Photography can counter stereotyping and scapegoating by helping people recognize immigrants as our neighbors. The 'We Are Neighbors' project encourages people to reclaim their own immigrant heritage, identify with experiences faced by immigrants, and understand that immigrants are a diverse group who contribute to our community."
