

Zimmerman is president of the Lane chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, the international honor society for two-year colleges, and Bragg is vice president. They attended the society's international convention in Dallas, Texas, this month and Bragg carried the flag for the State of Oregon.

She was born in Eugene, traveled the world for 26 years a dependent in the Air Force, and is a wife and mother of three grown children and has six grandchildren.

Display will feature gay family life

The Women's Center will display "Love Makes a Family: Living in Lesbian and Gay Families" from May 12-16. This is a photo-text exhibit of 30 families of diverse racial and economic backgrounds with lesbian or gay members -- grandparents, parents and/or youth. We have wanted to develop a new logo and graphic look for the college for years and have reached a point in time where it

will be efficient and cost-effective to do so. Since the passage of Measures 5 and 47, more of Lane's funding comes from the state. To maintain this funding and protect programs and services, the college must maintain enrollment. This requires that Lane have a clear, recognizable logo and graphic look to help make the college visible in the community. In addition, one of the key findings of Students First! research is that students find the information we give them confusing. Students asked the college to be more consistent in its use of language and graphic design. Finally, neither of the college's current logos work well in electronic media, including on the Web. The selection of a new logo and graphic look will enable the college to improve the look of its Web site.

This redesign project is being coordinated by a team made up of Gary Anderson, Printing/Graphics; Chris Lindberg, Media Arts and Technology; Bee McRae, Students First!; Thomas Rubick, Art and Applied Design; and Susan Sutton, Angela Miller and Diane Dann (convenor), Institutional Advancement.

opportunities for minority contractors, regarding its bid waiver policy. Agreeing that waivers are sometimes appropriate, Marshall Sauceda said

it's a habit that Lane must change. Dubick said long-term planning would avoid emergency use of waivers. The board approved \$375,000 to build the Community Learning Center at Thurston after long discussion. They called for more detailed communications in advance of expenditures and questioned the staffing costs of the CLSs. Roger Hall continued to call for more classroom space on main campus.

A six-month affirmative action report raised the question as to why improved recruiting had resulted in no minority hires. Further review of screening and department-level processes was recommended.

The board appointed Larry Romine to the Zone 1 seat and elected Michael Dubick as chair and Pat Riggs-Henson as vice chair, moves caused by Cindy Cable's resignation. The board accepted the retirements of Don Micken, Gary and Marilyn Rholl, and Pat Williams; approved Omnitek to supply Hewlett-Packard printers as needed; approved ASLCC election results; and approved \$48,711 to US West Communications for a voice mail upgrade.

The redesign effort involves translating Lane's mission, vision and goals into results, using new approaches that cut across traditional department and job boundaries.

The Dislocated Worker Program placed second in the competition for the Workforce Development Award presented by the American Association of Community Colleges and the U.S. Department of Labor last month. In 1987, the program was named best in the nation by the National Alliance of Business. The program is operated in partnership with the Southern Willamette Private Industry Council and is funded by JTPA grants.

Established in 1983, the program provides career/life planning, retraining or skills upgrading, and job search assistance to Lane County residents who lose their jobs due to changes in the economy. Of the 781 people served in 1995/96:

- * average age of participants was 40
- * 86 percent held a high school diploma
- * average wage at dislocation was \$10.96
- average wage after 90 days in new career was 104% of wage at dislocation
- * 75 percent were employed by end of program
- * 62 percent found jobs related to their retraining
