College network training update

Network training classes have been restructured, and the spring term schedule will be announced in *The Daily* next Wednesday, April 9. The restructured classes will also be detailed in the staff professional development newsletter *The Learning Times*, to be distributed soon to all staff. We thank everyone who responded to our survey last December with many helpful insights and suggestions, which helped us with this reorganization. Note the following specifics:

- We plan to begin offering sessions this spring in how to set up remote access from home using Windows 95. Staff planning on taking advantage of this are asked to send e-mail to Bob Barber so we can assess how widespread the interest is.
- New employees or any other staff not yet in the network should contact Bob Barber to initiate the process, if they wish.
- All staff are advised that BeyondMail will not allow your e-mailbox to hold more than 1,000 messages, including those in the Sent folder and the Trash as well as the Inbox. If your e-mailbox is full, new incoming mail is not delivered but automatically returned to the sender. You can avoid this problem by emptying your Sent folder and your Trash frequently, and/or by saving critical messages out of BeyondMail and onto your hard disk. Use the menu Message/Save to File. Workshops on how to do this will be offered spring term, but you don't have to wait!
- Some staff have inquired about upgrading their Netscape from version 2 to version 3. You can request this upgrade by contacting the Help Desk at 4155. Please be aware, however, that Netscape 3 offers few real changes from Netscape 2, and runs best on computers with at least 16MB of RAM. The primary functional change is the ability to better view web pages that are constructed with "frames," that is, pages that are divided into several independent boxes.

Board agenda

The Board of Education will meet Wednesday, April 9, at 7 p.m. in the Boardroom. Action items include ASLCC ballot measures, the facility master plan, election results, and new curriculum including an associate degree in multimedia design and production, and one-year certificates in each of small business, supervision, and police training. The consent agenda includes a bid award for the class schedules, a brand name exemption for Hewlett-Packard printers, architectural services for the community learning center at Willamette High School, lighting fixtures for Math & Art and Machine Technology, and the retirements of Bill Jones, Jerry Nehring, Annette Newman, and Bill Porter.

Continuing credit students can now plan a year ahead

People are asking about the new annual class schedules that have recently appeared. For the first time, Lane has published an annual credit schedule to help continuing credit students plan their schedules for up to a year. Students will be able to reserve a place in classes and later confirm that place during the quarterly registration process. The annual schedule *does not replace the quarterly class schedules* which will still appear a few weeks before each term. Annual class schedules will be available only through Counseling. Students should see their program counselor or advisor. A schedule of group advising sessions will be available in Counseling beginning today. Advising sessions will begin on April 14.

Many staff have worked hard to create this new reserve-and-confirm annual registration process. We hope that students will benefit from being able to plan their classes, jobs and childcare in advance. However, the schedule notes that "Although the college has made every effort to accurately predict the schedule of classes for 1997-98, there will be some changes. Classes may be added or deleted; times and instructors may change." Once the quarterly schedule is out, students will be able to add or drop classes as usual. If you or your students have more questions, there are information flyers in Counseling, or you can call 2204.

New computer support standards include Windows 95

The Computer Support Committee has updated the computer support standards. The new standards will be available in full this Friday, April 11, on the computer support standards web page (off of the College Business main page). The major change in standards is the addition of Windows 95 and Windows 95-based applications as supported software. Computer Services has resolved the incompatibilities between Windows 95 and Lane's wide area network. Windows 95 can be used on networked computers on campus and may also be used for remote access to the network. However, due to the complexity of Windows 95, the Computer Support Committee advises users to carefully consider the decision to upgrade. Windows 95 will be most effective when used with Windows 95 application software and when used with a sufficiently powerful hardware configuration. Consult the Help Desk at 4155 if you have any questions about the suitability of Windows 95 for your particular needs.

Governor declares April Community College Month

Gov. John Kitzhaber signed this proclamation on March 31: "WHEREAS: The 17 community colleges in Oregon provide a broad array of educational services including professional/technical education, transfer education, two-year degree programs, certificate programs leading to employment and advancement, basic skills education, continuing and community education for more than 300,000 Oregonians each year; and WHEREAS: Oregon's community college's work in partnership with business, industry, and government to provide job training assistance and economic development; and WHEREAS: Community colleges provide a necessary resource for community service, including career development, job search assistance, counseling and developmental education; and WHEREAS: Through these services Oregon's community colleges are building communities by meeting diverse and changing local needs and fulfilling a vital function within the Oregon educational system; and WHEREAS: More than two-thirds of all students in public education in Oregon are served by community colleges, and over 90 percent of Oregonians live in a community college district, benefiting from high-quality education at a reasonable cost within commuting distance from their homes; NOW, THEREFORE, I, John A. Kitzhaber, Governor of the State of Oregon, hereby proclaim April 1997 to be Community College Month in Oregon and encourage all Oregonians to join in this observance."

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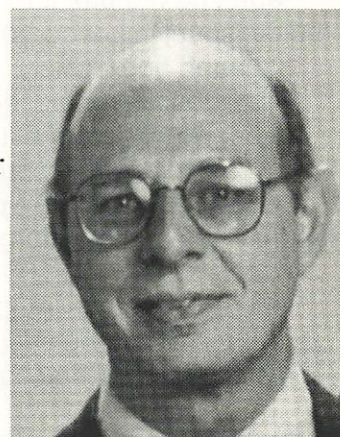

The Computer Support Committee has updated the computer support standards. The new standards are available on the computer support standards web page (off of the College Business main page). The support standards identify hardware and software that will be supported by Computer Services and Electronic Services. The major change in standards is the addition of Windows 95 and Windows 95-based applications as supported software. Computer Services has resolved the incompatibilities between Windows 95 and Lane's wide area network. Windows 95 can be used on networked computers on campus and may also be used for remote access to the network. However, because of the complexity of Windows 95, the Computer Support Committee is recommending that users carefully consider the decision to upgrade. Windows 95 will be most effective when used with Windows 95 application software and when used with a sufficiently powerful hardware configuration. Board report

At its April 9 meeting, the Board of Education approved new instructional programs including one-year certificates in business management, supervision, and basic police training; and an associate of applied science degree in multimedia design and production. The programs will begin fall 1997 if approved by the Oregon State Board of Education.

The facility master plan was approved, including instructions for more information and feedback opportunities for board and staff as design work proceeds. In a related 4-1 vote, the board approved Glas Architectural Group, architect of record, for the community learning center at Thurston High School. Marshall Saucedo abstained and agreed with Dubick that going with the contractor of record, however advantageous, shuts out new and minority-owned businesses.

By a 4-1 vote, the board tabled a student referendum to increase student fees by \$.25 for the forensics club and \$.50 for recreational and multicultural events, citing legal uncertainty under Measure 47. Pat Riggs-Henson voted against tabling.

The board approved Oregon Lithoprint as class schedule printer; brand-name exemption for Hewlett-Packard printers; purchase of lighting fixtures for Math & Art and Machine Technology from Consolidated Electrical Distributors plus installation by Ericson Electric, and the retirements of Bill Jones, Jerry Nehring, Annette Newman, and Bill Porter.

KLCC completes shortest ever radiothon

KLCC's spring radiothon ended April 10, reaching the \$125,000 goal in just six days and four hours. The radiothon began with \$76,000 in the bank from 1,100 "thonbusters" who contributed before the on-air campaign. The final \$50,000 came from 903 listeners. Community businesses offered over 350 premiums. More than half of KLCC's budget comes from listeners and local businesses.

Facilities plan approved

Lane moved one step closer to the 21st century when the Board of Education gave concept approval to the master facilities plan at its April 9 meeting. The plan outlines community learning centers, updated campus buildings, and high-tech distance learning technology to be funded by the \$42.8 million general obligation bond approved by voters in 1995. Projects are subject to change as design work proceeds.

The first new construction is the Cottage Grove center. Work began in July 1996 and progress can be checked on the Internet site at www.lanec.edu, then College Departments, then Cottage Grove. The 18,000-square-foot facility will be ready for occupancy this fall.

The next new construction will be the community learning center at Thurston High School. It goes to bid this month concurrent with the high school's own construction plans, and should be completed by fall. Eight such centers are planned, with the others at Oakridge, Churchill, Willamette, Fern Ridge, Harrisburg, Junction City, and McKenzie high schools.

Main campus plans call for approximately 151,000 square feet of new construction and 77,000 square feet of remodeling. Projects include a technology and training complex of new construction and renovations, Science Building addition and renovations, Performing Arts Building addition, Child Care Center/training facility, Center Building renovation, Health Building renovations, welding/jewelry lab relocation, Campus Services Building remodel for printing and laundry relocation, and minor renovations to Electronics, Forum, Industrial Technology, Math & Art, and Physical Education Buildings. A Native American Longhouse and new KLCC facility will not be bond-funded, but are included in the master plan for practical purposes.

Bond funds already have been spent on main campus to repave parking lots, install handrails on outdoor stairways and make other access improvements, and reroof Automotive, Air Technology, and Machine Technology Buildings. A state-of-the-art flight simulator was purchased for the flight training program at Eugene Airport, and some improvements were done to the Wildish Building in Eugene.

Cost totals are estimated at \$1,700,919 for the Cottage Grove center, \$3,175,504 for the community learning centers, \$27,344,617 for main campus construction and remodeling, \$2,983,827 for main campus physical plant upgrades, \$1 million for disability access improvements, \$939,004 for the Florence center, \$5 million for instructional equipment, and \$200,000 for the Wildish Building upgrade.

The board requested more opportunities for input for itself and staff as design work proceeds, and advised staff to continue to offer bidding opportunities to women and minority contractors. - *from a news release by Institutional Advancement and Campus Services sent today to county news media*

New business career programs to be offered

People who want to climb the career ladder in the business world can get a leg up from Lane. A one-year certificate in business management and another in supervision were approved by the Board of Education this month. The programs, and a redesigned sales and marketing program, will count toward a two-year associate of applied science degree in business management. Individual courses will be available evenings or as telecourses. The programs now require Oregon State Board of Education approval.

"This is important for working people who want to improve their chances for promotion or salary increases by building their credentials," says Greg Fishwick, chair of the Business Administration Department. "Also, all the courses will transfer from the one-year certificate program to the two-year degree program, and all of the two-year degree courses will transfer to a four-year degree program." During 1997/98, the department plans to offer 22 sections of courses in the evenings or as telecourses.

The changes were recommended by the department's advisory committee of business people and were based upon student and public feedback, survey results, enrollment patterns, and labor market trends. The new programs are projected to enroll 40 FTE students, adding to the department's current 210 FTE by 19 percent.

E-mail users may be interested in the following from the State of Oregon Attorney General Public Records and Meetings Manual: "E-mail is a public record. Even after individual e-mail messages are 'deleted' from an individual's computer work area, the messages generally continue to exist on computer back-up tapes, which are also public records. A public body must make all nonexempt e-mail available for inspection and copying." Whether records are exempt from disclosure is often determined on a case-by-case basis. Public records law tends to favor disclosure, not exemption.

Remember, if you made a change in the distribution between regular and variable in 1996, it will be reflected on the 1997 statement that will be sent to you next year.

Outreach enrollments continue to increase

In 1993/94 the four locations of Junction City High, Willamette High, Thurston High, and Willamette Career Center held 64 classes with enrollment of 1,067 and 44.51 FTE generated for Continuing Ed and credit departments. In 1995/96 Harrisburg High, Oakridge High and Elmira High were added. The total number of classes rose to 129, enrollment to 1,826 and FTE rose for Continuing Ed to 64.37 and Credit Departments to 28.14. The net increase from 93/94 to 95/96 was 65 more classes, 759 more students and 48 FTE. Classes at these locations are offered mainly in the evening. Most of these sites will become Community Learning Center sites and will give Lane the opportunity to offer daytime classes, independent learning opportunities in computer labs, telecourse viewing and testing, and student services to area residents including high school students wanting to further their education.
